

Edwin R. Sutton Passes Sunday

Edwin R. Sutton, 88, former resident of Roseburg, died at Loveland, Colo., April 22. He was born at Red Oak, Iowa, Feb. 21, 1867, and was married at Emerson, Iowa, on May 7, 1888, to Anna May Burton, who preceded him in death on Jan. 2, 1950.

He came to Roseburg in 1934 from California and moved to Loveland to make his home with his son several years ago.

Surviving are two sons: Harold Sutton, Loveland, Colo., and Vance Sutton, Redding, Calif.; a daughter-in-law, Mrs. John Sutton, Roseburg; one brother, L. M. Sutton, McMillan, Tex.; 14 grandchildren and 29 great-grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held in the chapel of Long and Orr Mortuary Thursday at 2 p.m., with the Rev. Newell Morgan of the First Christian Church officiating. Concluding services and interment will follow in the IOOF Cemetery.

CHICAGO (U)—A 2-year-old who fell against the gas pedal of his mother's car set off a chain reaction that killed an older boy playing behind a six-foot brick wall.

Mrs. Winifred Breakey, 36, told police she was driving her three children home from church when the youngest, James, fell to the floor and struck the accelerator. The car bounced over a curb and struck the brick wall at the entrance to the Trumbull Park housing project on the Far South Side. Flying bricks killed James Buchanan, 9, behind the wall.

Mrs. Breakey was charged with reckless homicide.

French Planes Batter Rebels In Algeria

ALGIERS, Algeria (U)—More than 30 French planes machine-gunned two big rebel bands for two hours Sunday in the Tlemcen area of Algeria near the Moroccan frontier, French sources said Monday.

The bands were described as "completely disorganized" by the attack. In accordance with a new French policy, no figures were given for rebel or French casualties.

At the weekend, there were unofficial reports of at least 120 rebels killed, most of them in the Constantine area at the eastern end of Algeria.

Two Gunmen Killed, 3rd Wounded In Trap

PARKERSBURG, W. Va. (U)—Two gunmen were slain and a third was wounded Saturday when a police ambush in a darkened bakery here erupted into a blazing gun battle.

Shot to death were Eddie Taylor, 54, Parkersburg, and Dearnman Lott, 44, Palestine, W. Va.

Lt. J. Norman Mehl, head of the Parkersburg Detective Bureau, identified the wounded man as Ronnie Roberts, about 21. Found outside the bakery, where he had crawled despite shotgun wounds in the chest, he was reported in satisfactory condition today.

The officers were tipped that a ring of safecrackers planned to move in on the bakery.

FIRE WREAKS HAVOC

FUKUI, Japan (U)—Four thousand persons lost their homes today in a fire which destroyed 600 of 2,700 houses in the hot spring resort town of Awaramachi, 11 miles north of here. One person was killed, one was missing and about 20 injured.

Male Bears Kill Two Cubs In Portland's Zoo

PORTLAND (U)—Hundreds of spectators watched in horror Sunday as five vicious male bears attacked and killed two cubs brought out by their mother from a hidden den at Washington Park zoo.

Zoo keepers were unable to save the cubs because they could not get inside the enclosure for fear of being attacked themselves. The mother bear tried to protect the cubs, tucking them under her fore paws and slapping at the attackers.

When one of the cubs was snatched away and killed, the mother grabbed the other one and placed it on a rock, pacing below to ward off the savage males. Finally the other cub was knocked down and killed.

They were the first cubs born at the zoo here in 10 years, and had been hidden by their mother to protect them. Sunday was the first time attendants knew there were cubs in the bear den. They were about two months old.

Eastern Oregon, Idaho Area Facing Threats Of Floods

Unseasonably cold temperatures dominated the nation's weather Monday as the mercury skidded more than 20 degrees over wide areas of the Midwest.

Frost and freezing temperature warnings were issued for portions of Nebraska, Iowa, Kansas and Missouri.

Blustery winds continued to stir dust clouds in the Texas Panhandle and adjacent portions of Colorado, New Mexico and Oklahoma.

Meanwhile, volunteers worked to bolster dikes in Idaho and Eastern Oregon as snow in the mountains of the Pacific Northwest began to thaw, filling rivers to near flood stage levels.

The Weather Bureau said colder air moving into the region could slow up the thawing process somewhat. No major floods were reported yet.

The most immediate threats were to the towns of St. Maries and Cataldo in North Idaho and at Blackfoot in the south. Army Engineers have warned there may be floods later at Bonners Ferry, Lewiston and Weiser in North Idaho, and in communities along the upper Snake River across the southern part of the state.

In Eastern Oregon, the Powder River at Baker was reported almost at flood stage.

The Coeur d'Alene River spilled into basements at Cataldo and water in the St. Joe River rose 18 inches in 24 hours at St. Maries.

Crews worked on the dikes of the Blackfoot River at Blackfoot, where 100 homes and a new school house were in danger.

Water in North Idaho's Kootenai River—always a threat in the spring—had risen more than a foot in two days, but the river was not expected to reach flood stage for another two or three weeks.

Interment will follow at the Masonic Cemetery in Canyonville. Ritualistic services will be under the auspices of the Glendale Masonic Lodge.

Picked On' Boy Slays Parents, Elder Brother

MANSFIELD, Conn. (U)—An 11-year-old boy, aiming awkwardly because of poor eyesight, shot to death his mother, father and elder brother. He told police they picked on him and he feared he would be sent to reform school.

Fifth-grader Robert Curgenven said he shot and killed the three Saturday at the family's rural home here, 30 miles east of Hartford. He slept in the farmhouse that night, then reported the killings to his teacher Sunday morning.

One night last week his father spanked him because he wouldn't put out his bedroom light and go to sleep, Robert said.

After telling his story to police, Robert was committed to the state hospital at Norwich for a 30-day mental examination.

Turkish Officer Killing Threatens Cyprus Riot

NICOSIA, Cyprus (U)—A fleeing gunman Monday shot dead a Turkish Cypriot police constable in the heart of Nicosia's teeming Turkish quarter.

Fearing the incident might spark rioting between Turks and Greeks, British troops threw massive roadblocks around most of Nicosia's inner city.

Sullen and muttering Turkish crowds gathered on streetcorners as traffic in central Nicosia came to a virtual standstill.

The shooting followed an earlier attempt to assassinate a Greek Cypriot plainclothesman. Three youths fired at him, missed and fled.

The Turkish policeman, identified as Nihad Vassif, 22, chased them, caught one and grappled with him. The youth tossed a pistol to a companion, who shot Vassif at close range.

He was the second fatality of the day and the 74th in the year-old campaign of violence for union of this British-ruled island with Greece.

Earlier, a British soldier died of wounds received when a military patrol was ambushed east of Limassol during the night.
