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Probation Granted Clarence Stanley; Two Plead Guilty

Clarence A. Stanley, 33, Eugene, was handed a three-year probationary sentence, but granted probation, by Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly after Stanley pleaded guilty Thursday to a burglary charge.

In other court action, two men charged with armed robbery of the Airport Inn last week pleaded guilty to district attorney's information. They were not sentenced, however, pending arrival of FBI reports on them.

The men charged with the robbery are Charles Lowell Choate, 27; Raymond Lee Lorentzen, 20; and Leroy Kirk Taylor, 16. Choate and Lorentzen waived rights to grand jury indictments and pleaded guilty. Taylor's case is still pending.

It was brought out that the men have not resided at Roseburg very long. Choate, father of four children, said he had been drinking beer prior to the robbery in which \$152 was taken from George Dahl.

Choate's brother-in-law, Robie Kiefer of Bandon, spoke on his behalf, saying he could give Choate work if granted probation. He said Choate had never been in serious trouble before. He is an Air Force veteran.

Lorentzen said he had been drinking beer and vodka at the time of the crime. He admitted he had been in trouble as a juvenile. He moved to Roseburg recently from California with his wife.

Stanley was charged with burglary of the Red & White store at Yoncalla on March 29 with his brother-in-law Leland E. Thiele, 22, who has been granted probation on a five-year sentence.

Daniel P. Keohane, court-appointed attorney, noted that it was Stanley's first offense, that Stanley had been drinking at the time.

Stanley, father of four, has been offered a chance to return to his job as a logger. Usual probation terms will apply, with emphasis on the "no drinking" rule.

partment approves soil conditions in relation to sewage disposal.

Plans were made for technician Frank Johnson, Mrs. Rosa Heinbach and an engineer to confer on the proposed Heinbach subdivision. Some items must be checked to insure minimum standards.

Some minor adjustment will be required for the South Umpqua subdivision, including street names, pedestrian access and the legal description. Tentative approval was given, on condition the changes are made.

Consultant J. Haslett Bell told the commission he has interviewed several applicants for a technician's position open here. Discussion was held on buying some planning publications to build up a reference library.

County Building Inspector Charles Bonito reported that building permits have been issued at an increasing rate. So far in April, permits have been given on building with total evaluation of \$297,828. His office is in the same room as the planning office in the courthouse.

Chairman O. J. Fast Jr. presided at the regular monthly meeting. Members present were C. C. Fosback of Dillard, R. H. Franks of Glendale, George Wilcox of Oakland and Al Rear of Reedport. Absent were Verne Thomas of Drain and Clyde Cockrell of Ridge. Ex-officio members J. R. Parker, T. Claude Baker and Fred Darby also were present, along with planning and building department staffers.

BPR Allocates \$30 Million For Highway Building

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Bureau of Public Roads has allocated more than 30 million dollars in matching funds for highway aid to Washington and Oregon during the fiscal year starting July 1.

Testimony before a House Appropriations subcommittee, released Thursday, showed the bureau has tentatively allotted \$14,063,450 for highways in Washington and 12,919,044 in Oregon.

In addition, the bureau has tentatively allocated \$3,698,378 for forest roads in Oregon, \$1,563,399 for Washington and \$1,960,788 for Alaska.

The breakdown on the allocations to Washington and Oregon: Washington — Primary highways, \$5,231,351; secondary highways, \$3,494,756; urban highways, \$2,616,940; interstate system, \$2,750,383.

Oregon — Primary highways, \$5,410,740; secondary highways, \$3,781,446; urban highways, \$1,990,696; interstate system, \$2,336,182.

The bureau said that as of March 1, 1956, Washington had \$6,777,210 and Oregon \$4,596,470 in unprogrammed federal highway aid funds.

Totem Inn Fire Is Being Probed

The fire which swept the Totem Inn at Drain Tuesday morning is being investigated "to eliminate any possibility of arson," according to Sheriff Ira C. Byrd.

A member of the state police arson squad who joined in the investigation Thursday is quoted as saying there are peculiar circumstances prevailing at the scene.

The tavern-restaurant was gutted by the blaze. The loss was only partly covered by insurance, owned by Fred Mountain told officers. The fire was discovered by Tom Hucks as he headed for work early Tuesday. He notified Deputy John McCool, who lives nearby, and McCool turned in the alarm.

Sheriff Byrd noted that there had been three fires in the Drain, including one March 4 which threatened the entire downtown business district. That fire destroyed a cleaning business and cafe.

Study of the Totem Inn fire is continuing.

Rail Rates Application Hearing Dated May 8

SALEM (AP)—Public Utilities Commissioner Charles H. Helzel will hold a hearing May 8 on the railroads' application for a 6 per cent freight rate increase within the state.

The railroads recently were given a 6 per cent boost by the Interstate Commerce Commission but that applies only to interstate shipments.

Helzel said he had received several protests against the proposed increase.

However, he said, the Portland Grain Exchange asked that the increase be allowed for grain shipments.

Judge Wimberly Files Memorandum On Yates

He seemed to believe that I should recede from my position and accept some sort of compromise like the one had between the husband and wife when the husband wanted to stay at home and the wife wanted to go to the show. They compromised by going to the show. Also, while present in my chambers, Yates stated that this contempt affair might get rough before it was ended. What he meant by that statement I do not know. Yates for the third time was told how and only how he could purge himself of the contempt as above indicated and he again refused to do so.

Help To Others Seen
Before ending the sixth and final page of the memorandum, the veteran jurist notes that "Before many years I will be passing out of the picture but my Good Lord help the younger judges who come upon the scene hereafter if they are to be subjected to such insulting and contemptuous language as was used by Yates in this case." He then quotes Mr. Justice Jordan in Dodge vs. Justice:

"Were such conduct and acts upon the part of attorneys permitted or tolerated by judges, the courts over which they preside would be justly covered with opprobrium and held in contempt."

Supplement Filed Also
In a short, supplemental memorandum, the judge says the three affidavits filed on his behalf on April 23 were entirely unnecessary but that, "since the defendant is attempting to get an exception which was not allowed in the bill of exceptions, by means of the affidavits, I did not wish to have the affidavits filed by the defendant go unchallenged if the Supreme Court should hold, as I believe that it will not, that such affidavits may impeach the findings of the circuit judge in the contempt proceedings. Copies of the affidavits filed on behalf of the state were not delivered to the newspaper reporters for publication purposes."

News Story Cited
Attached to the memorandum is a newspaper article from the News-Review which Wimberly says shows that publicity was the purpose for filing the affidavits on Yates' behalf. "Copies of the affidavits apparently were furnished to the newspaper by Yates; otherwise, the newspaper would not have quoted so copiously from them," it is stated.

The judge quotes an Oregon statute to the effect that affidavits may be obtained from two (not twelve) respectable and disinterested persons, but that Yates allowed the newspaper to publish a version of the tone of voice of the court, and "in doing so, he procures and publishes the affidavits of twelve jurors, contrary to the terms of the statute, when a more accurate and uncontradicted reproduction of such tone of voice may be had from the dictaphone record."

Sees Different Result
He says he is sure that if the jurors had known the provisions of the law, "and had known more about the case on trial and the attorneys involved and had known that the only purpose for which their affidavits were procured and could be used, was an attempt to embarrass the court by their publication and to carry on an 'unseemly' conflict, they would not have made such affidavits."

"To further demonstrate the propriety of jurors entering such conflicts in that manner," the judge relates.

"The jurors were unaware of the fact that Yates, in chambers during the trial, admitted to me that the reason he had sued Arcos, Inc., instead of George F. Jones, the driver of the automobile to which the trailer was attached and from which it came loose and injured the plaintiff, was that Jones could not respond in damages or, in other words, that he was practically execution proof. Also the jurors did not know that Yates knew that he had little or no chance of winning the case against Arcos, Inc. Yates knew that practically all of the jurors were inexperienced and that if he could get the case to the jury, he had a chance to talk himself into giving him a verdict although he was not entitled to it."

Lawyer's Duties Quoted
After quoting the law on an attorney's duties, including the statement that he should "never seek to mislead the court or jury by any artifice or false statement of law or fact," the judge's memorandum continues:

"It should be stated that the plaintiff, Dorothy J. Tucker, was severely injured without fault on her part and was entitled to damages from the party responsible for her injuries but that party was not Arcos, Inc., as is admitted by Yates by his failure to appeal from the judgment of involuntary nonsuit entered against him."

Review of Meeting Given
Later, the judge reviews the April 20 meeting with Yates by saying "Yates asked permission to come to my chambers, which permission was granted. When he arrived, he expressed a desire to discuss the contempt matter and stated he was willing to say that he was very sorry that the affair had happened. He had been told on two previous occasions that he could purge himself of the contempt only by public or in writing retracting the statement which he had made and publicly apologizing."

Sutherlin Man Passes Thursday At Hospital
John M. Hodgson of Sutherlin died Thursday night at a Roseburg hospital.

He is survived by three stepchildren, Sam Robinson of Sutherlin, Ray Robinson of Sutherlin and Allene Buxton of Oakland.

The body has been removed to Stearns & Little Mortuary, Oakland, and the arrangements will be announced later.

Contracts Let For Projects In Douglas Co.

Low bids have been received by the Oregon State Highway Commission for improvement of two streets in Douglas County cities and correction of a slide on the Pacific Highway.

Roseburg Paving Co. was low bidder on both street jobs. It entered a bid of \$11,789 for paving of 28 of a mile of Fifth Street in Oakland. Its other low bid for grading and paving of .07 of a mile of State Street and Central Avenue in Sutherlin was \$10,439.

Harbert Bros. of Estacada was low bidder on the correction of slide conditions on 29 of a mile of Pacific Highway 7.6 miles south of Roseburg.

The commission opened bids on more than a million dollars worth of highway and bridge work. It also considered several suggestions in connection with state parks and approved a Game Commission request for a boat launching ramp on the Rogue River at Ben Hur Lampman wayside.

Two possible park sites will be studied, one the Rocky Ann Peak area near Medford, proposed by Eric W. Allen Jr., managing editor of the Medford Mail-Tribune, and the other a beach area on Ten Mile Creek suggested by Allen G. Terry, manager of the Port of Coos Bay.

The commission authorized the purchase of right-of-way along the North Jefferson Junction-Albany section of Highway 99-E to make that section of the Pacific Highway into a freeway.

Contract bids opened Thursday were rejected on a Curry County project for improving 1.23 miles of Coast Highway in Brookings. J. C. Compton Co., McMinnville, was low bidder of \$219,877.

Services Scheduled For Bessie Richardson
Mrs. Bessie Richardson, 58, 301 Alameda St., Roseburg, died at a local hospital April 25 following a short illness.

She was born July 27, 1897, at Grandview, Ark., and was married there on July 9, 1919, to Floyd Richardson who preceded her in death in 1953.

She came to Oregon in 1918, making her home at Ontario until two years ago when she moved to Roseburg. She was a member of the Church of the Nazarene at Ontario.

Surviving are four children: Earl Richardson of Seattle, Wash.; Carl Richardson of Pasco, Wash.; Gerald Richard of Kennewick, Wash., and Mrs. Robert (Betty) Walker of Roseburg. She is also survived by her mother, Mrs. Clarandine Stamps of Grandview, Ark.; a sister, Mrs. Leona Fisher of Eureka Springs, Ark.; a brother, Herbert Stamps of Redfield, Calif., and eight grandchildren.

Her body is being sent to Ontario, for services Monday at 2 p.m. at the Beecher Funeral Home, with interment following in the Evergreen Cemetery. Arrangements are being handled by Long and Orr Mortuary.

Yoncalla Signs Agreement For City Street Paving
The Yoncalla City Council this week approved an agreement with the State Highway Commission concerning the paving of the Hayhurst Road from Bragg's Corner to Anne Street, a distance of about a quarter mile, reports correspondent Mrs. George Edes.

Under the agreement, the state will furnish \$15,000 toward the project which will consist of grading, base rock and paving with asphaltic concrete. The estimated cost of the job is \$16,500. The city will pay the difference.

In case of reconstruction of water pipes, electric or telephone poles, the city is also responsible. The pavement will be 26 feet wide. The work is to be completed this summer, Mrs. Edes was told.

Lumber Operators Argue On Lifting Of Market Rules

PORTLAND (AP)—Lumber mill operators argued Friday at a Bureau of Land Management hearing here whether marketing area restrictions should be lifted on 11 million dollars worth of salvage timber.

Oregon and California land regulations provide that primary manufacturing of all timber must occur in the marketing area in which it is grown.

Some mills want this changed so windblown and beetle-infested timber can be processed outside of marketing areas.

Most of the 374 million feet of salvage timber remaining in Western Oregon is in the Smith River region of the South Coast Marketing area, including Lane, Douglas and Coos Counties, said V. T. Heath, state BLM supervisor who is conducting the hearing.

The timber—284 million feet in the South Coast Marketing area and 90 million in the Siuslaw Marketing area—can be used for nearly any purpose, Heath said, including home construction and plywood. About 75 per cent of such timber still is sound after six years, he said.

The more than one billion feet of windblown and bug-infested timber already salvaged since the major damage in 1951 has brought an average of \$30 a thousand feet, Heath said.

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Thomas Harvey Dies Thursday

Thomas Ezra Harvey, 87, died at Riverside Sanitarium Thursday afternoon.

He was born in the English settlement east of Oakland Oct. 21, 1868, of pioneer parents, Mr. and Mrs. Aaron Harvey. Harvey was married to Jonette Smith in Oakland in 1894. The couple had three children.

Harvey had lived his entire life in Douglas County. He was engaged in farming for many years east of Oakland but for the past 10 years had lived in Roseburg.

He is survived by a son, Claude Sutherland; two sisters, Mrs. W. A. Pearce of Roseburg and Mrs. William Spaulding of Roseburg; two grandchildren; and three great-grandchildren.

The body has been removed to Stearns & Little Mortuary, Oakland, and funeral arrangements will be announced later.

Negroes Continue Long Boycott

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP)—Angered by threats of arrest, Montgomery Negroes have committed themselves to continue their long boycott of city buses until public officials are willing to accept integration.

The boycotting Negroes thundered approval last night to a resolution pledging them to carry on the protest indefinitely. A minister put it like this:

"We will never go back to Jim Crow buses."

The resolution was adopted by the cheering, hymn-singing Negroes without a dissenting vote at a mass meeting at the Day Street Baptist Church. The congregation filled the main auditorium and the basement, where loud speakers carried the speakers' words, and spilled out into the street.

The resolution was sharply critical of Montgomery's three city commissioners, who all belong to the pro-segregation White Citizens Council.

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
