

Douglas Righthander Lots Perfect No-Hitter In Books

Gilman Faces 21 Bandon Men In District Tilt

The second no-hit baseball game by a Douglas County team was chalked up Friday afternoon at Bandon, and it was one of the most spectacular in years.

A righthanded senior named Bob Gilman hurled a perfect game for his Douglas Trojans. With flawless fielding behind him, not one Bandon man reached first base in the seven-inning District 6-A-2 contest. The final score was 2-0.

Strikes Out Six
Gilman struck out six and neither Bandon nor hit a batter. Only 21 Tigers faced him. Meanwhile, his teammates fielded 15 chances in the field without a single error.

The team went on to gather more laurels in an abbreviated five-inning second-half of a double header. It went through 12 innings this time, handled 27 fielding efforts in the two games and ended a glorious day without a single error. Incidentally, the Trojans won that Kings-X game, 6-0. Although he was overshadowed by Gilman's no-no, Johnny Cooper, a junior righthander, waited through that game and gave up only a single hit.

For the 2-0 district victory, Coach Bob Williams' crew picked up six hits and capitalized on three Bandon errors. The Trojans won the game in the first inning when Bill Rudzik singled sharply to bring home Tracy McClelland. For insurance they added another in the sixth when Roy Miller singled Larry Bissonette home. Rudzik was top hitter for the game with two singles in three trips to the plate.

Second Easier
The second victory was easier after the route through the tense no-hitter in the opening half of the double bill.

Again the Trojans won in the first inning with a single run, but added considerably more insurance in later innings while Cooper coolly checked the Tigers.

A hit wasn't necessary for that first run. Miller walked to first, stole second and came home on two consecutive wild pitches.

In the third, the story was almost the same. Walks, steals, balks and a solitary single brought in three runs. Another hit brought in two more in the fourth.

For his five-inning stint, Cooper struck out three and walked three. The two victories stretched the Trojans' skinn to three games without defeat. Earlier, they knocked off Roseburg to open their season.

Next Tuesday, they continue the spring campaign with a non-counting in league or conference at Glendale at 2 p.m.

St. Francis staged its only other threat in the final frame when two men got on without a single man down. But the Warriors polished off the next three batters in a row.

Drain collected eight walks during the afternoon and left 11 men stranded. Merrill struck out seven and gave up only one walk.

The Warriors try Tuesday to repeat their victory over the Roseburg Indians. The game is scheduled at 4 p.m. at Drain. Next Friday, the Warriors invade Creswell for their second district game of the season.

Overcast Predicted For Sunday Open Ski Meet
