### Suit Asks For Damages Following Auto Crash

Thirteen-year-old Betty Harris, by guardian Ethel L. Harris, has brought suit in Douglas County Circuit Court against Loren Duncan, seeking \$25,000 general and \$500 special damages.

In the complaint, the girl alleges Duncan was negligent and reckless on March 19, 1956, when his car rammed a barricade and ended up in a ditch in a construction area about three miles north of Canyonville.

Miss Harris, a passenger in the Duncan car, claims permanent injuries.

Washington (AP) - The Air Force will turn to the sun for energy to fire the hottest furnace "known to exist in the world today."

### Air Force Turns To Sun For Hot Furnace Energy

It will be done with mirrors in a solar furnace to be built soon at a spot 9,000 feet high in the Sacramento Mountains near Holloman Air Development Center, Alamogordo, N. M.

Announcing the project Wednesday, the Air Force said the furnace may attain temperatures of 7,000 to 8,000 degrees Fahrenheit over a "substantially larger area than any other furnace known to exist."

The Air Force said such terrific heats are needed to advance research and testing of materials for use in high speed, high altitude aircraft, and for duplicating the heat effects of nuclear weapons.

One nuclear weapon which could be advanced by this heat research would be the long range ballistic missile.
