Top Field Opens Masters Tourney

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP)—Can a new-comer win the 20th Masters, a golf classic which opened today with the biggest and best field in its brief but brilliant history?

The records say no. The golfers say so. And the sportswriters say no. They lean toward the experience of a Cary Middlecoff, Sam Snead, Ben Hogan or Jimmy Demaret.

But Ray O'Brien, tournament director of the Professional Golfers Assn., says yes.

"We have more fine young golfers on the tour this year than ever before, I believe," O'Brien said. "Several of them have the game to win the Masters, and I think one of them will."

He mentioned such circuit stars as Dow Finsterwald, Don Fairfield, Ernie Vossler, Lionel Hebert, Mike Fetchick, Billy Maxwell, Gene Littler and Mike Souchak.

Middlecoff, the defending champion who would like to become the first to win Masters titles in successive years, held out for experience. "I don't believe any of the boys who haven't played this course several years stand much chance," he said. "This is a course you have to know to be able to score well."

"I'd say Littler and Souchak have the best chance among the younger fellows. They've already played in two or three Masters."

The sprawling Augusta National spread its 6,500 challenging yards before the record field of 84 for the opening round. Rich in tradition and packed with prestige, the Masters championship is one coveted by all golfers.

64 Matches Scheduled In PGA Tournament

CHICAGO (AP)—The 1956 National PGA Tournament, to be an all match-play event for the first time, will have sectional qualifying rounds between May 21 and May 28.

A field of 128 golfers, including a minimum of 30 or 40 exempted from qualifying, will begin a 64-match round in the tournament July 20 at Canton, Mass., the PGA announced. The meet runs through July 24, at Canton's Blue Hill Golf and Country Club.

The 36-hole qualifying round for the 31 PGA districts is set for May 21 but may be contested up to and including May 28.

Heretofore, the PGA championship ran for seven days with two days of medal play qualifying at the site to determine the match-play bracket.

Elk Breaking All Rules Of Diet To Survive Winter

Some of the elk in Washington's deep snow country are breaking all the rules of diet—but Pat Ford says they appear to be surviving Washington's tough winter by eating such things as moss, stinking bark and even dead wood.

The elk herds which sifted to the lowlands are waxing fat on the hay set out by the State Game Department. But some of the high country wapiis are sticking it out in snow so deep only their antlers show above the trails.

Ford, a Reclamation Bureau caretaker, tells this story: "This winter, I've seen the elk eating fir tree tips which ordinarily they never touch. They've even eaten the cottonwood trees and you know how a cottonwood smells, let alone tastes, even to an elk."

Ford works for the bureau around Bumping Lake in southeastern Washington. "I've seen places around the lake," he says, "where the elk have eaten dry, dead limbs up to an inch through. Where they get any nourishment I don't know."

Marten trappers have reported elk in the same area eating moss off the trees.

Harvey Knox Out As Ring Second

LOS ANGELES (AP)—"Taking a punch at a sports writer," has KO'd Harvey Knox's career as a licensed boxing second.

Harvey, stepfather of Ronnie Knox, UCLA's talented football tailback was suspended indefinitely by the State Athletic Commission Wednesday for "behavior not consistent with good conduct of boxing."

While acting as boxer Art Aragon's second, Knox tossed a punch at Herald-Express sports writer Bud Furillo in the Hollywood Legion Stadium dressing room after a March 27 fight.

In making the motion, Commissioner S. Thomas Buccerelli said: "Mr. Knox said in Riverside last Monday that he didn't care to be associated with boxing any longer, that his appearance was merely a publicity stunt. . . I move his license be suspended indefinitely."

The motion was adopted unanimously.

The National League season doesn't open for 12 days, but the battle's already on between the world champion Brooklyn Dodgers and the Milwaukee Braves.

Tempers have flared. Don Newcombe, tired of being called "gutless," is mad.

After a couple of squabbles that almost led to fist fights in the Braves' 7-5 10-inning decision over the Dodgers yesterday, Big Newk said today, "Those guys sit around all night saying how gutless our pitchers are—especially me."

"Well, we'll see about that tomorrow."

To Face Braves
Newcombe is slated to face the Braves at Chattanooga tomorrow as the two NL contenders continue their eight-game homeward tour from Florida. They play at New Orleans today.

But if yesterday's doings are any indication of what's to come—and if Newk is serious—it won't be an exhibition tour, pal, it will be a running skirmish.

Things started jumping in Mobile, Ala., yesterday when Roy Campanella came to bat for the Dodgers in the second inning with the bases loaded. He hit the dirt to escape Bob Buhl's first pitch, and on the next loss rapped into a double play. The call at first was close and Campy, who weighs 205, tromped on Joe Adcock's left foot as he crossed the bag.

When the Dodgers came to bat in the third, Adcock and Milwaukee catcher Del Rice started jaw-

ing with the Dodger bench, which returned the jeers. Suddenly both Rice and Adcock started for the Brooklyn dugout. Jackie Robinson, Carl Furillo and Duke Snider cut them off. There was nothing more than pushing and an exchange of words.

Robbie Dumped

Play resumed and Buhl sent Robinson sprawling with his first pitch, nipping the Dodger veteran on the right wrist. Buhl apologized and Robinson called it "an accident," but later retired for ice-pack treatment.

The game? Oh, Buhl went on to become the second Milwaukee hurler to go nine innings (Warren Spahn's the other), but Dave Jolly got the victory when the Braves scored twice in the 10th, with Johnny Logan swatting a 3-0 homer to break a 5-5 tie, off rookie Don Elston.

The Cleveland Indians beat the New York Giants 2-0 behind the five-hit pitching of Bob Lemon and Bob Feller although held to only three hits.

Detroit's Dick Marlowe and Bob Miller outlasted Boston's Mel Parnell and Frank Baumann to win 2-1. Earl Torgeson singled home the clincher in the eighth off Baumann while Red Sox rookie Marty Keough got the game's lone extra-base hit—a third-inning homer off Marlowe.

Hits Limited

Cincinnati and Washington each had only five hits, but the Redlegs ran away with a 5-0 decision after getting nine walks from Bucky Stewart.

The New York Yankees belted Robin Roberts for all their runs in the fourth, including a two-run homer by rookie Lou Skizas, but lost to the Philadelphia Phils 4-3. The Phils scored three in the eighth off Bob Grim.

Pittsburgh got three runs in the second off Art Ceccarelli and beat Kansas City 4-2 with Roberto Clemente getting 3-for-3. And Baltimore, paced by Jim Pyburn's two homers, walloped the Chicago Cubs 15-4. One of Pyburn's clouts was a first-inning grand-slam off Paul Minner.
