

Roseburg Ninth Largest, City Census Reveals

No 1950 federal census figure given to the city, which was incorporated in 1933. However, the Board of Census said the population increase now in the city limits is 29 per cent.

Several of the cities had made new counts after 1953 under a provision allowing cities to make population surveys to ask state aid in population surveys. They included: Canbyville, Elkhart, Myrtle Creek, Reedsport, Riddle, Sutherlin, Winston and Yoncalla. However, the figures are superseded by the new statistics.

By virtue of the figures, Myrtle Creek again became fourth largest city in the county.

Earlier this month, Winston city officials announced results of a special census which put the city's number of residents over that of Myrtle Creek. But the statistics again put Myrtle Creek on top.

Reedsport is the county's second largest city and Sutherlin in third. The survey shows Eugene and Salem are nearly the same size, with Salem still the second largest city in Oregon with 45,812. Eugene has 44,068. Portland is first with 404,880.

Others larger than Roseburg now are: Medford 20,083, Klamath Falls 18,300; Corvallis 17,900; Pendleton 15,500 and Springfield 13,250.

To reach the ninth ranking, the city outstripped Astoria, Bend, Albany, Baker and La Grande in population growth.

Other Southern Oregon cities showed these counts: Grants Pass 9,716, Ashland 8,597, North Bend 7,449 and Coos Bay 7,200.

BPA Power Line Extension Bids Opening Reported

Bids for work on the extension of a Bonneville Power Administration power line from Douglas County west into Coos County have been opened, according to L. A. Moore, Eugene district manager.

Apparent low bidder on construction of two additional sections of the Reston - Fairview 230,000-volt transmission line was North Idaho Construction Co. of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho. The bid for work on the 16 miles of line was \$115,638. Other bidders were: Power Line Erectors of Spokane, Wash., \$201,257; Wismer & Becker of Redding, Calif., \$204,598; K. C. Inc., \$204,598; Portland 1228, 495; Key Construction Co. of Tacoma, Wash., \$230,712; F. W. Wilder of Olympia, Wash., \$234,848; and Mid-Land Construction Co. of Baldwin Park, Calif., \$247,862.

The first section begins near Reston in Douglas County and extends westerly about five miles. The second section starts near Sitkum and extends westerly about 11 miles to the McKinley switching station in Coos County.

Six miles of 230,000-volt transmission line between the two sections was completed and energized at 115,000 volts in February. When the two new sections are completed and tied to the middle section, the entire Reston to McKinley 230,000-volt line will be placed in service at 115,000 volts.

Scheduled for the winter of 1957 when the Alvey to Reston section of the line is planned for completion. Bids on this section were let earlier this week.

Robin Dale School Re-organization Plans Under Way

Plans for the re-organization of Robin Dale School for Retarded Children are under way.

At a board of directors meeting held this week, it was decided that the school should be run by a board of directors of representative citizens from the Oakland, Sutherlin, Roseburg and Winston-Dillard areas.

The school will be separate from the Roseburg Assn. for Retarded Children, and the association can continue with its present plans, according to Richard Gates, special education director for School District 4.

The representatives attending the meeting from service, labor and civic groups and interested individuals heard the proposal to incorporate Robin Dale School as a non-profit educational institution to facilitate the development of the larger school plant for the coming year.

Gates stated that the class is full and children are on the waiting list. At least three and possibly four classes are needed for next year, he said. Between 40 and 50 mentally retarded children are in the Roseburg-Oakland-Dillard areas, and classes are needed to divide the groups into age groups so the older children can receive additional educational skills study and a program of training for employment.

Arrangements have been made for an expanded board of directors meeting on Monday, April 30. Planning for the meeting are Henry Miller, C. A. Dysinger, Ormond Feldkamp, M. E. Lusk, Tom Huebner, A. E. Gunderson, A. L. Loerts, Julian Helick, Mrs. Worth Davis and Mrs. Charles Brown.

Gates said the Central Douglas United Fund has been petitioned to accept Robin Dale School as a UF agency for the coming year.

It was pointed out that the parents of each child enrolled pay some tuition for their child. In cases where the parents cannot pay full tuition, it is supplemented with money donated for that purpose by individuals and organizations of the community, Gates explained.

Local Orchardist Dies After Illness

Arthur J. Tuck, prominent retired orchardist of Roseburg for many years, died this morning at a local hospital following a long illness.

He was born Aug. 20, 1870, in Exeter, Devonshire, England, and at the age of 12 came to the United States. He was married in 1892 in Buffalo, N.Y., to Mary Emma Goebelle, who died in 1943. They had two children, a son and a daughter, who died this year before Mrs. Tuck's death.

Mr. and Mrs. Tuck resided in Cleveland, Ohio, after their marriage until 1919, when they moved to Roseburg.

Survivors are two daughters, Mrs. Earl (Gladys) Clark of Le Roy, New York, and Mrs. Robert (Ruth) Seitz, Westport, Conn.; a son, Dr. Ralph Tuck, Salt Lake City, Utah; four grandchildren; and two great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at the Rest Haven Crematorium in Eugene at 10 a.m. Monday. The remains will be shipped to the Riverside Cemetery in Cleveland, Ohio. The Roseburg Funeral Home is in charge of arrangements.

A memorial service has been scheduled for Sunday, April 22, at the Roseburg First Methodist Church at 3 p.m.

Lesser Charge Against Wayne Fong Dismissed

PORTLAND — Dist. Atty. William Langley said Friday he will dismiss a lesser charge against Wayne Fong, who was freed of a murder charge Thursday by a judge's directed verdict of acquittal.

Fong, 27, also was charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor, 16-year-old Portland high school girl whose body was found in Southwest Washington early in 1954, after she had spent a night at the Fong home. She was a frequent baby sitter there.

Fong was accused of having a part in the girl's death, but he won acquittal just before the case was to go before a jury. Circuit Judge Frank Longmeyer ruled the state had not introduced enough evidence to substantiate its contention of Fong's guilt.

Fong also was accused of serving the girl alcohol the night before she disappeared. It is this charge which Langley said will be dropped. A similar charge is pending against Fong's wife, Sherry, who was convicted of second-degree murder in the girl's death. Mrs. Fong has appealed to the Oregon Supreme Court.

Cole Rejoins Concert Group; Ready To Forget

RALEIGH, N.C. — Nat King Cole was on the road in Dixie again today, anxious to leave behind the past the attack by a group of white men during a Birmingham, Ala., performance.

The Negro singer, rejoining a Southern concert tour here last night, said he was ready to leave behind, too, the "political situation" resulting from the incident.

"I'm crusading in my own way... I was not intending to become a politician," Cole said of an invitation from the National Assn. for the Advancement of Colored People to join "in the crusade against racism."

Roy Wilkins, executive secretary of the NAACP, wired Cole that the issue of racism "is a fight which none of us can escape."

In Birmingham, the misdeed or trials of four of the six men charged with assaulting Cole were recessed until Monday after testimony Friday by a police officer.

All four pleaded innocent. Most of the testimony by the officer was about the remaining defendants, who are accused of assault with intent to murder.

They are Kenneth Adams, 35, an official of the Anniston, Ala., White Citizens, and W. R. Vinson, 23, also of Anniston.

Adams and Vinson face preliminary hearings April 20. Police Officer H. Schatz, 28, testified that they ran through the heavily guarded Municipal Auditorium where Cole was presenting a concert Tuesday night and tried to drag the vocalist from the stage.

Executed Official Said Innocent

VIENNA — The Bulgarian Communist Party Saturday officially admitted the innocence of Traicho Kostov, former deputy premier and party secretary, who was executed in 1949 for alleged treason and "Titoism."

The announcement said that Kostov and his co-defendants were all convicted on faked evidence. Defendants who survived the big Stalin era purges in Bulgaria have now been released from prison and declared rehabilitated, the announcement said.

This confirmation of Kostov's rehabilitation, which had been unofficially reported from Bulgaria two weeks ago, was contained in a statement by Todor Zhivkov, first secretary of the Bulgarian Communist Party, which was published Saturday in the official party newspaper and broadcast by Sofia radio.

Dag Hammarskjold Fulfills Mission, He Tells Press

CAIRO, Egypt — U.N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold left Cairo Saturday with the optimistic statement that he had accomplished here on his peace mission "what I came to do."

Maj. Gen. Edson L. M. Burns, chief U.N. truce supervisor, said the secretary general expected to get a closer look at the Egyptian-Israeli border situation with a brief stop at Gaza in the Egyptian-held Gaza strip. He is en route to Beirut, Lebanon, where he has established a headquarters.

Meanwhile, scattered new incidents were reported by Israel, although relative quiet had eased the tension.

Near Beit Govrin, close to the Jordan border, the Israelis reported, an Israeli shepherd was ambushed and wounded.

Dag Hammarskjold talked again with Premier Gamal Abdel Nasser and more than an hour with Foreign Minister Mahmoud Fawzi.
