RUNOFF WATER CAUGHT — EPHRATA, Wash. (AP) — Heavy runoffs have contributed water worth more than \$40,000 to the Columbia Basin Reclamation project, irrigation Supervisor Edgar H. Neal said Tuesday. "We have caught about 150,000 acre-feet of runoff water in our canals and reservoirs since last fall. That water would cost about 30 cents an acre-foot if we had to pump it from the Columbia River at Grand Coulee," Neal said.

David, 6-month-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Green, entered a Canyonville hospital for medical treatment recently.

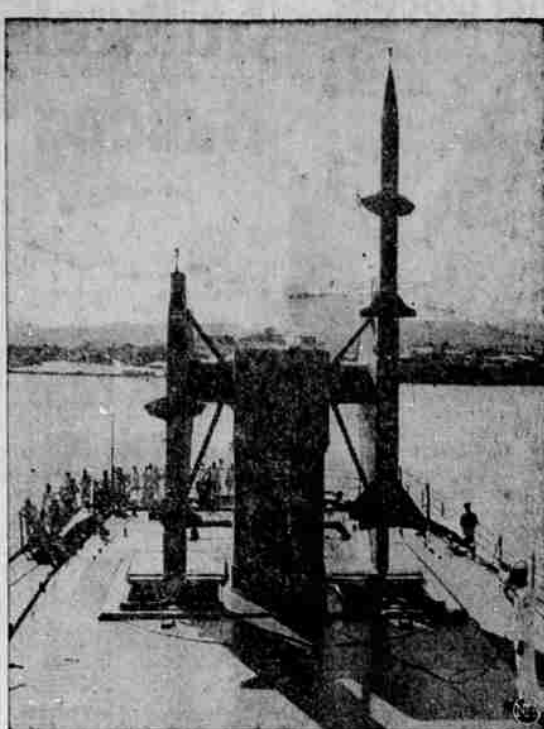

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SCHOOL PARENTS SPEAK

We are a few of the Roseburg parents who feel our children are being well educated in the Roseburg School system. We further feel the budget under consideration asking for support of our school system is in line with present day costs and is based on sound planning and judgment.

TO NOTE

your increase in taxation . . . first get your property evaluation for 1955 (see your tax statement or call the county assessor). Your probable mill levy on this year's budget is 64.0 mills. Then multiply your assessed property evaluation by .064 and your total will be your approximate property tax for 1956.

NEXT YEARS SCHOOL BUDGET IS MADE FOR 5,569 PUPILS HOUSED IN 16 DIFFERENT SCHOOL PLANTS AND IN ABOUT 24 DIFFERENT BUILDINGS

The average cost to educate each school student is \$422.91. The average cost for the increased number of students and the increased amount to be balloted on tomorrow is \$11.57 per pupil LESS than in 1955. Remember the cost per pupil will be less even though two years separate the figures quoted in spite of increased wages, over all prices and general overhead expenses.

WHY MORE TAXATION THEN?

1. We have scheduled in the first to sixth grade level 14 additional teachers for the additional 321 children. This is equivalent to a 12-room building.
2. Maintenance costs of this additional enrollment are in proportion.
3. Other items such as repairs, overhead and replacement are increased but the cost is lowered to only \$308.00 per child.
