**Western States Road Fund Share Near \$5 Billion**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Passage of the highway bill would make available \$4,883,078,000 for interstate roads in the 11 Western states, Rep. Mack (R-Wash.) told the House.

His own state of Washington, the congressman said, will receive three times as much federal money for highways as it now receives.

In place of the present 13 million dollars a year, he said Washington State would receive 30 million in each of the first two years and "about 40 million a year by five years from now."

Over the 12-year life of the program, Mack said, Washington would receive \$488,983,000 for interstate highways and from 12 to 15 million dollars a year for primary, secondary and urban roads.

A member of the Public Works Committee which drafted the highway bill, Mack said the 12-year apportionment of interstate road money to the 11 Western states includes:

Idaho, \$114,195,000; Oregon, \$340,103,000.

come back before the high tribunal before next year.

**Allegations Held Flimsy**  
The dissenters, Justices Clark, Reed and Minton, retorted sharply.

Clark said he and his two colleagues abhor the use of perjured testimony as much as anyone, "but we must recognize that never before have mere allegations of perjury, so flimsily supported, been considered grounds for reopening proceedings or granting a new trial."

The Communist Party, Clark said, makes no claim the government knowingly used false testimony "and it is far too realistic to contend that the board's action will be any different on remand—that is, on reconsideration."

Justice Frankfurter delivered the majority opinion on behalf of himself, Chief Justice Warren and Justices Black, Douglas, Burton and Harlan.

After a 15-month hearing, the SACB in 1953 found the party was a Communist-action organization directed to register under terms of the Internal Security Act.

Under terms of the SACB order the party would have had to list its officers and members, give detailed financial accountings, and supply an inventory of printing and mimeographing equipment. Communist fronts are subject to substantially the same requirements, except the listing of rank and file members.

In his majority opinion Frankfurter noted that the party had attacked the credibility of three government witnesses during proceedings before the U.S. Court of Appeals here.

The Appeals Court rejected the party's contention and upheld constitutionality of the 1950 act by a 2-1 vote.

Frankfurter Monday said, "we cannot pass upon a record containing such challenged testimony." The testimony involved was that of Paul Crouch, now dead; Manning Johnson, a frequent government witness in Communist cases, and Matusow, a self-styled liar. Frankfurter said the party's basis for challenging their testimony was not in existence when the board concluded its proceedings. The justice said the party therefore should have been permitted to make its allegations before the board later.

**Glide School Board Contracts For Bus Body**

The Glide school board has awarded the contract for a 66-passenger school bus body with heavy duty cowl section to Northwest Truckstell Co. of Portland at a factory price of \$3,172.74, according to correspondent Mrs. Arthur Selby.

The board had originally accepted April 9 the bid of Walter J. Roots of Portland of \$3,068. However when the board requested a cash deposit to guarantee delivery July 1, Roots demurred. He stated the factory had suffered severe loss by fire this winter and had expected to have the plant in full production to make delivery of the body according to the school board delivery date demand. But he said he did not wish to deposit a cash guarantee for the delivery.

**Psychiatry Symposium Set At Veterans Hospital**

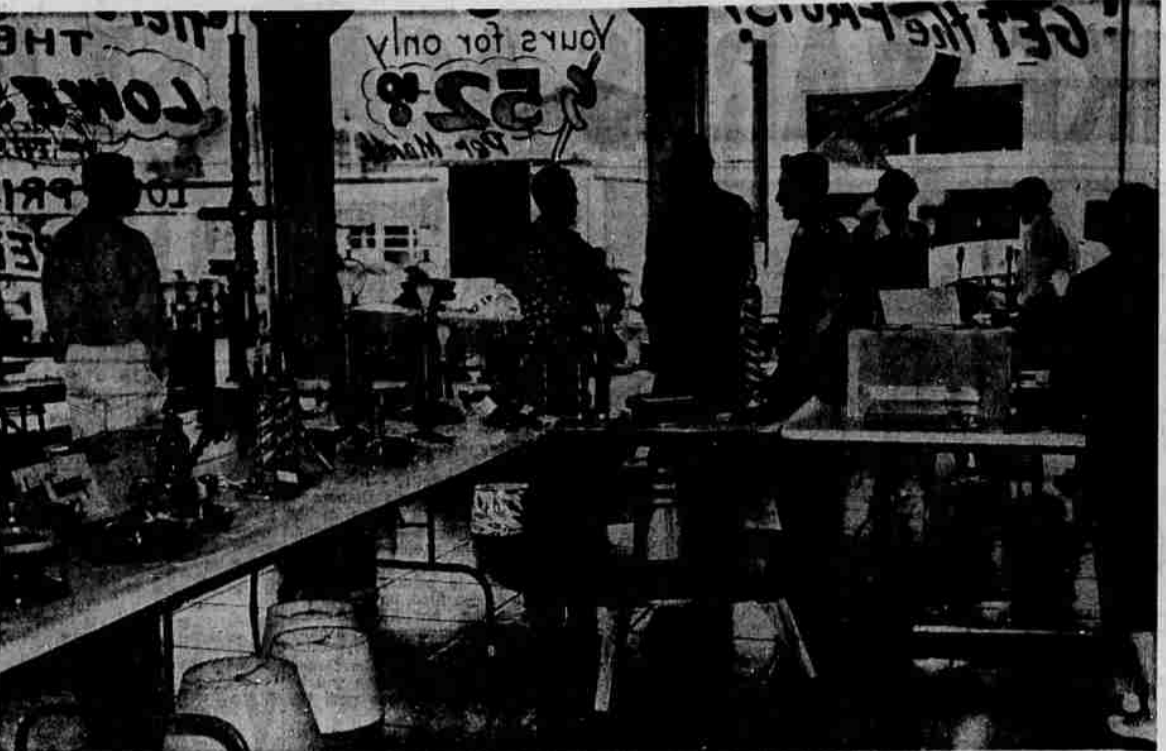
