Only Three Sites Said Logical For Big Center

PORTLAND—The commission which has been trying for many months to decide on a site for Portland's proposed 8 million dollar sports center, was told Wednesday only three of several proposed sites are logical.

Architects, hired to study the sites, said the South Auditorium, the Broadway-Steel Bridge and the Buckman Field sites were all right.

The Delta Park-Vanport site is not suitable, nor is the Oaks Park site, the report said.

Delta Park-Vanport already had been ruled out because the City Council owns the land and won't give it to the commission. The Oaks Park site is partly under water and too hard to get to, the report said.

Inverness Golf Course, on the Columbia River, also is not suitable, the commission was told.

The commission has selected the South Auditorium site on the west side of the Willamette River, but it is under attack by east side residents.

Fried Chicken Market Value Noted In Stores

Crisp, golden-brown, fried chicken, that American favorite, again will appear on the tables of many value-conscious housewives this weekend.

One big chain will feature this item at 39 cents a pound, down from 45, and similar reductions will reveal elsewhere.

Small turkeys and beef round roast will share the spotlight at reductions of about 4 cents. Another big chain will offer pork chops at attractive buys.

Sirloin steak and lamb, however, are generally higher. Eggs are down a cent or two while butter is about unchanged.

Onions continue the only outstanding buy among vegetables, outside Southern growing areas. As spring gets underway, however, such vegetables as cabbage, pascal celery, sweet potatoes, iceberg lettuce and spinach are in the category of good buys. Corn is on the high side but is coming down. Maine old potatoes can be classed as good buys but they're rising. Oranges and grapefruit are good buys even though they're higher than last week.

Moderate-priced items include apples, cucumber and bunched beets. Cauliflower is on the high side.

Cantaloupe is considered a moderate buy but the supply of this is still being shipped from Mexico. Asparagus, strawberries and squash are moderate.

Laborite Urges Britain To Do Whiskey Selling

LONDON—Laborite R. B. Stokes urged the Conservative government to take over the sale of Scotch whisky to the United States. He claimed the distillers are not charging all the traffic will bear, and are thus losing valuable dollar exchange.

Bureau Head Says Soil Bank Plan Now Too Late

SALEM—It is too late for a soil bank law to benefit Oregon farmers this year because most crops are planted, Gerald Detering, Harrisburg, president of the Oregon Farm Bureau Federation, said Wednesday.

After voting the farm bill, President Eisenhower asked Congress to pass a straight soil bank bill. Such a bill, Detering said, would benefit only those farmers who plant in the fall.

Detering blamed both political parties for the delay in passing the farm legislation.

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
