River Dragged For Missing Man

A search of the Umpqua River was continuing today for the body of Luther Allen Jessup, 47, Cottage Grove, who was believed to have drowned near Scottsburg Saturday, reports Sheriff Ira C. Byrd. No new developments were reported.

Jessup reportedly set out alone on a fishing trip at 4 a.m. Saturday. When he failed to return at noon, friends and relatives began a search and found his dog wandering along the river.

Sheriff's officers and state police were joined by employees of a lumber company Sunday in a search of the area. Jessup's capsize in a motor boat was found about five or six miles downstream from Scottsburg, Sheriff Byrd ordered a boat to the scene.

Mayor Requests New Suggestions

Mayor Ernest Barker Jr., with the consent of the City Council, has issued a request to all Roseburg citizens for help in the "process" of programming and planning for the city's next fiscal year.

Again this year, he has asked for "Dear Mayor" letters from citizens. Their purpose is to solicit help in planning for the next year. He and the council hope to get some idea of the wants and needs of the population, Mayor Barker said.

Head Of Police Threatens Arrest Of Segregators

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP)—Racial barriers were hauled down on city buses in this cradle of the Confederacy Tuesday, but the head of the Police Department threatened to arrest any passenger who mixes with the opposite race.

Bus drivers who permit desegregation on their buses also face prosecution, the official said.

A reporter for The Alabama Journal, cruising the city, said all the Negroes he saw on buses were riding in the rear, the section reserved for them in the past.

Montgomery City Lines Inc., operating the only bus service, abandoned segregation of white and Negro patrons Tuesday in the wake of Monday's U.S. Supreme Court ruling.

A few hours later, police commissioner Clyde Sellers, a member of the White Citizens Council, said any passenger who violates city or state segregation laws will be prosecuted.

The council is an organization dedicated to the preservation of racial segregation.

"I'll be responsible for any arrests and I'll give the direct orders for those arrests," Sellers declared.

As far as I'm concerned, this damned thing applies to South Carolina only, the commissioner explained, referring to the decision holding bus segregation unconstitutional.

Gen. Lane's Rifle Put On Display

The public exhibit is sponsored by the school's student body and PTA. It includes historic Oregon items, a motion picture "The Last Cello Salmon Festival" and a lecture concerning historic happenings in this area.

The programs will be given at 8 p.m. tonight and at 9:45 a.m. and 1:45 and 4 p.m. Wednesday. The exhibit will be on display until 9 p.m. tonight and from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. and 7 to 9 p.m. Wednesday.

obliged to sternly admonish said witness (James R. Grady) to give responsive answers and that my tone of voice was not in any manner "irascible."

He says that a contention made by Yates in his chambers that directions to witnesses were "in such a tone as to lead the jury to believe that I was unfavorable to his side of the case" was "absolutely untrue."

He goes on to say that "As a matter of fact, I knew nothing about the case until it came on for trial on Monday, February 27, 1956; that the use of said term 'irascible' by said Spencer W. Yates was deliberate and premeditated, and as before stated, was entirely false."

Controversy Centers On Word
The word "irascible," which Yates used in objecting to Wimberly's tone of voice in the course of the trial of Dorothy J. Turner vs. Arcoa, Inc., has been the center of controversy.

Mrs. Robertson said that "while the admonition of the judge was stern, it was in no sense hot-tempered, spiteful, peevish, petulant nor choleric" (part of the dictionary definition).

Bailliff Smith also agrees that "the tone of said judge was not in any manner irascible."

Yates has appealed a one-day sentence imposed by the judge after being found guilty of contempt. The matter is to go to the Oregon Supreme Court.

Russian Leaders Grim Following Talk With Eden

LONDON (AP)—Soviet Premier Bulganin and Communist Party chief Khrushchev strode grimly from a crucial meeting Tuesday with Prime Minister Eden, amid plummeting hopes for any solid British-Soviet agreement on world issues.

Moments later the Soviet leaders postponed for 36 hours a news conference they had scheduled for Wednesday. A British Foreign Office spokesman said he could not explain the reason.

With the Soviet-British talks in their final stage—this was the next to the last session—the Russian leaders looked almost sullen as they left No. 10 Downing St.

Eden did not come to the door of his official residence to see the Soviet leaders out, the normal custom for such high ranking visitors. Staring sullenly ahead, the Russians hurried to their waiting cars to be driven to the House of Commons for a luncheon given by the speaker.

British alarm and resentment mounted as a result of Khrushchev's two speeches Monday in which he bragged about Soviet quiet mission with H-bomb warheads and talked about labor leaders critical of Communist policies.

tion was overruled by Clifford W. Ferguson, the PUC examiner.

Ferguson ruled that evidence submitted at the hearing here is to establish convenience and necessity to the public of the passenger service. He opined that if SP was to re-establish the service, a mail contract with the government would be required.

Geddes, in his opening statement, told Ferguson the plaintiffs would attempt to point out that the public needs and desires the service. He also said it would be attempted to prove that the service would be patronized.

Other witnesses before a recess at about 11:10 a.m. included R. B. (Steve) Harriman, Dillard, president of the Oregon Gasoline Dealers Assn.; C. E. Hoover, Roseburg, representing veterans' groups; Arthur M. Selby, a Glide resident.

Harriman testified the people of the Winston-Dillard area had used the service in the past and would do so in the future if the train is once again ordered to run. He said the area would use the train to conduct business in Portland and Medford.

Hoover claimed the suspension of the service has proven costly to vets' groups sponsoring transportation of disabled veterans to Portland for medical treatment.

He said it costs \$106.50 for an ambulance to Portland from Roseburg, as against about \$14 for train fare as in the past.

Selby complained against poor scheduling between here and California, where he and his wife traveled at one time when passenger service was available.

McCulloch at one time asked Harriman to estimate time of arrival of the southbound "Night-crawler" in Roseburg. He missed it by five minutes.

Then the SP lawyer asked an estimate of arrival of the northbound train.

"About midnight," estimated Harriman.

Cracked Lowry: "Presuming it arrived on schedule."

Ambush Killings Increase Tension On Arab Frontier

JERUSALEM (AP)—Shots from ambush killed four Israeli water authority men in the Negev desert a few hundred yards from the Jordan border Monday night.

The killings tightened the Arab-Israeli tension that Dag Hammarskjöld's mission is seeking to abate.

The victims' command car was set afire.

"This outrage bears all the signs of another Fedayeen action, from whatever territory the murderers may have come," Israeli Foreign Minister Moshe Sharett protested to the U. N. Secretary general.

Fedayeen Arab suicide raiders last infiltrated Israel from the Egyptian-held Gaza strip in a series of night attacks preceding the April 18 cease-fire on the frontier shared by Israel and Egypt.

Israeli Premier David Ben-Gurion said Sunday 11 of them had been killed. He put Israeli deaths for the month at 18.

The Israeli water party—made up of three engineers and their driver—was reported attacked shortly before sundown on the Beersheba-Eilat road not far from Scorpion Pass, where Arab infiltrators shot up an Israeli bus in 1954 and killed 12 of its passengers.

Israeli spokesmen said the four were cut down by automatic fire.

The killings followed closely on fresh trouble between Israeli fishermen and Syrians on the Sea of Galilee, the historic fresh water lake that Israel claims is wholly within Israel's frontiers.

Israeli sources said Syrians fired on a large fleet of Israeli fishing boats in the northeastern section of the sea, where Syria's frontier overlooks the shore, and the boats were forced to flee, abandoning 22 fishing nets.

The Sea of Galilee is fed by the River Jordan and Arab-Israeli differences over development of that stream were factors in Hammarskjöld's efforts in Damascus Tuesday to secure an unconditional cease-fire along the Syrian-Israeli frontier.

said in obvious reference to the graft and corruption investigations now underway in Portland.

With legislative representation on a population basis, French believes rural areas "are just the tail on the kite."

Long a servant of better state government, French believes state development comes from rural areas. Douglas he said would not be affected by the 1960 adoption to a population basis—this county would continue to have one senator and the three representatives apportioned to it by the 1952 law, (not yet in effect).

Contrarywise, many eastern and southern Oregon counties would be grouped together and served by a single senator and one representative (Morrow, Gilliam, Sherman and Wheeler counties would be thus served). At the same time, Multnomah County would have seven senators and 16 representatives.

French believes population distribution does away with equal representation from all areas (contrary to the national government). He noted that the federal plan has been endorsed by the Farm Bureau, grangers, and many people including some from Portland. All he seeks currently is placement of the Federal plan on the November ballot.

The former legislator feels voters will approve fair distribution. He was introduced by State Sen. Paul Geddes.

test of who can pull in the most votes in his own party.

Eisenhower beat Stevenson in the 1952 Pennsylvania general election, 2,415,789 votes to 2,146,269. Observers forecast about 35 per cent of the state's 4,970,195 eligible voters would ballot today.

Pennsylvanians also choose a 74-vote Democratic delegation and a 79-vote Republican delegation to the respective national conventions. Neither group will be pledged to any specific candidate.

Massachusetts voters pick a 40-vote Democratic delegation and a 38-vote GOP group. Write-in votes are not binding on the delegations.

Knowland is also on the GOP ballot with Eisenhower in Alaska, but interest focused on the contest between Stevenson and Kefauver. It is the territory's first presidential preference primary.

In other political developments yesterday:

Senate Majority Leader Lyndon Johnson of Texas took to radio and television last night to give the Democrats' reply to Eisenhower's speech last week explaining his veto of the Democratic-sponsored farm bill.

Johnson said a portion of a recording of one Eisenhower speech in 1952 and ran a film clip on television showing Eisenhower speaking in favor of price supports at 90 per cent of parity.

Eisenhower has cited the 90 per cent supports on the farm bill as the main reason for his veto, saying he favored instead a sliding scale.
