Committee Passes Highway Measure

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Public Works Committee has voted 16-2 to send the 51½-billion-dollar highway bill to the House.

The formal, final committee action at a closed session also included approval of \$1,800,000,000 of new highway user taxes over the next 16 years. That includes a penny-a-gallon boost in the federal gasoline tax, from 2 to 3 cents.

A committee spokesman said the big measure is expected to get House consideration next Thursday and Friday.

The measure, offered by Rep. Fallon (D-Md.), is one of the major legislative undertakings of the present Congress. It has backing from both the Eisenhower administration and Democratic leaders.

Chances for passage this year are regarded as much brighter than last when the House voted down similar proposals in a row over financing.

Under the proposed 51½-billion-dollar, 13-year construction program, the federal government would put up some 37½ billion dollars. The states would provide the rest.

A primary feature of the bill is completion of a 40,000-mile interstate superhighway system.

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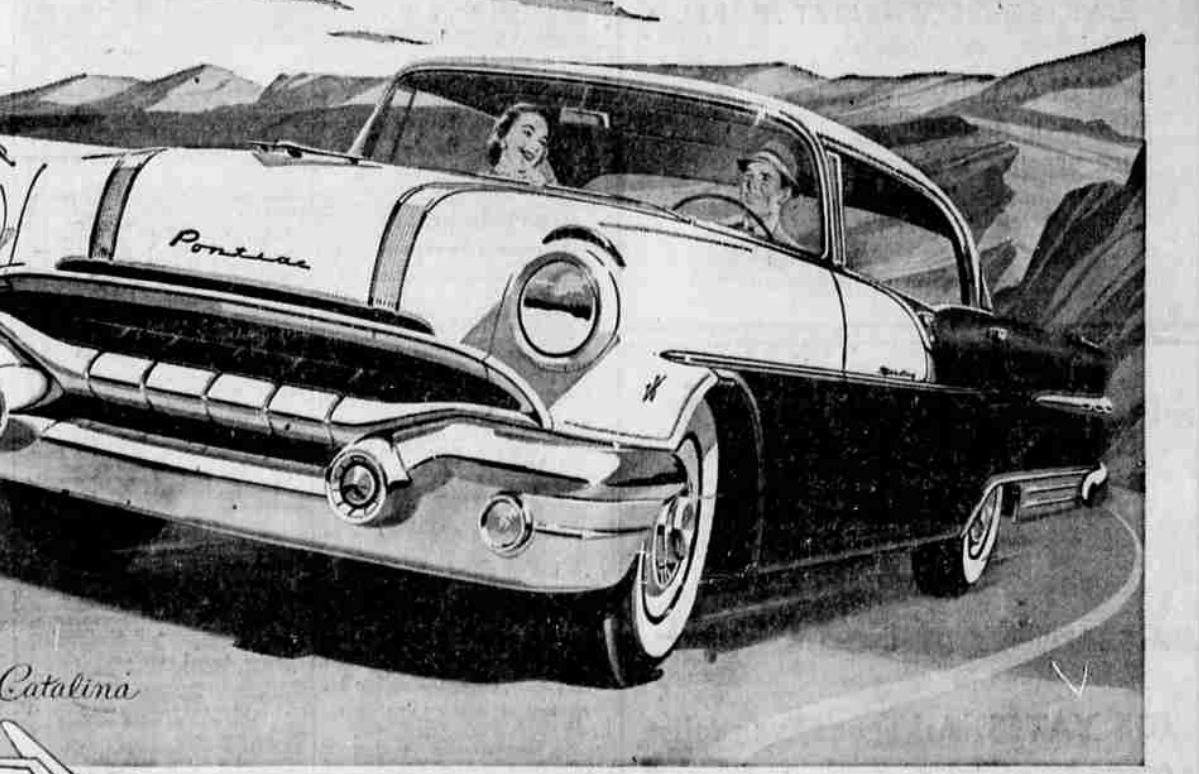
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
