Democrats Ahead In Multnomah

PORTLAND (AP)—Multnomah County has reported here that Democrats have forged further in front in voter registration, possibly presaging a statewide lead for the Democrats this year.

The Democrats, who led by 16,388 in the primaries of 1952 and by 17,661 in 1954, now have a lead of 22,073, Registrar James W. Gleason said as he reported final county registration figures.

There are 137,597 Democrats and 115,524 Republicans.

At Salem the state elections chief, Dave O'Hara, said a Democratic trend has shown in almost all of the 20 counties that have reported final registration figures.

The Republicans held a statewide lead of 5,023 in 1952 and 2,41 in 1954 when 404,694 Republicans and 402,283 Democrats were registered.

In Multnomah County women have taken the lead in both parties. For years they have been ahead of men in Republican registrations. This year they took the lead in Democratic registrations also. There are 53,342 male Republicans and 62,182 female. There are 67,535 male Democrats and 69,962 female.

Central Lincoln PUD Sets 4-Year Improvement Plan

A four-year program of improvements, extending through 1960, is being set up by the Central Lincoln Public Utilities District in western Douglas County, according to the Port Umpqua Courier, Reedsport.

Nearly 2 million dollars of a total of nearly 5 1/2 million may be spent in the area. It includes \$1,509,470 in system additions and improvements. The rest of the money will be spent for equipment.

Voters of the district, which covers the coast from Depoe Bay to Reedsport, will have the final say in the improvement program. An election on \$2,925,000 in proposed revenue bonds has been set for May 18.

The remainder of the improvements would come from general revenues of the system.

The program has been based on an expected increase in consumption of electricity in the next four years. The increase is expected to be from the present 194 kilowatt-hours to 1,722 million kilowatt-hours in 1960.

The figures mentioned are in addition to \$38,500 ticketed for a new office building in Reedsport, the construction of which was announced last week.

A letter was read which will be sent to the Grayhound Bus Company requesting that certain buses be routed into Glendale since the present bus stop is on the highway.

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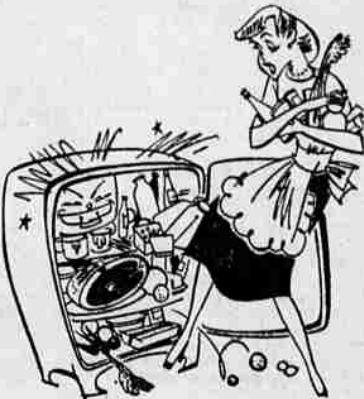
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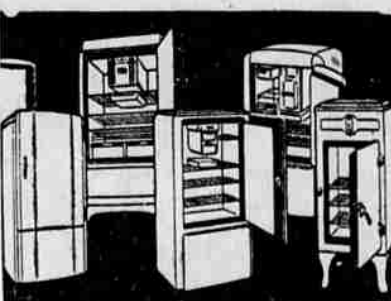
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
