Boy Dies Of Starvation, Then Thrown Into River

EASTON, Pa. (AP)—Five-year-old William Mueller had died of starvation before his father threw the body into the Delaware River, Coroner George T. Kametz said last night.

The body was recovered yesterday. Police held the father, Alfred Mueller, 60, and his 24-year-old wife pending a further hearing on charges of failure to provide the boy with necessities of life. State police said Mueller signed a statement that the boy died last Saturday night after long confinement in his locked room for punishment. They quoted Mueller as saying that, fearing trouble with authorities, he placed the boy's body in a weighted burlap sack and threw it into the river.

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Sec. Dulles Seeks To Prove Intent Of U. S. In A War

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles is studying ways to prove to the world "by word and deed" that the United States intends to use only for defensive purposes the power of its atomic and hydrogen weapons.

He apparently hopes in that way to bring pressure on the Soviet Union to give firm assurances that it also will refrain from the use of threat of atomic war except for defense.

Dulles did not outline any specific ideas when he discussed the project in the course of a speech last night to the American Society of International Law.

It was the third time in recent days that an administration spokesman had provided evidence of developing American policies and tactics in foreign affairs without disclosing details.

In an address in New York Monday, Dulles declared U.S. readiness to join with the Atlantic allies to broadening the work of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization to include unspecified political and economic problems.

Last Saturday night President Eisenhower spoke in an address here of creating a "rotating advisory group" to advise the government on foreign aid issues, apparently foreshadowing a full study of the foreign aid program and its broad purposes.

Dulles said last night he thinks "the time must come when the Soviet rulers, if only as a matter of expediency and in deference to
