County Traffic Crashes Deal Injuries To Seven

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The Creek Hospital Saturday night after a head-on collision south of Myrtle Creek, police said. A car driven by Louis R. Hopkins of Rockport, Calif., and a pickup driven by Donald Lee Shelton, 24, Myrtle Creek, were involved. Passengers in the Hopkins car were his wife, Eula, and Albert W. Hopkins, 71.

Shelton received a laceration of the arm and possible shoulder injuries. Albert and Louis Hopkins received lacerations of the head, chest and shoulder injuries. Mrs. Hopkins has bruises and a laceration of the scalp.

Shelton was headed south and Hopkins north. No details of how the accident occurred were immediately available. A car registered to Peter Hellman of Longview, Wash., was found wrecked on Canyon Mountain south of Canyonville Saturday, police said, but the driver was not located. The car had hit a concrete post, gone into a ditch and rolled over. Officers said it appeared the driver may have gone to sleep. A check of hospitals showed no injuries had been treated.

Retiring School Board Chairman Honor Guest At Meeting Of AAUW

Saturday could well have been "education day" for the Roseburg chapter of AAUW.

In an action-packed session members endorsed the proposed school budget, elected officers for 1956-57, honored the retiring chairman of the Roseburg school board and heard from a national expert on education.

The budget endorsement came following a proposal from the association's executive board and was based on AAUW national belief (see story page 1). Election of officers found members casting a unanimous ballot for Mrs. Arthur Rich, president; Mrs. Russell Hagg, recording secretary; and Mrs. Ralph Patterson, corresponding secretary. The women will be installed in office in May.

Mrs. Mary Roberts, retiring school board chairman, drew a warm round of applause from more than 80 members and guests attending the session in the Woman's Club.

Attired in a navy blue dress, adorned with a red rose corsage presented her by education chairman, Mrs. D. W. McCarger, Mrs. Roberts had a few words for her hostesses. She noted that her work on the board of education had been rewarding and redeeming.

"I vastly admire the young people of our time," she said. She

said the school board believed "we are committed to give them the best public education that can be had along all lines." She said this included domestic science, music, athletics and others.

erning fire protection, police protection, sanitary requirements, building codes, etc. It is our deepest conviction that education standards are therefore more valuable since they pertain to the instruction of our children. The citizens of Oregon initiate and recommend the educational standards to the Legislature. We believe, therefore, that the Oregon State Legislature and State Dept. of Education are competent to adopt the minimum standards which should govern the activities and the opportunities for all children in the state on an equal level. The quality of our product, the high school graduate, will be in direct proportion to the effectiveness and acceptance of our educational standards.

All Citizens Should Vote

"We believe we are one of the few professions that require their members to take a further course and other advanced training in order to advance professionally and financially."

"We deplore the situation in Roseburg where so many citizens do not feel the obligation to vote on school issues. The money to schools and other services come from all persons in the district, whether by direct or indirect taxation. Therefore, after getting a full facts, each person should participate in school matters by voting."

"We further believe that a great disservice has been done to our children, teachers and the educational system in general, by the recent attacks on the school board, budget board and... administration. This type of approach is a problem that confronts us all does nothing to clear the air. It serves only to confuse the issues, and divides the community and children into factional groups."
