Gunmen Collect Bets At Illegal Game Cock Fight

STUEBENVILLE, Ohio — Nine masked gunmen who took the betting bankrolls of about 100 spectators at a game cock fight Saturday night and wounded the referee knew plenty about the secret operation of that illegal sport, Sheriff Clarence Eberts said Monday.

No exact estimate was made of the cash and jewelry the bandits forced the crowd to toss on a bed sheet spread in the fight ring. But one unofficial estimate put the amount of loot at about \$100,000.

Sheriff Eberts said the holdup gang leader told the crowd gathered in a barn on a farm about 18 miles west of here: "You fellows know this is illegal, don't you?" And when the gunmen left, the leader comforted the victims with: "This is going for a good cause." Eberts said the first he knew of the holdup was when Ohio Valley Hospital reported Harry Hewitt, 57, of Norfolk, Va., had been brought there with a .32 caliber bullet wound in the left shoulder. The sheriff said he learned Hewitt was referee of the cock fight. All the bandits wore army type fatigue clothing. Two of them wore black half masks and the others had green hoods over their heads. Hewitt was shot by one of the lookouts as he tried to jump through a window.
