3 Roseburg High Seniors Report At Rotary Meet

Three Roseburg High School seniors, Evangeline Chapman, Patricia Elliott and Carolyn Jackson, gave reports Thursday at a regular Roseburg Rotary Club meeting, telling of a recent conference for young adults at Southern Oregon College, Ashland.

The conference, sponsored by the Ashland Rotary Club, dealt with family relations. The girls were introduced by program Chairman Bill Carstens.

Earlier in the program, President Harold Hoyt read a report from Rotary's traffic safety committee, headed by Bill Wishart, in which results of a recent free inspection service for automobiles were told.

Sixteen local garages cooperated in the drive. Brakes and lights were checked on 508 vehicles, and 75 per cent were found unsafe. Tires were inspected and rotated on 250 cars. It was found that headlights on 95 per cent of the vehicles checked were out of adjustment or needed replacing, the report stated.

Before the meeting closed, President Hoyt called upon some members to give brief biographical sketches.

Home Nursing Course Postponed

The Red Cross training course for home nursing instructors has been postponed until April 23.

Lack of registration was reason for the date switch, according to RC workers. They pointed out that Civil Defense personnel urge there be one qualified person in home nursing in every home.

The American Red Cross has been given the responsibility to train instructors. It teaches home nursing classes. A spokesman said there are no qualified Home Nursing instructors in the county at present.
