Larger Housing Bill Approved By Subcommittee

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Housing subcommittee has approved an omnibus 1956 housing bill authorizing a much larger public housing program than President Eisenhower asked.

The bill includes a big new program of housing help for elderly persons which subcommittee chairman Sparkman (D-Ala) described as one of its most significant features.

In addition, it expands the FHA home loan authority to try to keep the private housing industry booming in the year ahead, and liberalizes terms under which FHA home improvement loans can be made.

Sparkman said the full banking committee is to act on it next Thursday.

Eisenhower asked authorization for 35,000 public housing units in each of the next two years.

But the subcommittee instead wrote into the bill language calling for a return to the 1949 act which set up an 810,000-unit public housing program.

About 300,000 units have been built so far. Thus the bill would authorize a program calling for more than 500,000 additional units.

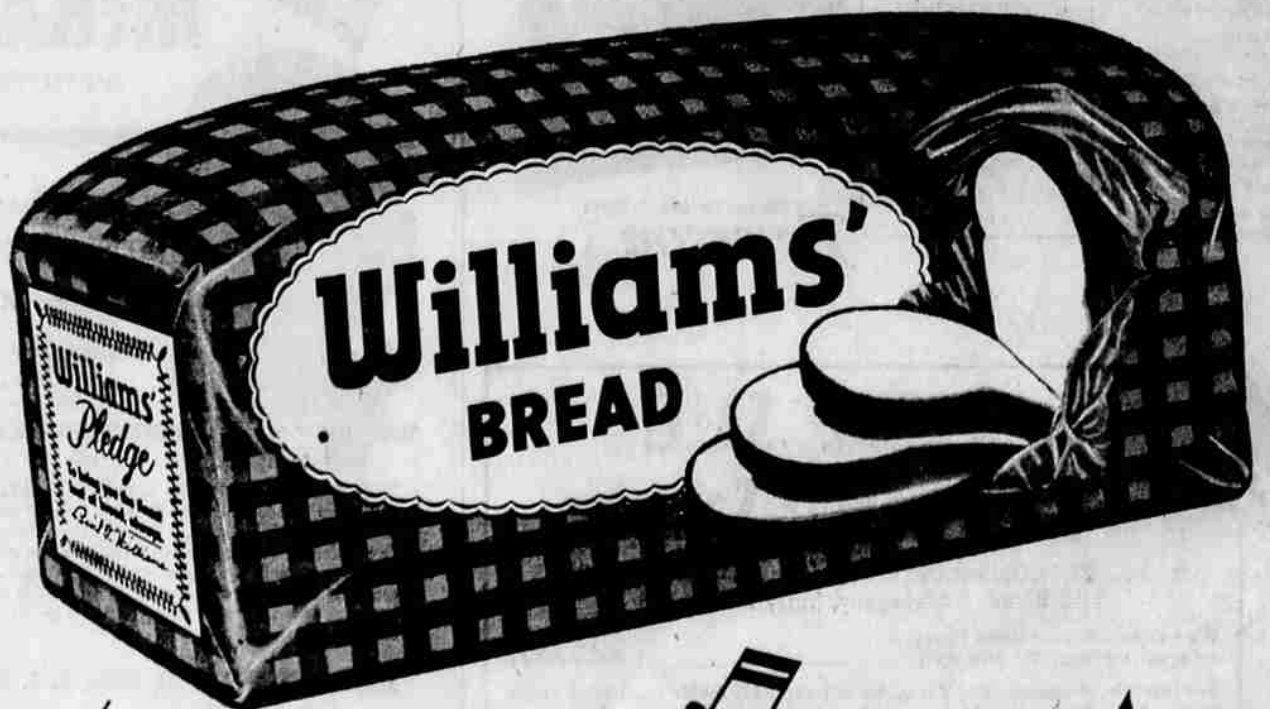
