Church Women Plan Annual Fellowship Breakfast Tuesday

Final plans are now completed for the annual fellowship breakfast sponsored by the Roseburg Council of Church Women.

Main speakers will be members of a three-woman international relations team representing Japan, Uruguay and India. Featured, also, on the program will be musical numbers presented by a ladies trio.

Preparation and participation for the day will be shared by women from the 12 church groups which are members of the Roseburg Council of Church Women. Mrs. Jack West is general chairman for the day.

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Judge Throws Out Suit Against Publication

EUGENE — Circuit Judge A. T. Goodwin Monday rejected a suit brought by a Ft. Rock rancher against the State Board of Higher Education, Oregon State College, and those responsible for publication of a state magazine called "Agricultural Progress."

The rancher is Phillip H. Pitman, who asserted that an article is about to be printed in the magazine which will be critical of possibilities of farm development in the Ft. Rock area of Lake County.

Judge Goodwin said Pitman had not described "one of the rare cases where injunctive relief prior to publication" was justified.

Goodwin said that while there might be recourse after the article is published, a prior injunction would amount to censorship.

No Animals Were Condemned Of 98 Slaughtered

No animals were condemned of 98 slaughtered during the pilot meat inspection program conducted in Douglas County. J. F. Short, director of the State Dept. of Agriculture, made this statement today in revealing results of this program conducted here earlier this year.

Three plants in Roseburg and Sutherlin were under continuous surveillance before and after slaughter inspection during this period.

Of the 98 animals slaughtered, 44 were cattle, 45 swine and 8 calves. Inspectors condemned 30 parts of these animals. These were 27 livers and 3 others. Eleven of the liver rejections were due to parasites in swine.

Pilot survey inspection teams also check unsanitary practices and conditions and help correct them under a program of continuous meat inspection.

The two teams conducting the pilot inspection program are now in eastern Oregon. All of western Oregon except Coos and Curry counties and all of central Oregon from The Dalles to the California border have been inspected.

Data gathered from the pilot inspection program in operation since last September will be presented to the 1957 legislature to aid it in determining the desirability, necessity and cost of a statewide compulsory meat inspection program.

Boy, 5, On Tricycle Crushed By Mixer Truck

PORTLAND — A 5-year-old boy, playing on his tricycle near a parked cement truck, was crushed to death Tuesday when the truck was moved.

He was Mark Allen Maybell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles G. Maybell.

Police said the truck driver told them that as he started the truck he heard a noise and that when he went to investigate he found the boy and tricycle crushed under the rear wheels.

Cutover, Burned Lands Reclassification Asked

SALEM — The state forestry department recommended the reclassification of 19,000 acres of cutover and burned forest lands in six counties.

This means the taxes on these lands would be reduced to five cents an acre in lieu of property taxes.

About one million acres of lands have been reclassified under the law.

The acreage involved in the new request by counties: Yamhill 2,188, Clackamas 3,293, Washington 2,609, Marion 3,448, Columbia 4,365, Douglas 3,064.

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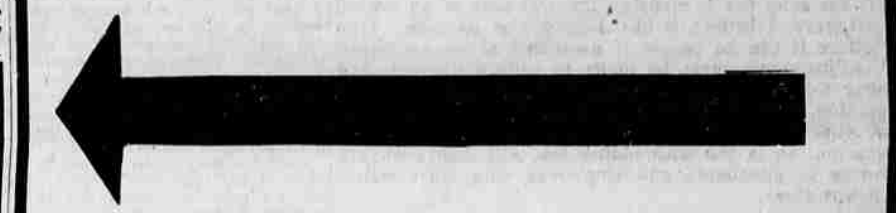
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SUBJECT: APRIL 19 ELECTION ON ONCE DEFEATED, UN-CHANGED AND NOW RESUBMITTED SCHOOL BUDGET

ISSUE: PRESENT SCHOOL POLICIES
(As stated by school board members when this budget was resubmitted)

OUR POSITION: A NO VOTE WILL ASSURE CITIZENS OPPORTUNITY TO WORK FOR THESE PURPOSES



Your Citizens' Association for Better Schools prepared the announcement appearing to the left of this message. Last Friday we delivered copies of our purposes to about 70 people. Saturday these were submitted for publication, and printed in the Monday, April 9 News Review. Previously these were published in news story form. Thus, our purposes were publicly announced BEFORE any of our members were informed of efforts of others to pass the once defeated and now unchanged and resubmitted school budget under the slogan "Save Our Schools."

The foregoing facts are set out, because, as you can see from the 10 purposes listed—and the compelling reason calling for an immediate evaluation—that we have not proposed anything that justifies any alarming claims that the resubmitted budget must be passed to save our schools. Such a slogan serves only to remind us of like past statements made by school administrators to parents and school children when previous budgets have been defeated.

We want to obtain a good education for all our children.

Voters and parents in discussions with each other, with our members and with school administration personnel have endeavored to call attention to several major items of school administration policies and programs requiring an examination, evaluation and corrective remedies to be taken. To date these people, who have endeavored to act exhaustively with independent thinking (and without acceding to any domination or intimidation) have necessarily had to act as individuals. As such their efforts have been ignored and abused. Accordingly, we have organized a Citizens' Association for Better Schools, not merely because of some matters concerning the present resubmitted budget but primarily for the purpose of working on a long range program.

We want to help assure all our children obtain a good education now and in the future.

There will be adequate time to revise and submit a new budget after the April 19 election, but we realize any savings made therein need not necessarily reduce any salaries or eliminate any courses or school services. No drastic or hasty changes should or can occur on a matter of such magnitude. Further, we feel future changes which can be made under the 10 points outlined in our purposes will serve to strengthen education and provide a harmonious community.

Our opportunity for primary service lies in the years ahead. Our past individual efforts have failed. We feel that by organization we can effectively work for accomplishment of our purposes. This once defeated, unchanged and resubmitted budget must be defeated to permit independent citizens and parents to effectively contribute constructive thoughts and efforts. Even now many of our own members who are parents of school children are justifiably afraid to publicly speak out against any portion of present school policies. School Board members themselves have stated that this vote is a test of present school policies.

Defeat of this resubmitted budget is most important as a test of all present school policies, attitudes and techniques and as an opportunity for our citizens to work together for better education without biased domination or abuse.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

Citizen's Association for Better Schools

WE HAVE FORMED AND ENDORSE A CITIZENS' ASSOCIATION FOR BETTER SCHOOLS, WHOSE AIMS AND INTENTIONS ARE:

1. To provide an association whereby people may freely express their opinions and desires relating to our schools.
2. To give more attention to the basic subjects of study.
3. To determine dollars and cents costs of the basic subjects, as well as each extra-traditional subject, the figures to include the total cost of teaching each subject as a separate unit.
4. To promote the economy of our schools and the most efficient use of our tax dollars, facilities, and bonding capacity.
5. To fully investigate the "Requirements and Recommendations" of the State Board of Education as to their effect on our school system, and to advise the public.
6. To urge the decentralization of control of our schools to the local School Board level.
7. To urge the construction of elementary schools in their natural walking attendances areas wherever practical.
8. To urge the use of school buildings as community center.
9. To examine and publicize the present school subjects, with the explanation of how they came into being.
10. To promote better understanding and harmony between the schools and the community.

A compelling reason why WE MUST MAKE AN EXAMINATION IMMEDIATELY of present educational policies is the fact that the district is facing a tremendous demand to provide additional classroom facilities for anticipated increase in enrollment at various levels within the next 3 to 5 years. We must provide sufficient and adequate classrooms for all our children.

This demands a decision — should we pay as we go or use bonds. In either event, actual annual costs will increase to pay for construction. In addition, there will be the increased costs of operating the additional physical plant.

Faced with this problem, we feel all reasonable people require an examination of all present costs to determine whether or not substantial savings (without impairing basic educational requirements) could be made during this critical period.

Unless we have more moderate and reasonable expenditures now, we face the possibility of an abrupt and drastic cut in facilities and program in the future. An adequate educational program must be assured for all children for all time.
