## Ruined Stratocruiser Eyed In Watery Grave

SEATTLE — An electronic eye lowered into Puget Sound Sunday got only a fleeting glimpse of wreckage of a Northwest Orient Airlines Stratocruiser which crashed and sank last Monday.

The Stratocruiser, bound for New York with 38 passengers and crew members, sank after it was ditched off Maury Island. Four drowned and a fifth person is missing.

## Snow, Dust Storms Hit Wide Area Of States

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Heavy snow and rain was mixed in eastern Kansas.

**Top Soil Swept Away**

Snow-weary, 2nd graders, deleting 7th through 10th grade "A" black dust. . . the storm.

In some parts of Texas, the dust-carrying off rich, black top soil was the worst since the 1920s.

Light rain combined with the dust to give Dallas and Waco a muddy mess.

The dust also blinded Fort Worth, Lubbock, Abilene, Mineral Wells, San Angelo, Killeen and Junction.

Damage to wheat was reported, and Texas A&M College said pastures and other crops were badly injured.

Winds propelled the dust deeper into the state in gusts up to 78 m.p.h.

Snow-weary New Englanders once again started digging out after a spring storm dumped more than a foot of snow in many areas Sunday.

The snowstorm, propelled by winds up to 62 miles per hour, was the fourth big snow to hit the northeast in 24 days.

At least seven deaths were attributed to the new storm. Most of the victims died of heart attacks while shoveling snow.

**Three On Plane Missing**

Three Marine Corps officers were missing near New York on a flight from California.

The high winds and heavy wet snow felled hundreds of power lines and knocked out heat, light and refrigeration in an estimated 75,000 homes.

Blanford, Mass., reported a foot and a half of snow. Ashfield, Mass., was buried in drifts up to 10 feet deep.

Hazleton, Pa., had a 17-inch snowfall and Norfolk, Conn., 16 inches. The mountainous north-west corner of New Jersey also reported 16 inches of new snow.

The death toll in the northeast included three in Massachusetts, one in New Hampshire and three in New York.

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through adult life.

2. "Moral and spiritual values, not as a subject but incorporated in the instruction as need arises."

3. "Social and family life." He said the basic meaning of "social" refers to the form of society where people live and work together and "does not refer to the more shallow interpretation of the term."

Supt. Deller noted that America democratic group living "requires that people work, live and play together. He said practice in group living was accomplished through committee work. He cited a class project in Australian geography as an example, while other examples are student body associations or group activities such as football, band or debate.

4. "The American idea of free enterprise in all areas of study—English, social studies (history, etc.), business education, science, math, industrial arts, physical education and fine arts (band, chorus, art, library)." Supt. Deller said the program encouraged the idea that the "student who applies himself will derive the greatest benefits. The practice carries over into business life, he noted. The same idea is stressed in all classes when the occasion arises, he said.

5. Citizenship — a sense of relationship and loyalty in its students to our community, state and nation. Throughout school activities, curricular and extra curricular, students are helped to gain skills which will enable them to take active part in community, state and national affairs." Such skills as described include evaluating reading material to tell facts from fiction and ability to discriminate between good and poor propaganda.

The silver-haired superintendent added that the Roseburg public schools believe in a "continuous process of evaluation of curriculum and methods." He said "this is not merely a statement of an ideal." As evidence he listed the continuing in-service training program for instructors "dedicated to improvement of the school program." This year, teachers have covered "teaching citizenship through reading" and Friday will learn why curriculum needs revision.

Deller noted that local schools follow the idea that by working through the home, church, industry and community life in the area, the purposes of the schools can be better achieved.

The outline of the instructional policy is the school philosophy, he said. He added that methods and teaching are not necessarily a part of the philosophy. The administration "places its trust and confidence in the principals and teachers; in the methods they employ to achieve the skills, appreciations and understandings that are set forth in this philosophy," he concluded.

## Building Progress Taking Big Stride In Drain Locality

The construction of a green veneer plant in Drain, to be known as Drain Plywood Co., is leading the way in accelerated construction there, according to the Drain Enterprise.

Randall & Pfister, Chevrolet and Oldsmobile dealer, will move into a new agency building probably early in the summer. It will contain about 7,000 square feet, including showroom and garage space.

The Masonic Lodge has announced plans to raise a wooden building between Chamber's Variety Store and Whipple's Piling Co. office, then build a new concrete and masonry block structure, which will be leased to the Enterprise and Burns Shoe Store. The wooden building now houses the shoe store and Emery's Barber Shop.

The barber shop will move into a new building which is being planned.

The Enterprise said it will buy a larger press and other publishing equipment.

A meat packing plant, first in the northern part of Douglas County, is under construction on the L. C. Buck ranch, just west of Drain on Highway 38. L. C. Wheeler, a partner, will aid in the operation of the wholesale and retail plant, to be known as Cloverleaf Packing Co.

Other businesses under construction are a machine shop in South Drain and a sawmill, being constructed by Roy Standwood on the former Griswold Planing Mill site.

Contemplated are a two-story business building by the Masons and a service station.

At least twelve homes are being planned or already are under construction.

## Two Bank Bandits Captured; All Loot Recovered

FLINT, Mich. (AP) — FBI agents and Flint police flushed a bandit trio from their one-room hideout here Saturday, capturing two of them and recovering the \$61,204 grabbed in a daylight bank holdup Friday.

The FBI said Dave Felkes, armed with a nickel plated revolver, was still at large in the area. Police feared he may be holding some neighborhood family as hostage. They made a house by house check.

He escaped amid a flurry of gunfire.

The two bandits who were captured were identified as Joe Ball, Alkes and George Ballin, both of Chicago.

Police said the three dashed into the east side branch of the Citizens Commercial & Savings Bank before noon Friday scooping money out of four tellers cages while they held the bank staff at bay with guns.

Police said they received a tip last night from an undisclosed source and immediately set up a stake-out of a two-apartment home at 3402 Lewis Blvd.

When they entered the house, they found Alkes huddled in a basement coal bin. An officer checking a garage at the rear saw a blanket move in the back seat of a parked car.

Felkes leaped from the car and climbed a fence to escape.

Ballin stayed under the blanket where officers also found a laundry bag containing the full amount of money taken in the robbery.

## Catch-All Farm Bill Likely To Pass Congress

ise bill, Sen. Aiken (R-Vt) and others have said it faces a presidential veto unless Congress modifies its proposals to bring them more in line with the principles espoused by the administration.

In advance of the White House conference House GOP leader Martin of Massachusetts told newsmen the bill is "unsatisfactory as it stands."

"House GOP strategy is to send the bill back to the conference group 'with instructions.' That requires a majority of the House to vote for a substitute which would be acceptable to the President. Eisenhower said last week he would be satisfied with something less than 'perfection.'"

**Ike's O.K. Predicted**

Strengthening expectations of a Republican compromise offer, Sen. Aiken (R-Vt) told newsmen a substitute "might be approved" which would provide for price supports at 82½ to 85 per cent of parity in place of rigid 90 per cent supports. Parity is a price determined under farm law to be fair to farmers in relation to their costs.

Rep. Burdick (R-ND), however, predicted "the House will pass the bill and the President will sign it."

His prediction was echoed by Democratic farm leaders in both House and Senate, who said they could muster the vote to pass the compromise bill and send it to Eisenhower on an "all or nothing" basis.
