

Fluid Milk Price Inequity Cited During Hearing

MINNEAPOLIS — Upward revision of fluid milk prices paid farmers is necessary to forestall "chaotic market conditions," an Iowa producer told a special department of agriculture hearing here.

Harold McGinnis, president of the Eastern Iowa Co-operative Dairy Producers, said dairymen in his area had been placed at a disadvantage by recent department price orders.

McGinnis pointed out that the new April 16-June 30 price level in the Quad Cities area is \$4.34 per hundredweight for fluid milk, \$4.24 in the Dubuque district and \$3.87 for the Cedar Rapids-Iowa City territory.

As a result, McGinnis said, producers are shifting into the higher price areas with "resultant instability and disorder that could retard the best development of the dairy industry in eastern Iowa."

Spokesmen for nine other mid-western milksheds supported an average 50 cents per 100 pounds boost in basic allowances, an increase they estimated would cost consumers about one cent per quart.

Citing a "strike" by producers in the Detroit area earlier this month, Glenn Lake, president of the Michigan Milk Producers Assn., said the raise was needed to insure future orderly marketing.

Actor Edward Arnold Dies Suddenly At 66

HOLLYWOOD — Veteran actor Edward Arnold died unexpectedly early Thursday of a cerebral hemorrhage. He was 66.

His wife Cleo was at his bedside when he succumbed in his home at suburban Encino. His physician son-in-law, Dr. William F. Orlando of nearby Northridge, reported the cause of death.

Arnold, for whom this was the 49th year in show business, recently returned from making a movie, "The Ambassador's Daughter," starring Olivia de Havilland, in Paris. Two weeks ago he appeared on television, and he was planning to start another movie in New York soon.

He formerly starred in the "Mr. President" radio series. The heavy-set, deep-voiced actor was born Guenther Schneider in New York City Feb. 18, 1890.

Air Force Tanker Plane Crashes, Six Killed

ABILENE, Kan. — An Air Force tanker plane, with at least six men aboard, crashed and exploded Wednesday about 10 miles northeast of Woodbine.

Witnesses said at least six bodies were seen in the burning wreckage. Planes of that type, KC97, normally carry a crew of six.

The plane, from Forbes Air Force base at Topeka, was on a training mission.

Henry Obermeyer, a farmer planting corn near the scene, said he thought the plane was going to hit him, so he jumped off his tractor and ran. He said one engine was burning and the craft exploded after it hit the ground. Wreckage was strewn for a distance of a quarter of a mile. The wreckage burned for three hours after the plane hit.

Hiss To Deliver Princeton Speech

PRINCETON, N. J. — Alger Hiss comes to Princeton University Thursday night to deliver his first public speech since he was released from a prison term for perjury a year and a half ago.

A student debating society touched off a controversy by inviting the onetime State Department official, who was convicted of lying to a federal grand jury when he denied passing secret documents to an admitted Communist courier.

And Princeton students at a campus meeting Wednesday night jeered when two critics of the invitation—a congressman and the university's Roman Catholic chaplain—repeated their denunciations of the Hiss speech.

The Rev. Hugh Halton drew catcalls when he said this is "Princeton's darkest hour."

Rep. T. James Tamm (D-N.J.) of Jersey City, who told Congress two weeks ago that "there's a little poison ivy creeping into the Ivy League," also was jeered several times.

7 Negro Children Perish In Blaze; Fire Deaths High

TOLEDO, Ohio. — Fire raced through a one-story cinder-block home eight miles northwest of here early Thursday, killing seven Negro children who were alone in the house.

Fire Chief Richard Campbell at Sylvania, said the father, John Cooper, 33, was taking his wife, Laurel, 29, to work in a Toledo cafe when the fire broke out.

Dead were Brenda Joyce, 9; Jacqueline, 6; John, 4; Sherry, Jean, 3; Georgia Marie, 2, and Carter Stephen, 2 months. Campbell said he believed Harrison Leonard had been orphaned and was being reared by the Coopers.

Sheriff's deputies said Cooper was being held for investigation to determine why the children were left alone.

At least 25 persons, 23 of them children, perished in North American fires since Tuesday.

Today seven children were burned to death in their Michigan home, a few miles north of the Ohio village of Sylvania. The parents of the children, Negroes, were not at home at the time.

Other victims: In Philadelphia early Wednesday: Six children and three women, all Negroes, died.

Cornier Brook, N.J., Tuesday night: Eight children lost their lives.

New York City, Tuesday night: Two Negro children died in a tenement blaze.

Warren, Pa., last night: Two guests died in a hotel fire; two other guests still were missing.

D. Hammarskjold Notes Progress

AMMAN, Jordan. — U. N. Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold chatted up more progress in his Mid-East peace mission Thursday as he wound up talks with Jordanian leaders.

Although nothing official was revealed regarding Hammarskjold's talks in Amman, well-informed sources reported Jordan is willing to go along with a pledge of a cease-fire and general armistice observance.

These sources added Jordan also was ready to agree for local commanders to seek ways of avoiding incidents along the frontier, and possibly to an increase in the number of U.N. truce observers on the border.

Hammarskjold, who was directed by the Security Council to seek ways of ensuring compliance with the 1949 armistice between Israel and her Arab neighbors, already has received promises from Israel and Egypt to observe an unconditional cease-fire along their borders.

Syria also has agreed to a cease-fire, subject to a like pledge from Israel, and Lebanon has agreed to cooperate in easing tensions which are not acute on that border.

California Man Sought By Police

Roseburg police have joined police departments in California in a search for a man known as James Lyman Stewart, between 45 and 50 years of age, who allegedly lives in Sacramento, Calif.

Stewart is charged in Roseburg with cashing a worthless check at Umpqua Valley Appliance at 366 SE Jackson St. In a complaint from the store, he is charged with buying a microwave for \$11.50 with a \$20 check on April 10. The check was on a California bank.

A further check was made in California where it was found police in Santa Rosa, Ukiah and San Francisco were also looking for him. A district court warrant is out for his arrest on the check charge in Roseburg.

Stewart has five aliases: A. James Sevier, James Lynn Stewart, G. L. Stewart, Abner James Sevier and C. F. Klein.

School Budget Change Suggestions Presented

"We have no skeletons," he quoted a motto on District 4 school stationery. "The schools belong to all the people." Mrs. McCarthy offered pointed comment during the early portion of the meeting.

"The fallacy of this whole bitter argument," she noted, "is that we had to have the argument to have an evaluation." Educators, she said earlier, are "the evaluating people."

She contended that all voters (She approved the proposed budget) were concerned with evaluation, but that a successful budget was the current pressing matter. She questioned the second budget vote "as a test of policy," and said such belief took a lot for granted.

Association President said his conclusions were based on interviews with 1,800 people. He asked members to recognize the "no" vote was not on taxation alone and called for a united effort to achieve "full confidence in the school program... that's what we want isn't it?"

The evaluation proposal sees need for volunteer help to assist board members in evaluating 15 general committee members representing percentage of "yes" and "no" votes, allocation of \$10,000 to \$15,000 for the work, and a look at cost analysis, finance, curriculum, building program and state standards. The association hopes the evaluation could be completed by November or no later than for use in 1957-58.

The report sees a "pioneer step in education in this country." It proposes possibility of a district achievement program, comprehensive business training in schools and a look at all program phases to see that none are wrongfully attacked. (An outline of the proposal will appear later in The News-Review.)

Luoma said he was worried about leading the school district over the edge. One problem, he said, is how to get the "no" vote in our favor. Everyone, he said, wants the most for his money.

"I think we've got to get a strong affirmative opinion that the evaluation will be made," he declared. "We need those no's."

In a prepared statement, Luoma read from a May 9, 1955, advertisement in The News-Review which had suggested that "laymen meeting once a year could not accomplish the necessary work needed on all education areas."

He said: "Our object now is to obtain the help and assistance of good people from all sides in working together to make some revisions in the just-defeated budget without eliminating any school courses or services... done in such a manner as to preserve the salaries of all teachers and school administration personnel, including budgeted increases."

Luoma said he met already with school administrators and started an item by item budget perusal.

New Budget chairman Ray Doerner actively prevented the audience members from going into personality charges.

Twice he relinquished his chair to offer comments. In respect to earlier budget votes this year, Doerner believes some cuts should be made with administration and school board help to prevent harmful "slashing." His second thought was a feeling the budget board should cooperate in some evaluation "somewhat as outlined to-night."

The evaluation request brought a resolution from the budget board. That body took a needed recess at 9:15 p.m. It brought back a statement read by Harold Hoyt which noted a resolve to study the association proposal thoroughly, meet with its forerunners and lay cooperative plans for evaluation.

Lots of people had lots to say. Some disagreed with the association's evaluation proposal which said committee membership should be made up of percentage of yes and no votes — 60 per cent "no" representation, 40 per cent "yes." A Save Our Schools committee member, O. J. Fett Jr., suggested an agreeable working premise for distribution was needed.

Highway Bill Expected To Get House Approval

WASHINGTON — House Republican Leader Martin of Massachusetts predicted today the House will pass the Democratic-sponsored highway bill by a substantial margin and with the support of most Republicans.

Martin's forecast and a similar one from Speaker of the House Rayburn (D-Tex.) indicated a shoo-in victory for the measure, on which the House opens debate today.

House leaders scheduled five hours of debate on the bill. Because of expected floor fights over some secondary provisions, they anticipated no final vote until tomorrow.

Sponsored by Rep. Fallon (D-Md.), the bill would provide for 15½ billion dollars in new federal-state roadbuilding over the next 13 years. That includes 27½ billion for a 1955-56 system of interstate highways, 90 per cent federally financed.

To help pay the cost, highway users taxes would be increased \$14,800,000,000 in a 16-year period. This includes a penny-a-gallon rise in the federal gasoline tax, to 3 cents.

Adlai Stevenson To Miss Roseburg

PORTLAND — Adlai Stevenson is scheduled to open his three-day Oregon campaign by attending a \$1-a-plate Democratic fund raising spaghetti dinner here Sunday.

The Multnomah County Democratic Central Committee is sponsoring the affair for Stevenson who is coming to the state to campaign for write-in votes in the Oregon May 18 Democratic presidential primary election. He is to arrive late Saturday night and his only Sunday appearances other than at the dinner will be attendance at church services and a press conference about noon.

On Monday the former Illinois governor is to speak at a St. Helens breakfast meeting and at noon will be at Astoria.

Monday night he will attend a Democratic meeting at Milwaukie, then will drive south for Tuesday appearances at Medford and Klamath Falls. From there he will go by train to California.

Sedition Charged To Ex-Publishers

SAN FRANCISCO — Editor John William Powell has been indicted by the government in its first use of a 1953 sedition law. He is charged with using his China Monthly Review in Shanghai to thwart American military progress in the Korean War.

He says the charge is "completely untrue."

Powell, his wife Sylvia and Julian Schuman of New York all were named in one indictment yesterday.

Twelve other counts are leveled against Powell alone. He is charged with publishing issues of the Review which accused the United States of being internally corrupt, pursuing a "morally unjustifiable" foreign policy, attempting to exterminate the peoples of Korea and China with germ warfare and poison gas, testing germ warfare weapons on Korea and Chinese prisoners and spreading smallpox in North Korea. These statements, the indictment charges, Powell "well knew were false and untrue."

STAKE MILL BURNED
SPRINGFIELD, Ore. — The Northwest Stake Co. mill was destroyed by fire Wednesday. Owner Clifford Engle estimated the damage at \$15,000.

The mill was unoccupied at the time the fire broke out. Engle and his three employees had left for a coffee break. They were in a nearby restaurant when they saw smoke pouring out of the building.

Senator Asks Expulsion Of Russian UN Delegate

stantine Ekimov, first secretary of the Soviet U. N. delegation. "No other conclusion is possible but that Ekimov acted outside the scope of his authority," Morris said.

The reason the State Department gave for expulsion of Guryanov and Turkin was that they were guilty of "exceeding the scope of their official capacity" as members of the Soviet U. N. staff.

The department note to Russia accused Sobolev of butting into the immigration hearing. However, it made no demand for his expulsion. There was no mention in the note of Ekimov.

Under the U.N. headquarters agreement, the United States reserved the right to take action against any foreign official accredited to its government's U.N. delegation in New York City who engages in "activities outside of his official capacity."

While the U.S. note chided Sobolev, it did not demand his recall. It went no further than to request Moscow to tell Sobolev and his staff to mind their U.N. business henceforth.

Officials said Guryanov and Turkin were guilty of improper action because their U.N. status did not permit them to go to the Idlewild Airport, as they did with the seamen, and shepherd them through an immigration hearing as they left the country. If performed by a duly accredited consular official, such things are all right.

Russia closed its New York consulate in 1948.
