In favor of defeat would not be dissuaded. They said policy and philosophy are definitely the stakes in the budget vote. Myers expanded the stakes to include "policy, taxation and the state's role." He called for a brake on the power the state holds through its financial assistance to local districts.

Those calling for passage of the budget did not agree the budget is the symbol of a test. In the summation of the stand of those who favor passage, Brittell said: "I think the schools are good, but I am not against taking a good look at them. But he said the budget should not stand or fall on that basis. 'A vote on school policy should stand by itself, not on the budget,' he said.

Luoma summed for the opponents of the budget. "We cannot get a proper evaluation unless we vote 'no,'" he said. The voters will either "endorse and perpetuate the present policies and problems" or show they want an evaluation.

Myers called for a reversal of a trend he said started after the Civil War away from fundamental education and toward more centralized control. Luoma said the trend "back to fundamental education might be achieved through a defeat of the budget."

He concluded that the opponents wanted a reappraisal and one step in that direction might be the formation of a "mutually agreeable" lay committee to study such a reappraisal after the defeat of the budget.

banked on both sides of the couple in the Throne Room, along with movie and television cameras; representatives of government; a small group of American, French and British reporters, and a few other guests.

The week-long wedding celebration which has drawn thousands to this Riviera pleasure spot will conclude Thursday with the religious ceremony in Monaco's Roman Catholic Cathedral. Actually the couple is married now according to French and Monaco law, but for the Catholic Church they will not be wed "in the eyes of God" until the church rites.

Later Thursday the couple will sail away on the Prince's yacht for a Mediterranean honeymoon cruise.

The civil ceremony was conducted in French by Marcel Portinier, Monaco minister of justice, in the glare of lights from the gridding cameras. In faint but distinct voices, Grace and the Prince answered "oui" as Portinier asked each in turn if they took the other as a mate.

There was no special reason why both civil and religious ceremonies could not have been held the same day, as they often are, but this marriage is a great event for Monaco and Monacans are living it up. By a 1918 treaty, Monaco would become French and Monacans subject to French taxes and the French draft if Rainier died without an heir.

The new princess looked delighted and happy, but a little dazed after the ceremony. She took a glass of champagne with three American reporters who were invited to the private apartment afterward. They wished her happiness. She smiled and replied and Prince Rainier came up and was also toasted.

After a round of champagne in the little apartment on the ground floor of the palace overlooking the Mediterranean, the bride couple came out on the balcony to be cheered by about 2,000 tourists and Monacans gathered in the plaza.

Both the prince and his new princess waved and smiled repeatedly to the cheering throng.

Just as they stepped out on the balcony, the sun came out for the first time in days. Before the sky had been gray and clouded, threatening rain.

#### Church Women Sponsor Annual Breakfast Meet

To an intent audience of 325, the theme of "Christ For the World" unfolded during the annual fellowship breakfast sponsored by Roseburg Council of Church Women Tuesday morning at the First Baptist church.

General chairman and mistress of ceremonies was Mrs. Jack West, who called on Mrs. Robert Hempel for the invocation. Special music was furnished by a ladies' trio composed of Mrs. Joe Deets, Mrs. Dale Lindsey and Mrs. Frank Moore, accompanied by Mrs. Homer Grow at the piano.

Welcome for the morning was brought by council president, Mrs. Arthur Lamka, who pointed out that this annual fellowship in Roseburg symbolizes Christian fellowship, unity and service. A group of church women of our community, during a short business meeting, Mrs. George Farrell of the Presbyterian Church was elected secretary of the council to replace Mrs. H. L. Lander who resigned.

General chairman of the general council was announced for Nov. 2.

Devotions were given by Rev. Valeria Cleveland, pastor of the Free Methodist Church. She traced the history of nations as mentioned in Scripture, from the account in Genesis of the dispersal of peoples and beginning of nations and diversity of language, to the New Testament account of the great "to teach all nations."

Main speakers on the program were introduced by Mrs. Ellsworth Tilton, a member of the three-woman international team currently visiting Roseburg. As they spoke briefly, each in turn held the undivided attention of the audience as they emphasized the theme.

Mrs. Kijo Tanaka, Nagoya, Japan, said that she had been studying with a portion of the history of Judaism as recorded in Isaiah. Her statements concerning Japan's dedication to the fighting of a "holy war" in the preservation of their worship of their Emperor and ancestral worship, she pointed out, was the result of spiritual vacuum brought about by their defeat.

Miss Violeta Cavallero of Montevideo, Uruguay, stressed the importance of personal responsibility and bringing Christ to the world, stating that each Christian was a missionary and each had a mission field.

Miss Eva Shipstone, Lucknow, India, pointed out weaknesses within the church which have hindered the effectiveness of missionary endeavor. Charging that Christians have clothed Christ with a Western culture, she challenged them to rethink their message and place Christ simply, without color or prejudices upon the crossroad of India.

have friendly relations with Britain, as well as the United States, France, and other countries.

"The interests of our people and the need to consolidate universal peace requires that relations between our countries be improved."

"Something has already been achieved, but much still lies before us. The road is a long one and may not be an easy road to travel."

"The social and political systems in our countries are different, but provided there is reasonable understanding of the fact that we have to live together on one planet, differences in political structure should not be a hindrance to us living as good neighbors cooperating actively to improve our relations."

Bulgarian and Khrushchev are here at Eden's invitation extended at last year's Big Four summit conference in Geneva. The British view the visit as a continuation of that policy.

#### Budget Election Qualifications, Precincts Listed

Any resident of Roseburg's School District 4 who has lived in the district for six months and has been legally registered 30 days prior to the date of election is eligible to vote in Thursday's school budget election. There is no provision in school elections for absentee ballots.

District 4 School Clerk V. J. Micelli pointed out Wednesday that the qualifications meant, for example, that a voter must have been registered by March 19 in order to vote. Election laws do not stipulate that a voter must be a property owner.

Voting will take place between the hours of 2 and 8 p.m. in eight precinct polling places. Micelli listed them as follows:

**Precinct 1**—Central Junior High School. For all legal voters from Umpqua, Benson, Lane, Deer Creek, East Mill and West Mill election precincts.

**Precinct 2**—Roseburg High School. Voters from Brown, North Brown, Fairhaven, Laurelwood, West Roseburg, Wharton, Park and Orchard election precincts.

**Precinct 3**—Riverside School. Voters from Edenbower East No. 1, 2 and 3, Edenbower West No. 1, 2 and 3, Huerfano and Newton Creek election precincts.

**Precinct 4**—Rose School. Voters from Hamilton, Woodward, Carter, Herman, Roseburg, Miller and that part of Parrott lying north of the junction of old Highway 99 and the present Highway 99 election precincts.

**Precinct 5**—Melrose School. For voters from Melrose election precinct.

**Precinct 6**—Green School. For voters from Green, West Green and that part of Parrott lying south of the junction of old Highway 99 and the present Highway 99 election precincts.

**Precinct 7**—Winchester School. For all voters from Wilbur and Winchester election precincts.

**Precinct 8**—Riversdale School. Voters from Garden Valley and Edenbower West No. 3 election precincts.

#### Free-Lance Jockey Winner Of \$64,000 On TV Quiz Show

**NEW YORK (AP)**—A free-lance jockey from California, riding a long shot named "Great Art and Artists," has won a \$64,000 television quiz show purse.

Bill Pearson, of Pasadena, Tuesday night became the fourth person to win the grand prize on the CBS show "The \$64,000 Question."

Pearson was required to scan six reproductions of portraits by great artists, to identify them as to subject and artist, and to name one man with whom each artist studied.

Pearson said his wife and friends had urged him to quit and not risk losing the \$32,000 he had already won. He said he had even promised his wife he would stop, so as to relieve her nervousness.

Turning to his wife in the audience, he said: "But I lied to you, honey. I'm going to take a chance."

Exercising the right of any contestant shooting for the grand prize, Pearson brought along an expert to assist him. He was Milton Shusterman, a first-class watercolorist and director of the Los Angeles County Art Society and professor of art at Scripps College, Claremont, Calif.

The NRA and all its successors constituted assaults upon our competitive system."

Justice Toole then continued that the court could "see no real and substantial connection between the nebulous theory that fixed minimum resale prices are necessary to protect the good will of the trade-mark owner and the welfare of the public."

Fair trade laws, he said, compel the public to pay higher prices in order to guarantee the retailer "a higher fixed, and often unreasonable profit."

"It is obvious," he wrote, "that the whole scheme of the law is one for private, rather than public gain; a scheme fostered by highly organized groups of distributors and retailers, interested not in the public weal, but only in their selfish ends. Manifestly, such a scheme bears no relation to the public morals, health, safety, or general welfare."

Joining Justice Toole in the opinion were Justice George Rossman, William C. Perry and Earl C. Latourette.

## World Brotherhood Need Stressed By Three Visitors

"The 19th century made the world a neighborhood. The last part of the 20th must make it a brotherhood."

Three women of an international "understanding" team were almost beseeching in their efforts to do their bit to achieve this goal Tuesday night at Central Junior High School.

The occasion was a public forum discussion sponsored by the Roseburg chapter of the American Assn. of University Women. Principal characters represented both East and West, welded into a single purpose — to achieve a better world through understanding of other peoples of that world.

It was a Uruguayan, Violeta Cavallero, who cited the need for "brotherhood" in its broad sense as a probable solution to the world's ailments. She said she also comes from a city of roses, Montevideo, which means to her that "despite our many differences, we are so much alike." She went on to say that "it is by sharing, that we are going to make a better world together."

A voice from the East carried a message which made it evident that understanding between the East and West is possible. It was the voice of Kijo Tanaka of Nagoya, Japan. She cited an "urgent need to tear down the iron curtain around our hearts and minds."

Eva Shipstone brushed quickly past the more general comments on world "brotherhood" to deal specifically with her India.

In her clipped British accent, she aimed quickly at wiping away the often sneared-upon word "neutrality" which has hung like a leech on India in recent months. She described it rather as "non-alignment." She went on to say: "Our aim is to live peacefully with all nations." (India has been chided recently by some voices from the West because of its apparently open-armed greeting of Russian and Red Chinese dignitaries.)

Miss Shipstone explained that the aims of "peace, justice and equality" were accepted by both India and the United States. She pleaded that the two "join together in freedom and peace."

She said India has strong convictions along these lines, but that such convictions are backed by "non-violent" means. "When it comes time to speak, India speaks in clear, incisive voice," she said.

After the opening statements by the three remarkable women, four local citizens released a barrage of questions at them.

Some of the most notable replies came from Mrs. Tanaka. She said: (1) Many Japanese do not think American occupation is contributing to good understanding between the two countries; (2) many also are opposed to rearmament; and (3) Communists are not making inroads in the country but may if Russia and China are "stimulated" by Japanese rearmament.

Both Miss Cavallero and Miss Shipstone contended that understanding cannot be achieved by a country hitting all the American populated centers and snapping pictures of anything that looks interesting.

Members of the questioning panel were Larry Platt, Patricia Mayo, Dr. James Miller and Kenneth Simon. Moderator was Mrs. Arthur McMullin. A Swiss-born citizen, state Rep. John Amacher, preceded the program with a re-

now is no access road to timber. The committee recommended BLM take immediate action to have a road constructed.

BLM men accompanying the committee on tours of the areas were Charles Fogelquist, road engineer; Virgil Heath, state supervisor; and Bud Vladimiroff, acting district forester.

In other road construction plans affecting Douglas County, Judge Hill said the court has been requested by the Siuslaw National Forest to rebuild the road on the north fork of Smith River at an estimated cost of \$240,000 and to realign and rebuild portions of the Five Mile Road leading to dumps near the coast. The proposal is designed to provide access to federal timber in the forest.

Hill said he and Ashley will meet with representatives of the forest in the near future to discuss the matter. The county should receive considerable assistance in amortizing costs of such a road, if it is rebuilt, Hill said.

Also, about two miles of Loon Lake Road must be rebuilt because of BLM sales being made in that area which will result in millions of feet of timber being hauled out in the next year, Hill said. Estimated cost is \$50,000.
