

4 Teachers Added To Riddle School Staff Next Year

Four new teachers have been added to the Riddle school staff for the 1956-57 year, according to Supt. Kenneth A. Stuart.

They are: Thomas T. Yano of Wailuku, Hawaii, Robert and Audrey Casebeer of Glendale and Mrs. Lucille Witmyer of St. Louis, Mo. Yano has been hired as a science teacher and assistant coach. He

has just completed work for his master's degree at the University of Oregon. He and his wife, Harriet, plan to move to one of the school-owned teacherages.

The Casebeers will be graduates of Southern Oregon College at Ashland this spring. Casebeer will serve as English-librarian instructor, and his wife will teach the sixth grade. Casebeer will take additional training this summer in library methods. Mrs. Casebeer will handle the grade school audiovisual materials, also.

Mrs. Witmyer has been named as a probable replacement for Mrs. Marguerite Karp, third grade teacher, who has resigned. Her teaching experience has been in

Kansas and Missouri.

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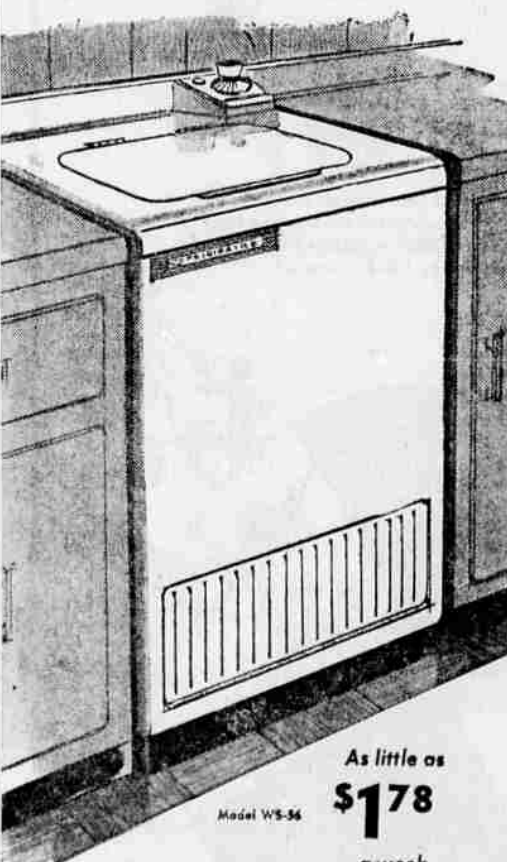

The PTA's annual fund raising project will be a smorgasbord dinner at the school Friday evening, April 20. Serving will be from 5

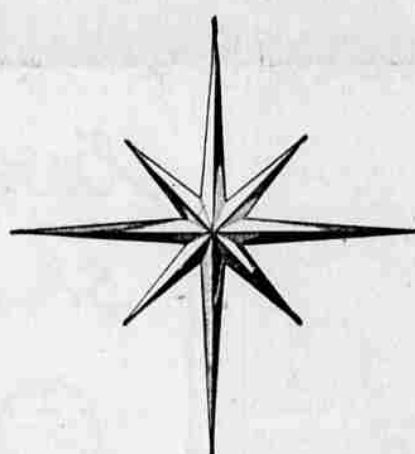
p.m. to 7 p.m. The general chairman for the affair is Mrs. Daisy Fox.
