Church Sniper Kills Warden, Wounds 5

NEW YORK (AP)—Police searched the city today for a sniper who killed one worshiper and wounded five others at a Romanian church. Sought in the wild Saturday night shooting was Tony Tudorache, 60, a handyman came here from Romania 30 years ago.

Detectives found a rifle and ammunition in a room Tudorache occupied across the street from St. Dumitru's Romanian Orthodox Church. He vanished after the shooting.

A volley of shots scattered a throng of 400 worshippers gathering outside the church for midnight services in celebration of the Eastern Orthodox Easter.

Tudorache shot at random. The church warden, Vasili Cucu, 66, died when a bullet struck him in the chest. The five others who were hit suffered minor injuries.

The church's priest, the Very Rev. Florian Caldau, said Tudorache "has threatened me and very many others of the congregation."

Police described Tudorache as a "disgruntled dissenter" and a heavy drinker who had lived in the neighborhood of the church for 20 years.

paigned to have their endorsements published.

Court Control Said Aim Jackson said the real reason for his decision to run was because "Mr. Ashley made brags about how he was going to control the county court after the first of January by appointing his successor." (Ashley is presently a county commissioner. He and the other member of the court would appoint his successor.)

Jackson went on to say: "I still maintain it is not fair for any man to run for another office in the same court when he has two or more years to serve of his present term, and then resign and help name his successor. We have been a long time now operating the court with only two members. Suppose Mr. Ashley were elected to the judge's position and then he and the new commissioner, who will be elected this year, could not agree on Mr. Ashley's successor. Would we go on another two years with only two men running court?"

The word battle between the two men started last Monday when Jackson at an Elkton meeting called Ashley to resign his commission and "take his chances with the rest of the candidates."

Ashley retorted later in the week that Jackson decided to file after "a small group of Republicans" got him to do so. Ashley said Jackson had earlier turned down a request by the Douglas County Central Committee.

Haystead, in a Sunday evening news broadcast on radio station KRNR, was reported to have issued the challenge to Sheriff Ira C. Byrd for a "public discussion of aims, purposes and objectives of the Douglas County Sheriff's Office."

He claimed that "I am the choice of the people. The Republican and Democratic Central Committees have endorsed me as have the labor unions."

Haystead went on to say that he will meet with the voters of Douglas County "at any time or place they may specify to discuss" his aims and purposes. He said he hoped Byrd would meet his challenge in a public discussion.

States assistance can therefore be used in helping them acquire the new weapons necessary for strengthening the common defense effort.

Eisenhower said the general magnitude of forces maintained by all countries receiving U. S. assistance "is equivalent to more than 200 divisions, over 2,000 navies and about 300 air squadrons as well as related supporting units."

Eisenhower reported that construction of five naval and air bases in Spain in "progressing satisfactorily." The United States is delivering weapons to modernize the Spanish armed forces which formed their first jet fighter plane unit during the last half of 1955, he said.

Yugoslavia, he reported, has received tanks, trucks, artillery, radio and radar and other material which together with advanced training techniques have "converted what were once largely guerrilla forces into a modern army."

Remarriage Fitness Up Plan To Ease Church Law Affecting Those Divorced Waits Methodist Action

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—A move to relax the Methodist requirements for marriage of divorced persons was before the church's law-making General Conference today.

A committee on the ministry, headed by the Rev. James A. Chubb, of Grand Island, Neb., recommends that pastors be directed only to exercise "special care" in determining the fitness of divorced persons to marry.

Under the present church discipline, ministers are instructed not to marry divorced persons whose former spouses are living except in these specific circumstances:

1. When it is "clearly established by competent testimony" that the person was the "innocent person" in a divorce caused by "adultery or other vicious conditions which through mental or physical cruelty or physical per invalidation of the marriage vow."
2. When divorced couples want to be reunited in marriage to each other.

Under the present rule, Methodist pastors would not "solemnize the marriage of a divorced person whose wife or husband is living and unmarried."

The present position is defended by a group of delegates who are opposing the committee recommendations. Both sides are agreed on the following portion of the discipline:

A minister shall solemnize the marriage of a man and woman only when, in his judgment, they are emotionally, morally and spiritually fitted for such marriage."

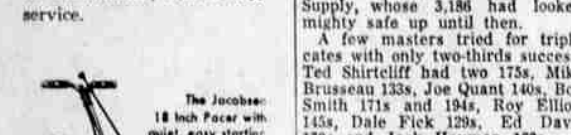

cost is by a 6-mill levy on the assessed valuation of property, a monthly sewer service charge of \$3 (figure lowered by 50 cents from previous reports), a direct property assessment of 2 cents per square foot and a service connection of \$75.

5. The committee says the report indicates all developed property outside the initially proposed sewer district would be assessed 6 mills on assessed valuation and be charged a service of \$1.50 per month. It says all undeveloped property outside the initial sewer district pays 6 mills on assessed valuation.

6. The committee also quotes from the report that "an overwhelming majority" of the vote would be necessary to make construction possible.
