AAU Officer Accused By Ex-Stanford Star

LOS ANGELES (AP)—A former Stanford University track star has accused Daniel J. Ferris, secretary-treasurer of the American Amateur Athletic Union, of arranging for him to make a trip to Canada that exceeded AAU expense account rules.

Ferris, in New York, quickly denied the allegation, branding it as "ridiculous."

John T. Fulton, who was a half-miler at Stanford and captain of the 1948 United States track team which toured Europe, held a long conference yesterday with Larry Houston, secretary of the Southern Pacific Assn. of the AAU. Then he announced he would place before the AAU Executive Committee a charge that Ferris was "instrumental in my defection" from amateurism.

Sacramento dropped to third—one game behind Seattle.

At Hollywood, Vancouver ran over five Star hurlers 9-2 to end a 3-game losing streak. Don Leppert, Frankie Austin and Gary Robin drove in three runs each.

Cooler Weather To Slow Flooding

PORTLAND (AP)—Cooler weather, moving down from Canada, will slow the rise of the Columbia River and its tributaries this week, the river forecast center said Tuesday.

All streams west of the Cascade Range, and most east of the mountains, will fall the next two to three days, forecasters said. The cool weather is expected to last through Sunday with a few showers one or two days this week.

The Columbia River below Umatilla will rise slowly the next one or two days, while the lower Columbia will rise rapidly the next day or two, followed by a slow rise, forecasters said.

The Columbia was up to 17.1 feet at Vancouver Wash., early Tuesday. That is 2.1 feet over flood stage, but only low-lying pastures are flooded at that level.

Melting snow has caused an early freshet on the Columbia. The big rise is expected to come later, probably about three weeks or a month from now.

Douglas Co. Banks Report Increases At Quarter's End

Douglas County banks appeared to be increasing their stature at the latest quarterly reports from four of them.

Both Roseburg banks showed increases in both deposits and loans and discount columns.

The Roseburg branch of the U.S. National Bank reported deposits of \$20,394,011.92, according to Manager H. E. Schmeer. This figure was up over \$300,000 more than the June 1955 figure. Loans and discounts were up almost \$900,800 from the June figure with a total this April 10 of \$7,192,522.45.

Schmeer said the total of the U.S. National Bank in the state was up 12 1/2 million dollars in deposits since last April and 43 million dollars in loans and discounts. The banking system showed its prosperity by opening a new branch in Coos Bay and Oregon's first complete motor bank in Portland this year.

Meanwhile, Douglas County's independent system with branches in Oakland, Sutherlin and Roseburg was also booming ahead. The Douglas County State Bank's deposits as compared with last June 30 was down slightly to \$22,742,349.26, but loans and discounts total was up \$300,000 to \$14,363,545.74.

On the coast, Umpqua National Bank at Reedsport was up by almost \$300,000 in deposits with \$5,434,390.96, but was down slightly in loans and discounts with \$1,248,029.53.

The Drain Branch of the United States National reversed that picture, being down in deposits from last June and up in loans and discounts. Deposits were down more than \$500,000 to \$4,083,827. Loans and discounts were up by \$1,327,368.

German Airline Orders Boeing Jet Transports

SEATTLE (AP)—The German airline, Deutsche Lufthansa, announced an order Tuesday for four Boeing-built intercontinental model jet transports.

Announcement of the purchase plans was made in Chicago, coincident with start of a Germany-England-Chicago service by Lufthansa.

The dollar value of the latest order was estimated at 21 million, not including spare parts.

This boosts to 88 the number of Boeing Airplane Co. jet airliners ordered by eight companies at a total cost of around 471 million.

Douglas Aircraft Co., Boeing's chief rival in the jet transport sales race, has about 110 planes on order.

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
