Wholesale Food Prices Hold Steady This Week

NEW YORK (AP) — Wholesale food prices, as measured by the Dun & Bradstreet food index, held steady this week at the high point for the year reached a week ago. Decreased prices for some foods were balanced by increases for others.

At \$8.04 this week's index was the same as last week and the highest since last Nov. 15 when it stood at the same level. It was down 5.3 per cent
