Bill Russell Trying For 7-Foot High Jump

SAN FRANCISCO — "Not promising anything, you understand," but Bill Russell, All-American in basketball for the University of San Francisco, says he's after a world record 7-foot high jump.

Russell cleared 6-8 Monday in a track meet which USAF lost to College of the Pacific 84-49. Even with a bruised heel Russell showed a 2-inch improvement on his mark 10 days ago, when he jumped the first time since 1954.

The world record is 6-11½ by Walter Davis in 1953.

"I think I can do it now," the 6-10 Russell said. "I think I've got it whipped."

Victoria's schools are taking an amazing interest in the games. Special sections are being set aside for school children and already 40,000 tickets have been taken by the 60 schools caravans.

At the track and field, the only tickets left are the cheaper standing room only, 40,000 in all, which will be sold at the gate on the day of the events. Australians are likely to line up outside the gates for those tickets 24 hours before the events are scheduled.

Recent Sample

The recent Australian track and field championships in Melbourne were a sample of what is to be expected during the games period.

The first day—when John Landy ran his fabulous mile after stopping to pick up a fallen comrade—the gates were shut by order of the health authorities when 22,000 people had crammed into the uncompleted Olympic park.

On the game day, at Flemington race track, the first day of the big autumn carnival was being run.

Now racing in Australia is regarded as the No. 1 crowd attraction, but on that day there were 10,000 fewer punters (bettors) than on the same day last year. They were having a preview at Olympic park.

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Favored Needles Lazy In Derby Workouts

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — Needles, a strapping bay colt, remained the solid favorite for the \$2nd running of the Kentucky Derby today as 11 other 3-year-olds placed their Derby credentials on the line in the \$10,000 Trial at Churchill Downs.

But win or lose Saturday in the \$125,000 added mile and one-quarter test of speed and endurance, this smooth-striding son of Ponder will go down in thoroughbred history as the "character" horse of the 1956 Derby.

To begin with there is a slight disagreement over where he was bred. Floridians claim he was bred in their state, where he gained his greatest fame as winner of the Flamingo Stakes and Florida Derby last winter.

Actually, however, he was bred

in Kentucky. Florida got into the picture because he was foaled there after his mammy, Noodle Soup, was moved upon being purchased by William E. Leach.

Jack Dudley and Bonnie Heath of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., who made their money in oil and formed the D. & H. Stable, paid Leach \$20,000 for the colt shortly after his second birthday.

Probably no race horse ever did what he liked when he liked more often than the colt who is expected to be the 21 choice of 100,000 or more fans Saturday afternoon.

Training Suggestion

One way even dared to suggest that Needles was training himself for the race. Trainer Hugh Fountaine doesn't disagree. He admits the colt has worked only four times since winning the Florida

Derby at Gulfstream Park March 24. And a blizzard he'll get between now and Derby time.

"He doesn't like to work and makes no bones about it," said Fountaine. "He wasn't so bad as a 2-year-old but this year he has gradually been making known his feelings."
