Late Registrations Swamp Clerk's Office

Workers in the county clerk's office are still wading through a mass of registration papers following Tuesday night's deadline for sign-up to vote in the primary election. It will be about two weeks before registration totals will be completed.

Mrs. Arthur Wilkin, deputy in the elections department of the office, said approximately 500 voters signed up between 5 and 10 p.m. Tuesday. The office planned to stay open from 5 to 8 p.m. to accommodate late-comers, but a long lineup kept four workers jumping until 10 p.m.

At National Labor Relations Board hearing March 27, Harris and Clyde de Witt, financial secretary, denied Morgan's authority to act in accordance with the directive from the president, Morgan says.

Other officers named defendants in the suit are Charles Letts, treasurer; Charles Albel, president; Josh Clark, conductor; and Ralph Wagner, vice president. Also mentioned in the complaint are trustees Merlin Catterlin and J. Scott.

Morgan asks that the defendants be ordered to turn over all records and property, including funds, to him as general representative of the LSW. He also seeks to have the officers act in their capacity as officers of the LSW in accordance with powers entrusted to the plaintiff, that the officers be restrained from drawing any funds on deposit for the union, that the bank turn over funds on deposit and that the plaintiff have judgment against the officers if the funds and records are not delivered.

Among other things, Morgan alleges the bank account of Local 2624 was depleted from \$4,300 to about \$500 between March 3 and March 23, and funds were put in a safety deposit box under Letts' name.

Prince had trouble putting the ring on her finger. Grace helped him. She had no trouble with the ring she gave him.

Once she gulped and appeared near tears. That was when the Most Rev. Gilles Barthe, Roman Catholic Bishop of Monaco, reminded the couple of their responsibilities as a married couple. Thursday's ceremony was kissless, as was Wednesday's.

The 26-year-old Oscar winner and the 32-year-old ruler of this 370-acre principality answered "oui" quietly as Bishop Barthe asked each in turn the key question: "Do you take this?"

Rainier twiddled his thumbs and fingers and once had to briefly untangle himself from the sword that hung from his powder blue pants. Only once during the ceremony did the Prince steal a glance at his beautiful bride. This was toward the end, and he flashed him a quick, breathless smile.

Grace maintained her icy calm even when the 3½ yard long train to her dress caught on her chair. She didn't even flicker one of her lovely eyelids when 6-year-old page boy Sebastian von Furstenberg dropped her ring at the beginning of the rite.

The Rev. Francis Tucker, Rainier's American chaplain from Wilmington, Del., darted up in this minor emergency, recovered the ring from the floor of the red-carpeted cathedral and steadied the little page with a smile.

Father Tucker, in fact, stage-managed the entire wedding as he partly stage-managed the entire romance between Grace and Rainier. He was constantly at the elbow of Grace and the Prince telling them with whispered asides quick gestures when to stand, kneel and pray.

The ceremony—scheduled to take an hour—went over the limit by only three minutes.

When it was over, the couple entered an open cream and black Rolls Royce—both smiling broadly for the first time since the ceremony began. He tugged at his collar and she leaned over to him. They appeared relaxed and waved as crowds cheered their progress under a bright sunny sky.

They are expected to leave, perhaps Thursday night, for a Mediterranean honeymoon aboard Rainier's yacht, Deo Juante II.

Grace told friends Wednesday night after the busy rounds of entertainment: "I'll be glad to get on that yacht."

RC Fund Drive Discussed Today At Breakfast

The continuing Red Cross fund campaign was discussed this morning at a breakfast meeting of RC directors and campaign chairmen.

It was announced that one-third of the goal, \$7,971.05, had been reached, reports John Sutherland, western Oregon RC field director. He said that although the fund campaign is lagging badly, it will be continued.

Sutherland went to the Glendale area today to review the flood damage there and said that the Red Cross is still working on many disaster cases in Douglas County due to the floods.

He reported that over \$8,000 has already been spent and more work was still to be done to alleviate flood damage. He noted that the total spent to help flood victims was over the amount received thus far in the fund drive.

Sutherland pointed out that only two things, service to the military personnel and disaster work, are required under the Congressional charter of the Red Cross. If the goal is not reached, he said, all other activities, such as the bloodmobile program, water safety and first aid classes, will have to be abandoned.

that unless he fired Purcell, "we'll have to look elsewhere to put our support for mayor."

Sheriff Terry Schunk, candidate for mayor who has been endorsed by the Teamsters, said he had made no deals: "I've always had the support of all labor."

Purcell said he had asked for Schunk's removal because reports reaching him suggested he should be removed. The union endorsed Schunk, he said, because of hope of improved enforcement.

John Patrick Hannon, an attorney, said he had told Langley in the course of the Wayne Fong trial—Hannon was defense attorney in that murder case—that the Teamsters had put up the money to elect Langley.

Langley said the union had endorsed him and spent some money in the campaign, but that was all there was to it. "I have been dragged into this," said Langley, "because of my refusal to bow to... underworld elements."

Both the Oregonian and the Oregon Journal in their Thursday editions pointed to the pinball industry as a central point in the various charges.

The Teamsters Union engaged some time ago in organizing the industry. Its representatives, speaking before the City Council on the question of outlawing the machines, said that if the machines were made illegal, many jobs would be lost. However, the council did outlaw them.

Police Chief Jim Purcell, commenting on the various statements, said: "Illegal operations in this city have dried up completely.... It looks as if we are going to have a more interesting city election than I had imagined."

Israel, Egypt Agree To Cease Fire Terms

forces of either party, including nonregular forces, shall commit any warlike or hostile act against the military or paramilitary forces of the other party, or against civilians in territory under the control of that party; or shall advance beyond or pass over for any purpose whatsoever the armistice demarcation line set forth in article 6 of this agreement, and elsewhere shall not violate the international frontier, or enter into or pass through the waters within three miles of the coastline of the other party."

Hammarskjold headed to the Middle East under Security Council orders to seek an easing of tension. He has conferred in Cairo with Premier Gamal Abdel Nasser and in Israel with Premier David Ben-Gurion.

The agreement is the major result announced thus far in his peace mission. Political sources had forecast a cease-fire agreement and expected it to be announced Wednesday night.

Ben-Gurion met with his cabinet Thursday morning to discuss the progress of his talks with Hammarskjold. They opened their conferences Tuesday. Israeli sources said the talks had brought about "very good progress" toward evolving means of reducing border friction.

mary where he is unopposed on the Democratic ballot. Gov. George M. Leader and other top Democratic chiefs are supporting Stevenson in the state.

Eisenhower's name is entered in the Republican primary in Pennsylvania where he owns a farm at Gettysburg.

Nixon's reference to the role Democrats have played in achieving "great prosperity" in this country appeared to follow the tone of what Eisenhower said about the Democrats during his campaign kickoff speech Monday night to a GOP gathering in Washington.

Eisenhower said then Democrats, as well as Republicans, are loyal to the United States, devoted to freedom and concerned about national security and the popular welfare. Where Democrats and Republicans part company, he said, is on the methods of reaching the desired objectives.

Nixon said last night the difference between the Eisenhower administration and the Truman and Roosevelt administrations lie in what the vice president described as "how we achieve" such goals as better schools, housing, jobs and medical care.

"The administrations which immediately preceded the Eisenhower administration... assumed in virtually every instance that federal government action was the answer to all social and economic problems," Nixon asserted. "We, in this administration, have exactly the opposite point of view."

In Washington, meantime, Democratic officials were finishing arrangements for a two-day rally opening in the capital tomorrow. In advance of that meeting, Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.) said he thinks the Democratic platform this year will have to express "concern in and support of" the Supreme Court's decree against racial segregation in the public schools, and its subsequent implementing order.

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Airmen's Flight Establishment Probable Here

Establishment of an airmen's flight, with training for pay, may take place in Roseburg within the next few weeks, it was announced at an Air Force Reserve meeting Wednesday night.

Lt. Col. Theodore H. Wirak, commander of the 9415th Squadron, said minimum strength for such a flight would be five airmen of the first three grades (master sergeant, technical sergeant and staff sergeant), with the possibility of airmen first class also being eligible.

The airmen would train separately from the unit now established here, Flight A of the 9415th Squadron. Training would be in non-commissioned officer leadership.

Colonel Wirak said that all airmen interested in such a program should attend the next meeting of Flight A, on April 25, at which time plans will be outlined. Airmen not now members of Flight A are especially urged to attend, he said.

At Wednesday's meeting, Wirak spoke on the recently adopted military code of conduct which was formulated after studies of Korean prisoner of war cases.

Capt. R. M. Beardsley, flight commander, conducted the meeting. Charles S. Woodrich of Roseburg, a veteran of World War II, applied for assignment to the flight.

Thunderous Blast Wrecks Huge New Amonia Plant

MARCUS HOOK, Pa. (AP)—A thunderous blast minutes after midnight wrecked the Sun Oil Co.'s new ammonia plant at its Marcus Hook refinery early Thursday, injuring eight persons and causing damages estimated at about three million dollars.

The blast shot flames 200 feet into the air. The shock waves it threw off were felt for 20 miles.

Four buildings, a 75-foot all-steel structure and other units on the plant site of about three acres, were ripped apart by the shattering explosion.
