sum of \$41,460, it includes custodial salaries, heat, water, lights, telephone and janitorial supplies.

Maintenance and repair — \$10,320. The amount was boosted by \$990 over the current figure.

Auxiliary agencies — \$76,130. This item was increased by \$1,832. It covers transportation, health supplies and operation of cafeterias.

Fixed charges — \$22,900. A \$2,800 decrease in this expenditure came because of a reduced fire insurance rate. The current amount was \$25,700.

Capital outlay — \$20,029. The item was reduced by \$1,652 over the current figure of \$21,781. Included in capital outlay expenses are band instruments, a section of roll-away bleachers, additional classroom seats in Douglas, and for installation of a watering system and landscaping at Douglas.

Bonds and interest — \$105,790, a decrease of \$1,550.

The boy, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leo Cochran Sr., died a half hour later at a hospital here.

The accident occurred on a highway just west of Corvallis near the Cochran home.

### Public Hearings Set On 2 School Boundary Change

Requests concerning two minor proposed boundary line changes in school districts have been received by the Douglas County Boundary Board.

A public hearing on one, which finds residents of a small area in Myrtle Creek School District 19 seeking incorporation with Canyonville District 8 which it adjoins, has been set for May 9 at 10 a.m. It will be held in the county court's hearing room in the court-house.

The sliver of land in question lies in the bend of the South Umpqua River, south and west of the bridge near the area formerly housing Ford's Cafe. Boundary Board Secretary Kenneth F. Barneburg said a petition requesting the hearing was circulated by D. W. Gill, Canyonville businessman.

Gill and several neighbors seek to send their children to the school in the town where the parents work. Barneburg said it was the first time the board had had requests concerning the particular transfer. Date for the public hearing was set this week. At the hearing, any persons are invited to appear before the board and speak for or against the change.

Barneburg, county school superintendent, said a minor revision request is not "unusual."

No date has been set for a hearing concerning a request in a change in the boundary of Days Creek District 15 and the Canyonville district. A petition is being prepared by Barneburg and will be mailed to Ted Ross, who requested it, soon.

Ross seeks a line switch which would place the Hoskins Donation Land Claim, some two miles east of Canyonville, in District 15. In his request, Ross said persons working in Canyonville and with children attending school there, would like to continue sending students to District 15, although they were moving just outside the district.

Barneburg noted petitions have already gone out to county residents who seek consolidation of the Tiller and Days Creek school districts. No election date on the proposed merger can be set until they are returned, he said. If the merger is approved, its proponents plan to build a new high school.

### Jury Establishes Claim For Injury

A circuit court jury of seven women and five men deliberated about half an hour Thursday afternoon before returning a verdict to Judge Charles S. Woodrich following a done-day trial in Courtroom B.

Plaintiff George Moreland was found to be entitled to an award of permanent partial disability equal to 39 per cent loss of use of his left foot. The defendant, State Industrial Accident Commission, had awarded 25 per cent, but Moreland sought 60 per cent.

Moreland was injured Nov. 8, 1954, while working for George Wilson Logging Co., when a heavy tractor spring fell on his left leg. Judge Woodrich is scheduled to be in Gold Beach next week to try Curry County cases. Curry, Coos, Douglas and Lane counties are in the Second Judicial District.

### President Gets Campaign For Re-election Started

he termed "the diminution of the President's ability and willingness to fulfill his duties."

In Washington, James A. Finnegan, the manager of Stevenson's campaign for the Democratic presidential nomination, referred to Eisenhower last night as "a chief of state who reigns but does not govern."

Kefauver, vying with Stevenson for the Democratic presidential nomination, said in San Diego, Calif., yesterday that the Eisenhower administration is devoted, in his words, to "the benefit of big business." Describing his own philosophy, Kefauver said it is aimed at furthering the "general welfare of the average people."

GOP Chairman Hall, speaking after Finnegan at a Washington dinner for members of the American Society of Newspaper Editors, praised what he said was Eisenhower's "courage and rugged honesty" in vetoing the farm bill last Monday.

Then, lauding his party's position on civil rights, Hall derided what he said was Democratic disunity on the question. He said: "On desegregation, Kefauver said 'Go fast,' New York Gov. Averell Harriman said 'Go faster,' and Stevenson said 'Let's talk about something else.'"

Watkins fired his shafts at Truman—and Stevenson—in a Senate speech. He stated yesterday that both Democratic leaders have contended that under the Truman administration the national debt was reduced by 12 billion dollars, but that under the Eisenhower administration the debt has risen by the same amount.

(June) Smith, Saratoga, Calif.; and Miss Betty Stanek, Roseburg; a sister, Mrs. Anna Burch, Madison, Wis.; seven grandchildren, and one great-grandchild.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of Long and Orr Mortuary Saturday at 2 p.m., with Dr. James Millar of the First Presbyterian Church officiating. Following services here, her body will be sent to San Jose, Calif., for vault interment at Oakhill Cemetery.

### Sutherlin Budget Figure Sliced

The Sutherlin city budget committee has sliced \$1,768.87 from this year's expenditures in its 1956-57 edition of the budget, according to the Sutherlin Sun.

The budget figure approved by the committee this week was \$81,309.50 for the 1956-57 year. General fund expenditures were estimated at \$78,891.50 and receipts at \$32,650. This leaves \$46,041.50 to be raised by levy.

The committee also noted a decrease in the bonded indebtedness. The figure is expected to drop from the present \$1,996,500 to \$823,500, the Sun says.

### School Budget Again Rebuffed, 2,366 To 1,566

Thursday count came July 14, 1954. That day district residents balloted for the third time on the proposed 1954-55 budget. They passed it by a 2,326-1,019 count.

The vote yesterday followed an intensive campaign by two groups, one favoring budget passage, the other opposing. Both favored a re-evaluation of school practices, following the election.

A few days later a Save Our Schools committee sprang to life. Its members sought budget approval with an examination of school policy to follow. Both groups had comments to make Friday (see other story).

### Defendants Win Jurors' Verdict In Accident Suit

A circuit court jury returned a verdict in favor of the defendants Thursday night at the conclusion of a four-day trial which grew out of a fatal accident on Highway 101 last summer.

The suit was against Pacific Greyhound Lines and driver Clarence A. Bankhead. Marietta Fleck, widow of Verne M. Fleck, 51, who was killed in the mishap, sought \$20,000 for wrongful death.

The jury of eight women and four men deliberated more than five hours before returning its verdict to Judge Carl E. Wimberly.

Four suits still are pending in connection with the accident in which Fleck, who resided at Coos Bay, and Calvin F. Crass, 43, Empire, were killed. Injured were the bus driver and Woodrow Matson, Edward Clark and Walter Olson, all from the bay area.

The accident occurred on a detour about nine miles south of Winchester Bay on July 26, 1955. The location was just inside Douglas County.

In her suit, Mrs. Fleck's attorneys, from North Bend, contended the bus was over the center line at the time it collided with a station wagon carrying the five men. The defense attorneys, from Coos Bay, claimed the station wagon was the one in the wrong lane of traffic.

Various persons at the scene, including police and Bankhead, testified during the trial, and a long deposition from one passenger on the bus was read into the record. One afternoon of the trial was devoted to a trip to the coast so that jurors could see where the accident occurred.

### Haskell F. Wyatt, 66, Dies At VA Hospital

Haskell F. Wyatt, 66, died April 20, at the Roseburg Veterans Hospital. He was a resident of Grants Pass.

He was born Jan. 5, 1890, in McKinney, Texas, and was a veteran of World War I.

Surviving are six brothers, Erb, Henry A. and Luther Wyatt, all of Grants Pass; Leland of Norman, Okla.; Walter of Enid, Okla.; and Leslie of Everett, Wash., and a sister, Mrs. Oliver Hickey, Grants Pass.

The body has been removed to The Chapel of the Roses, and funeral arrangements will be announced later.

### \$25 Million Cut From Ike's Overseas Budget

The Judiciary and the USIA. The recommendations of the committee are subject to action by the full House and Senate. House consideration is scheduled for next week.

The total recommended is \$56,802,448 less than Eisenhower sought for all the agencies, but is \$46,794,137 more than they received for the current year.

The State Department's budget was cut \$9,700,548. Included in its allotment of \$171,506,737 was \$33,830,875 for payment of the U. S. share of expenses of international organizations, mainly the United Nations; \$1,906,000 for the U. S.-Mexico Boundary and Water Commission, and two million dollars for work on the Rama Road linking Central America with the United States.

The Justice Department was allotted \$215,965,000, a cut of \$19,915,000 from Eisenhower's requests. The FBI was granted the entire \$95,510,000 it requested.

Rejected were requests of the immigration service for funds to build 34.3 miles of fence along the Mexican border and of the federal prison system for 17 million dollars to build a close custody reformatory for youthful offenders and a maximum security prison for more hardened criminals.

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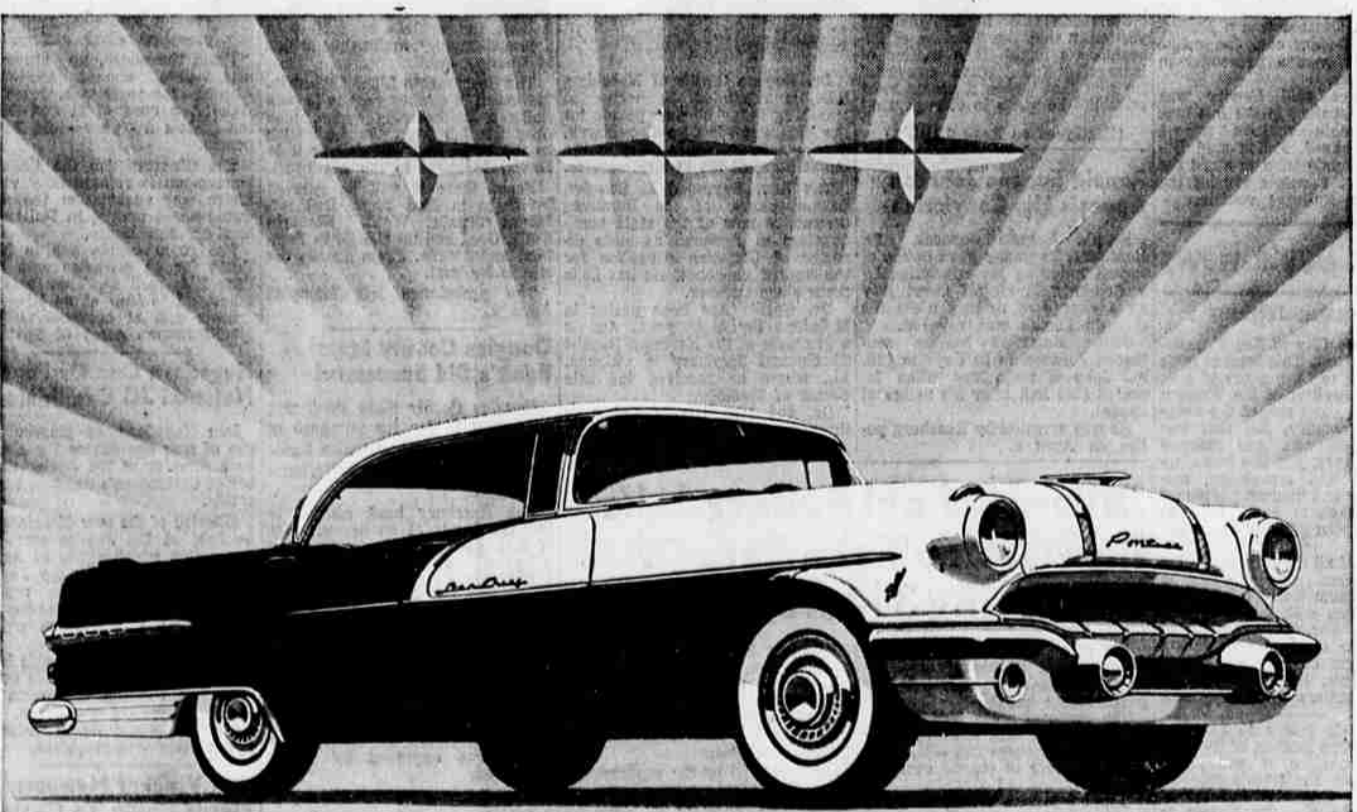
