Emergency Board Approves Funds For Two Schools

SALEM — The State Emergency Board voted unanimously to proceed with construction of two building projects at the University of Oregon and Oregon State College.

The projects are: Building an addition to and remodeling the Architecture and Art Building at the University, at a cost of \$530,000; and construction of a \$1,800,000 agriculture and biological science building at the college.

The Board of Higher Education had decided to award the contracts, but approval of the Emergency Board is required before construction can start.

The board granted \$51,000 in emergency funds to the MacLaren School at Woodburn to hire five more employees to take care of the increasing population at this boys' training school.

James Lamb, superintendent of the school, told the board that the rate of admissions to the school has increased 30 per cent more than a year ago.

The 1955 legislative budget, he said, contemplated a school population of 250, but there now are 310 boys in the school.

Even with the extra money he said, the school will be forced to release boys before they are ready.

The average stay at the school, Lamb said, should be 15 months, but he is being forced to reduce this to eight or nine months.

Indian Charged With Murder

WAUSAU, Wis. — A 37-year-old American Indian who stabbed four persons to death and slashed two others with a homemade hunting knife Thursday, was charged Friday with four counts of first degree murder and two counts of assault with intent to kill.

The Indian, Russell Monegar, who told authorities "I don't know why I did it," was charged with slaying his wife and mother-in-law, and the two small children of a neighbor family.

Sheriff Myron Mueller of Marathon County, said Monegar also attacked and slashed two other persons in a tavern.

"I want to get this over with as soon as possible," Monegar told County Judge R. G. Loeffler. He was bound over to circuit court for arraignment Monday.

Former Roseburg Resident Passes At Fresno, Calif.

Mrs. N. L. Ashby, nee Ardis Gorrell, died Sunday, April 30, at her home in Fresno, Calif., following a long illness. She was a descendant of a pioneer Douglas County family. She was the daughter of the late Oscar Gorrell and Mrs. Lela Gorrell, and was born Aug. 29, 1912, in the lower Calapalapa Valley near Oakland, Ore.

Her primary education was received in Oakland and Sutherland schools and she attended a high school in Eugene and was graduated from University of Oregon in 1935. Immediately after graduation she became secretary in the Lane County Clerk's office. In 1937, she took a position with a legal firm in Portland and continued there until 1947. She was married in 1940 to Norvin Lee Ashby and they made their home in the Portland area until 1953 except for one year at Lake Tahkenitch. In 1953, the family moved to California. She was a member of the Eastern Star and Methodist Church.

She is survived by her husband and a son, Thomas, of Fresno; her mother, Mrs. Lela Gorrell, of Roseburg, and a sister, Helen Gorrell, St. Thomas, Virgin Islands.

Burial was in the Belmont Memorial Park with the Rev. James Krumpe of St. Paul's Methodist Church of Fresno officiating. Eastern Star Chapter No. 555, Fresno, conducted the service of the order with interment Tuesday afternoon.

PORTLAND — An expected increase in the timber sales program will be discussed by the 16-member OAC Advisory Board at its meeting here May 15.

The board, which advises the Interior Department on policy matters in management of Oregon and California reforestation lands, is headed by Charles A. Sprague, Salem publisher.

Warmer Weather Drops Unemployed In Oregon

SALEM — Only 28,200 persons were unemployed in Oregon on May 1. Good weather in April sparked a back-to-work movement.

The total compared with 42,300 a month before, and 39,700 a year ago. The Portland area had only 10,700 jobless persons, against 17,300 a year ago.

The Unemployment Compensation Commission also reported that the upturn was led by the timber, farming and construction activities.

The commission paid out \$2,150,000 in benefits in April, 5 per cent higher than a year earlier.

11 Million Feet O&C Timber Sold Above Appraisals

The Roseburg office of the Bureau of Land Management sold more than 11 million board feet of salvage and green timber Friday, Roseburg Lumber Co. bought two of the four tracts involved.

The exact total of the four tracts was 11,135,000 board feet. The biggest tract included 5,717,000 board feet, 5,624,000 of it Douglas fir. The green timber is located on Kent Creek west of Dillard. The fir was appraised at \$39.30 and sold at \$38.25 to Roseburg Lumber. Total volume was appraised at \$172,037.80 and sold at \$216,828.10. Roseburg Lumber won after 13 bids. Other bidders were Round Prairie Lumber Co. of Dillard, Sun Studs and Umpqua Plywood of Roseburg and Martin Bros. Box Co. of Oakland.

Roseburg Lumber topped 47 bids on a salvage tract of 1,458,000 board feet on Olalla Creek. Of this total, 1,285,000 board feet were of Douglas fir appraised at \$29.30. The fir sold for \$41.25. Appraised price for the tract was \$39,416.15. It sold for \$54,532.90. Other bidders were: Martin Bros., Douglas County Lumber Co. of Winchester and Trum County Lumber Co. of Dillard.

A third tract involved green timber in the Tyee area about 16 miles west of Sutherlin. The three million board feet were appraised at \$172,037.80 and sold at \$88,742.40 to Martin Bros. Box Co. of Oakland. Douglas fir totaled 2,724,000 board feet appraised at \$31.05 per thousand. It sold for \$41.25. Other bidders were: Roseburg Lumber Co. of Dillard, L. & H. Lumber Co. of Sutherlin, Umpqua Plywood and Douglas County Lumber Co.

Green Valley Lumber Co. of Roseburg entered the highest of 21 bids on the last tract involving 960,000 board feet of green timber on North Myrtle Creek about seven miles east of Myrtle Creek. The total included 909,000 board feet of Douglas fir appraised at \$32.05. It sold for \$39. The tract was appraised at \$29,758 and sold for \$36,111.45.

Other bidders were Umpqua Plywood, Round Prairie and Roseburg Lumber Co.

The next BLM sale is scheduled June 1.

DRAFT CALL 15,000

WASHINGTON — The Army Friday issued a draft call for 15,000 men in July, 1,000 more than the previously announced quotas for May and June.

None of the other services is now using the draft. The increase in the Army call reflects decisions to boost Army strength slightly in the fiscal year starting July 1.
