MANILA, P. I. — The Philippines' only woman legislator, Sen. Pacita Madrigal Gonzalez, was formally charged today with misusing \$157,000 in U. N. and Philippine government welfare funds.

The 38-year-old woman was accused of falsifying police documents and diverting funds and property of the U. N. International Children's Emergency Fund, the U. N. Appeal for Children and the Philippine Social Welfare Administration.

Reunited Father, Daughter To Tour Douglas County

Life at the Lowell Atterbury home in Roseburg is "about back to normal." There was a time, less than a month ago, when all wasn't calm.

On April 3 Mrs. Atterbury left by plane for Chicago to meet her father whom she'd not seen in more than 25 years. That reunion took place at Chicago's Midway Airport, well recorded by reporters and photographers.

This week, at 1787 NW Otis Lane, Patricia Atterbury termed the event "just wonderful." Her father, she said, was all she had hoped. She described him as a very big man, tall and nice looking. He is a machinist for Ford Aircraft.

Walter Harrison and his daughter Pat spent time inspecting all the interest areas around Chicago.

This summer Pat will take her father on a tour of Douglas County. He is flying out July 1 to meet his son-in-law and two granddaughters.

Mrs. Atterbury lost contact with her father some 25 years ago when her mother brought her back to the West, and later remarried. Late in March, Harrison finally found her in Roseburg.

The culmination of the long search brought reporters from the Chicago metropolitan dailies to the Harrison door. And it confused Mrs. Atterbury no end when she stepped from the plane that April morning. All passengers were being paged. When Pat heard her name called, she dashed to meet the caller — the older man at the airlines desk was a Chicago Herald-American reporter. Not much later, she found her father, waiting in a terminal antway.

He is now assistant foreign editor of the New York Times.

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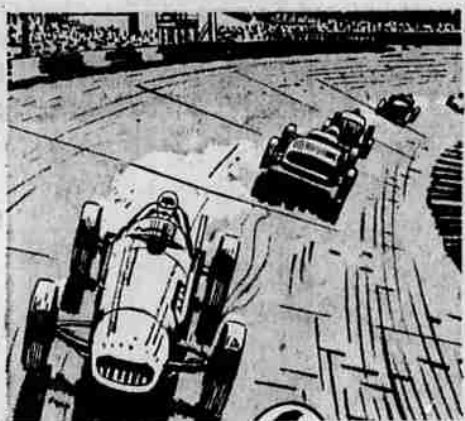
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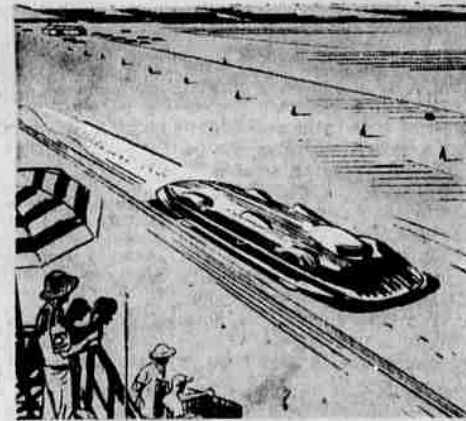
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
