Glendale Council Awards Contracts For Disposal Plant

The Glendale City Council has awarded contracts for construction of a sewage disposal plant and extensions to the present sewer system, reports correspondent Mrs. G. B. Fox.

It also raised the sewer service charge.

The contract for the disposal plant went to Everett L. Wiggins Co. of Portland, which entered a low bid of \$37,900. The contract for new sewer lines went to Den Herder of Lebanon with a bid of \$21,362.

The council opened the bids at a previous meeting, but tabled them until they could investigate further the plans and specifications submitted by the consulting engineers.

Mrs. Fox reports the city anticipates purchase of four pumps, a clarifier and a trickling filter, which will bring the total cost of the sewer improvements to \$50,077. The approximately \$12,000 additional in the bond issue will go to attorneys, engineers, interest and other items. Anything remaining will be used for necessary replacements and repairs to the present system.

Mrs. Fox said the council also found it necessary to raise the monthly sewer service charge from \$1.50 to \$3 in order to cover payments on the bond issue.

In the only other action of the week, the council received a report from City Recorder Arlet Smith that 32 new metal chairs had been received to replace the old chairs and benches used for hearings and special meetings in the city hall.

Hunters Tracking Down Big Cougar

Two hunters are tracking a cougar which raided the flocks of at least two sheepmen during the last week.

Myrtle Creek correspondent Ruth M. Evans reports government trapper Dale Monty of Sutherlin and Hank Jones of Myrtle Creek were called in this week to hunt for the marauder.

Mrs. Delbert Trask of Myrtle Creek told the correspondent the cougar was first sighted about five days ago by Mr. and Mrs. Ray Allen. The animal is known to have killed sheep in the Trask flock and in that of Dale Sall. Signs of the animal were also found near the Howard Brownson place.

Although using hounds, the two trappers have still not been able to overtake the animal.

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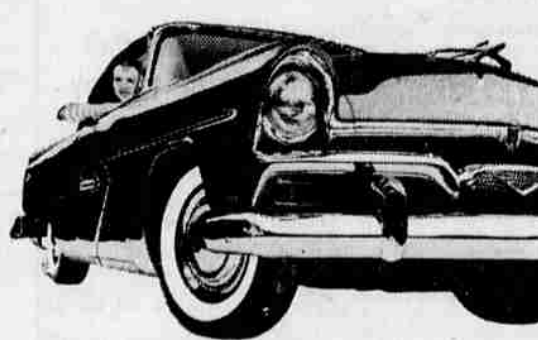
