Automatic Fringe Area Annexation Legislation Asked

COOS BAY — C. Eugene Fields, Coos County sanitarian, Friday urged legislation to provide automatic annexation by cities of fringe areas when population reaches a certain density.

Fields made the suggestion at the final session of the Legislative Interim Committee on local government and urban area problems. He also urged legislation to enable fringe areas to finance improvements.

He said that automatic annexation should be at the option of the city council whenever the population density in any five-acre portion of a 40-acre tract reaches two dwellings per acre.

In the case of suburban areas located within two miles of the city limits but not bordering the city, Fields advocated that the cities be empowered to make necessary improvements and assess the costs against owners of the property.

He recommended that county courts be given power to establish planning commissions to regulate subdivisions, issue building permits and enforce planning laws.

The Coos County Health Department recommended that when an area reaches a population of 300 persons per half-mile radius from any point, that area should be directed by the county court to incorporate.

Bob Kyle, Coos Bay city manager, and Mike Huddleston, Coquille city engineer, agreed with Fields' recommendations.

Fire Destroys Roof Of Glendale Landmark

Fire Sunday afternoon destroyed the roof of a Glendale landmark, the Bill Sparks home.

The flames were extinguished by the Glendale Volunteer Fire Dept. before they could spread to the rest of the house, but quite a bit of water damage to contents resulted.

The fire was spotted by a couple of girls. It was thought to have been caused by faulty wiring in an upstairs ceiling.

The house was built in the early 1900s when the community was a southern Oregon mining center, according to Mrs. G. B. Fox, News-Review correspondent.

Furniture was carried from the house by volunteers and is being stored in the Glendale Church of Christ until the roof can be repaired.

One volunteer, 13-year-old Larry Hager, lost his glasses, and his parents have asked for the finder to return them to him. They have brown and gold rims.

Newspaper To Occupy Larger Quarters

Vice Principal, Teacher At Days Creek To Study

Loren E. Sheldon, vice principal and teacher at Days Creek High School, has resigned to accept a position with International Business Machines, producers of electronic computers and data processing machines.

According to Sheldon, he will spend a year in study at the IBM school in Kingston, N.Y., and will be working toward a doctor's degree in education.

Sheldon served two and a half years in the Navy as an aviation electronics technician and retains a commission in the reserves in that field. He received his bachelor's degree in math and physics from Western Washington College of Education in 1949 and his master's degree in education from the University of Oregon in 1954. He has taught for six years, the past five years at Days Creek, and expects to be teaching again in the field of electronics for IBM following his year's study.

Mr. Sheldon said his selection was based on his degrees, his teaching experience and background in electronics, on a battery of tests and interviews. He recently flew back to Kingston, at the request of the company, for an interview.

Sheldon, his wife, Dorothy, and their three children expect to leave for the East about July 1, following a short vacation after the school year is ended.
