

Next Landy-Bailey Contest Set For Olympic Tryouts

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Australian John Landy gets another chance to break his mile record at Fresno Saturday but he won't get another

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shot at his conquerer and fellow countryman Jim Bailey until fall. Bailey, the University of Oregon junior and collegiate mile champion, beat Landy and smashed the American mile record here Saturday with a 3:58.6 performance—the first mile ever run under 4 minutes in the United States.

Next on Jim's calendar is the Pacific Coast Conference Northern Division meet, which won't permit a rematch with Landy at Fresno's West Coast Relays. Then Bailey will run in defense of his NCAA title and in August head back to Australia in quest of a spot on the Olympic team.

That's when the business student whose home is in Sydney will probably meet schoolmaster Landy of Melbourne.

"I'm confident of running better at Fresno," said Landy after losing by a stride to his countryman. "I was satisfied with the time. I didn't think he'd run better than 4:02."

John was clocked at 3:58.7, compared with his world mark of 3:58 set in 1934 at Turku, Finland. He made no excuses for his defeat by the powerful Bailey, who took over the lead about 110 yards from the finish. He'd started his move with 220 left and thought his nearness would just give Landy impetus to go on to a fast time.

"I didn't think I could do it," said the 26-year-old Australian of his victory.

Sports Needles Awaits Two Big Races

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — The question of whether Needles, 1956 Kentucky Derby winner, is a great horse is still to be answered but there's no doubt he is one of the most exciting 3-year-olds in many a year.

The Preakness at Pimlico May 19 and the Belmont Stakes at Belmont Park June 16 should furnish the answer to the greatness question. It was still being argued today as the stragglers of the 100,000 who sat in on Saturday's thrilling race departed for home and Derbytown returned to normalcy.

In the morning work hours this bay son of Jack Dudley of Stillwater, Okla., and Bonnie Heath of Tulsa, Okla., and Fort Lauderdale, Fla., is a temperamental playboy who gets his own way more often than not.

But in the afternoon he is a ruthless businessman, never content until he has ripped aside all his opposition and achieved his objective.

That is the way he won the \$167,550 Derby by three quarters of a length over Calumet Farm's Fabius and left 15 other top 3-year-olds trailing far back.

Earnings \$462,055

The Derby victory, coming on top of two 100-grand triumphs in Florida, boosted Needles' earnings for the year to \$332,250 and for less than two seasons of campaigning to \$462,055.

Needles' Derby time of 2:03.4 for the mile and one quarter over the lightning-fast Churchill Downs track was slow compared to Whirlaway's record of 2:01.4 made in 1941.

That's where the argument starts over whether the Florida colt is a great horse. Those who say not point at the time.

A length and a half back of Fabius in third place was Come On Red, a horse that wasn't even supposed to start unless the track was muddy.

Huskies Draw Two-Year Probation By PCC

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The University of Washington Sunday was indirectly assessed \$32,000 and was placed on probation for two years by the Pacific Coast Conference.

The huge fine and stiff probation came after a PCC commissioner investigation into the operation of a downtown Seattle "slush fund" to aid U W athletes.

The probation means the end to chances for a Washington appearance in the Rose Bowl until 1959 and a ban on post-season tournament play by the Husky basketball team, as well as other minor restrictions.

The action was announced at the conclusion of a two-day meeting of PCC athletic directors and faculty representatives who considered only the Washington situation.

At the end of the meeting, Dr. Glenn Seaborg, University of California representative and conference spokesman, made it clear the conference is not through digging into the Washington situation. He added that if names of athletes who have been taking the under-the-table payments are learned they will be declared permanently ineligible for amateur competition.

Trackmen, Crew Safe

The probation restrictions will not become effective until August 1. Hence Washington track and field men and the Washington crew will get a chance to try out for the Olympic Games this summer.

Victor O. Schmidt, PCC commissioner, told newsmen he had made three trips to Seattle this spring to check on operation of the so-called slush fund, officially known as the Greater Washington Advertising Fund, and that both

he and the University of Washington had been refused permission to look at the funds books. He said Roscoe C. (Torchy) Torrance, Seattle businessman and U.W. alumnus, had admitted administering the fund for the benefit of Husky graders. Sources outside the conference said the payments ran up as high as \$60 a month.

Probation restrictions will prevent any Washington team from being listed as a conference champion, or competing in any post-season or all conference competition, in effect limiting Washington to dual competition in all athletic activities.

No Rose Bowl Cash

In addition, the restrictions prevent Washington from participating in any of the receipts, gate, TV or radio, from the annual Rose Bowl game with the Big Ten. Since the annual return to Coast Conference schools from the Rose Bowl is \$25,000 or more, the probation has the effect of a \$52,000 fine.

The action closely parallels that of the NCAA last week in placing Auburn, Florida and Louisville on probation for violation of athletic recruiting rules, although the PCC financial stab was considerably deeper than any assessed by the NCAA.

The stiff penalty meted out to Washington drew gasps in Seattle, even though school officials had fully expected a severe wrist-slapping at least following the disclosure of the downtown slush fund.

University Vice President H. P. (Dick) Everest accused the San Francisco meeting of "abandoning judicial procedure for the sake of expediency."

"Apparently they felt," Everest

said, "that with all the publicity on Washington football, some drastic action had to be taken. But they made no consideration of facts."

He said he was "amazed that the restrictions apply to all sports. It went so far that it took completely beyond the bounds of all reason."

Everest, a former faculty representative, said he knew of no machinery through which Washington could appeal.

The existence of the slush fund became known shortly after a group of football players at the Husky school revolted against then Coach Johnny Cherberg at the close of the 1955 season.

The uproar led, eventually, to the firing of Cherberg and the resignation of Harvey Cassill, athletic director at Washington.

Darrell Royal, who moved to Washington from Mississippi State to take over the reins once held by Cherberg, was one of the first to comment after the probation and fine were announced, saying: "We still have 20 games scheduled in the next two years—that's the thing to remember."

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Parry O'Brien Heaves Shot To New World's Standard

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — It looks like the Amateur Athletic Union will have to revise its record books again to make way for another record-shattering performance by shot-putter Parry O'Brien.

Last Saturday O'Brien uncorked a mighty toss that sent the 16-pound shot 61 feet, one inch—three inches better than his own official outdoor world mark. The toss was made on O'Brien's fifth and last attempt at the Intermountain AAU track and field meet here.

Regional AAU Chairman Nate Long said he would submit the mark to Daniel J. Ferris, executive secretary of the AAU in New York.

"There is no reason, as far as I can see," Long said, "why it will not be recognized."

O'Brien, who is warming up for the Olympic Games in Australia, set the official outdoor shot put record of 60 feet, 10 inches, in Los Angeles, July 11, 1954. The husky Air Force lieutenant also holds the indoor record of 61 feet, 5 1/4 inches, set last February in New York.

Washington Thumps OSC

CORVALLIS, Ore. (AP) — Sophomore John Zaeffel drove in six runs as Washington defeated Oregon State, 9-5, in a Northern Division baseball game here Saturday.

The hard hitting second baseman's batting spree included a bases-loaded double in the fourth which scored three runs. He also had two singles, good for two more counters.

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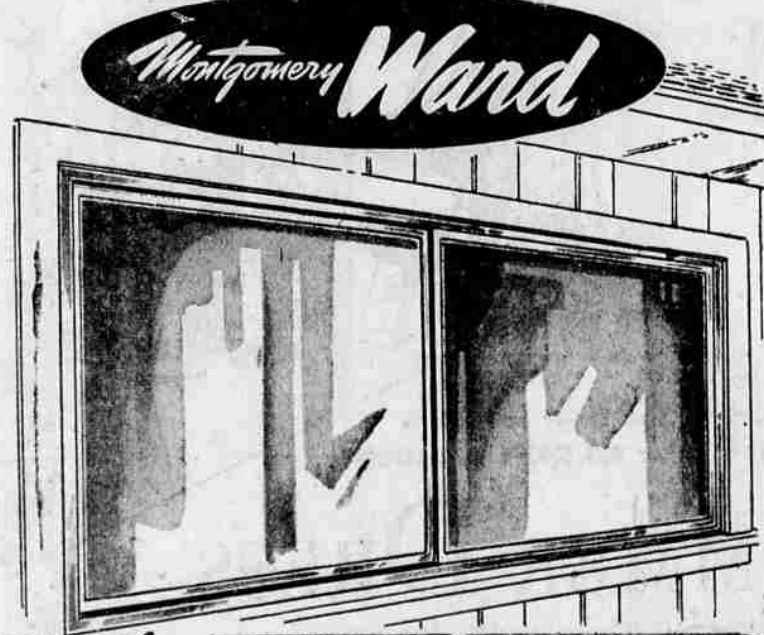
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
