

Dodgers Liked For National Pennant

NEW YORK (AP) — The unbeatable combination of the most powerful batting order in the post-war era and a pitching staff deep in starters and rich in bullpen strength should bring another National League pennant to the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1956 with just about as much ease as last year.

After first place—well, anything can happen. Any one of five teams can take over the runner-up spot—Milwaukee, New York, St. Louis, Cincinnati and Philadelphia. Last year only 10 games separated second place Milwaukee and fifth place Cincinnati.

Despite the presence of Robin Roberts, the best pitcher in baseball, the punchless Phillies don't figure to finish in the first division and may not go higher than sixth.

The Chicago Cubs and Pittsburgh Pirates are obviously improved but appear doomed to battle it out for seventh place.

Like most needy folks, the Dodgers are grabbing at straws. This year there's a young phenom named Charley Neal at second, a strong pitching prospect named Don Drysdale and a stylish left-hander named Ken Lehman to replace the sore-armed Billy Loes, Karl Spooner and the departed Johnny Podres.

The odds are against the Dodgers approaching their 1955 feat of winning 22 of their first 24 games but, the fact is, they look stronger. Barring crippling injuries to such key men as Roy Campanella, Duke Snider, Pee Wee Reese, Gil Hodges or Carl Furillo the team may duplicate its 13½-game victory romp of last year.

Herb Score Beats Giants Again; Hitters Rate Him No. 1 On Cleveland Mound Staff

Herb Score won 16 games and struck out 245 as the American League rookie of the year with the Cleveland Indians last season, and all the time his "cousins" were in the other league.

The guys he calls "cousins" are the New York Giants, and he's been treating them like poor relations this spring. In 22 innings against them the 22-year-old fire-eating left-hander has permitted only 3 runs, 12 hits and 10 walks while fanning 21.

He's looked so good the Giants' Don Mueller, a pretty fair hitter, ranks him No. 1 on the Cleveland staff—ahead of Bob Lemon, Early Wynn and Mike Garcia, in fact.

Should they meet in the World Series, Mueller figures it'll take the Giants five games to win. They swept the Tribe in four straight in 1954, but Mueller concedes one victory to Score.

Herb was his usual best yesterday as Cleveland beat the Giants 6-4. Mueller got an infield single and Gail Harris followed with a home run to the opposite field off a low outside fast ball in the first inning, but then Score became almost untouchable. He walked just two and fanned five while giving only one more hit in his five innings—a smash to the mound that went for a single by Whitey Lockman.

Bob Feller mopped up for the Tribe with four hits—one a two-run homer by Hank Thompson who was purposely held back until Score departed. Giant manager Bill Rigney figured Hank might further injure his stiff shoulder swinging at Score's fast one.

Cleveland got its licks in early, beating Al Worthington for six hits and five runs in the first three frames. Hoot Evers and Jim Hegan homered off the right-hander. Cold and rain checked the exhibition.

MONTREAL (AP) — The Detroit Red Wings go into the fifth game of the Stanley Cup final against the Montreal Canadiens tonight needing a victory to keep the series alive.

"There's no tomorrow," said General Manager Jack Adams of the Wings. "Our boys know what we're up against."

The Canadiens hold a 3-1 lead in the best-of-seven final and are prohibitive favorites to wind it up tonight on their home ice.

Coach Toe Blake of the Canadiens said the Red Wings tried to "get" Bernie (Zoom Boom) Geoffrion in the opening minute of Sunday's game, knowing that Geoffrion had an injured knee.

Adams and Coach Jimmy Skinner of the Wings both said Montreal's Tom Johnson deliberately struck Metro Prystay with his stick, sending the Detroit right-winger to the hospital with an eye injury.

Johnson flatly denied the allegation and talked vaguely of suing Adams. "It was entirely an accident," said Johnson. "There wasn't even a penalty on the play."

Coach Blake said it seemed obvious to him the Wings were out to "get" Geoffrion.

"They knew he had been injured in practice and that there was a some doubt for a while about him being able to play Sunday," said Blake.

"So what happened? Prystay sent Geoffrion flying after only 50 seconds of play and was penalized for tripping. We were fortunate that Geoffrion wasn't badly hurt."

The only Montreal casualty from Sunday's game, won 3-0 by the Canadiens, was little Henri (Pocket Rocket) Richard, who sprained his thumb while fighting with Norm Ullman of the Wings. Henri wore a bandage about the thumb on the trip home.

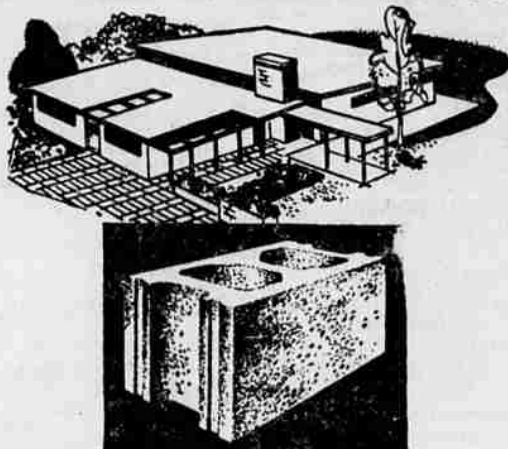
Purdue last week also cast a vote of approval.
