100 Schoolchildren, Teachers On Train Injured In Crash

WAUKESHA, Wis. — More than 100 schoolchildren and teachers were injured yesterday when their baseball excursion train was wrecked in a collision with a loaded gravel truck.

The diesel locomotive remained on the tracks, but 10 of the 16 cars hurtled off the rails. The train was carrying 907 pupils and their adult escorts from Portage in south central Wisconsin to Milwaukee for a Milwaukee-Brooklyn baseball game.

A total of 104 persons were admitted to two hospitals. Thirty-seven, 23 of them children, remained overnight. None were listed in critical condition.

The truck driver, Gordon Hinckley, 35, Wales, Wis., suffered compound fractures of both legs and internal injuries, but was listed in "fair" condition.

The crash occurred at the DuPlainville crossing, five miles west of Milwaukee.

Engineer George Ives, 56, Oconomowoc, said the truck "hit the first coach so hard that gravel was thrown over the coaches. That car was struck so hard that it went off the track first, causing derailment of the other nine coaches."

Ives said the crossing is designated as a 70 m.p.h. zone and that he had slowed down to that speed.

Oil Companies Here Charged As Being Unfair

PORTLAND — There appear to have been some unfair trade practices by some oil companies in Portland, Medford and Roseburg, a congressional investigator said here Friday night.

Philip Jehle, counsel for the Senate Small Business Committee, who has been looking into complaints that some firms were manipulating prices and granting subsidies to favored dealers, did not go into detail as he left Portland for Washington, D. C.

The complaints were made by the Portland Automotive Trades Assn.

"I do think your gasoline prices are a little high out here, but that is in no way a reflection on the dealers," Jehle said.

He said it would be up to the committee to decide whether to hold hearings on the situation.

Former Riddle Resident Dies In Oakland, Calif.

Mrs. Walter S. Britt, formerly of Riddle, died at her home in Oakland, Calif., May 1 at the age of 96.

She was born in New York on April 8, 1860. She moved to Riddle in 1885 and had lived the past several years in California.

Tito Asks Closer Link Between His Country, France

PARIS — President Tito of Yugoslavia Tuesday called for closer links between France and his country "to demonstrate our common will to consolidate peace in the world."

Tito, on a state visit to France, spoke at a reception in the gaily decorated Hotel de Ville (town hall) of Paris.

Strict security precautions prevailed as the Communist chief of state drove from the Elysee Palace to the Hotel de Ville. He moved between double lines of police. Firemen perched on rooftops all along the route closely watching all windows.

French officials said the security measures were taken at the request of the Yugoslavia embassy.

A large crowd—most people were off Tuesday in France to commemorate V-E Day—stood behind the fences watching the Tito motorcade but there were no cheers.

Tito and his foreign minister, Koca Popovic, conferred Tuesday afternoon with Premier Guy Mollet and Foreign Minister Christian Pineau of France.

Monday night Tito spoke at a state dinner. He warned against the danger of nuclear war, and urged a search for new paths of understanding between East and West.

Federal Funds Sought To Pay Fishing Losses

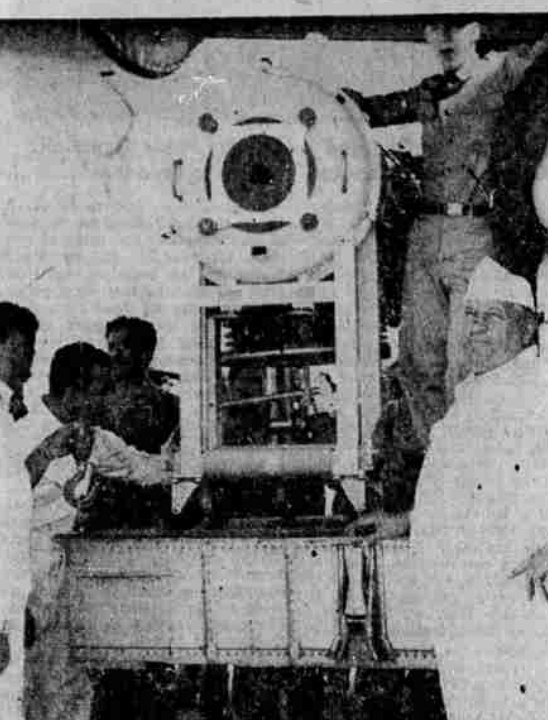
WASHINGTON — Congressional approval of funds to pay for fishing losses through construction of The Dalles lock and dam was sought Monday by representatives of two Pacific Northwest Indian tribes.

Spokesmen for the Umatilla and Yakima Indians told a Senate Appropriations subcommittee the annual fish catch at the Celilo Falls fishery is valued at approximately \$700,000. The fishing grounds will be under water when the dam is completed.

Some 23 million dollars have been recommended for the Umatilla, Yakima and Warm Spring tribes.

Of this amount 15 million would go to the Yakimas and about four million each to the Umatilla and Warm Spring tribes.

The Warm Spring Indians are to be heard later in the week.

Sec. Wilson Says Bomber Production 20 A Month, Outstripping Russian Plan

WASHINGTON — Secretary of Defense Wilson Tuesday disclosed the production schedule for B52 bombers has been raised to 20 a month, and said "it is not so" that the Soviets are "far outstripping the United States in terms of air power."

Wilson said the present output of the eight-jet, intercontinental, B52 is six a month although production had been planned at the rate of 17 a month.

He said he would have preferred to keep these figures secret, but "because of the confusion and doubt that have arisen on this matter I believe it desirable to set the record straight."

The secretary of defense was before a Senate Appropriations subcommittee to discuss the military budget for the government fiscal year which begins July 1. He said actual expenditures in the fiscal year would be about \$6 billion.

This amount of money, Wilson commented, is "nearly 100 million dollars per day" and is a cost "we must pay through taxes."

At the outset, Wilson stressed two points:

1. "The United States is not and should not be competing in an all-out armaments race with the U.S.S.R. or any other country." He said this would be the same as turning over to Russia "the responsibility for designing and determining the size and scope of our defense establishment." He also said some critics fail to take into account the total air strength of the United States.

2. There has been "no change in the international situation which would require us to increase our forces over all or make it possible for us at this time to reduce our forces."

As Wilson testified, he was flanked in the committee room by the secretaries of the Army, Navy and Air Force and by the full membership of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

Wilson said he would confine his comments to "key aspects" of the defense program and leave details to other officials.

At one point Wilson characterized critics who contend the United States is falling behind Russia in technical know-how as "fear mongers."

Wilson said the B52 "is a fine airplane and is living up to or exceeding its designed specifications."

Wilson said also that the Air Force has had "less difficulty with the B52 in its early phases than with any other airplane in recent years."

Referring to this country's overall air strength, Wilson said that in the year starting on July 1, the Air Force will have more than 25,000 active military aircraft, the Navy and Marine Corps will have more than 12,000 and the Army will have over 4,000.

He said that a recently announced decision to beef up heavy bomber wings from 30 to 45 planes will add 50 per cent to this country's long-range striking power. This increase in aircraft strength per wing will be accomplished as B52's replace the slower but still powerful B36's in the 11 heavy bomber wings of the Strategic Air Command.

Wilson also implied that critics of the U.S. air power tend to neglect consideration of the B47 medium jet bombers, which Wilson described as "the heart of our strategic striking power."

He said that these six-jet bombers, operating from overseas bases or with aerial refueling, have "true intercontinental capabilities" and that these medium bomber wings "represent the most powerful single element of air power in the world today."

The Air Force is known to have more than 1,500 B47s, organized into 28 wings.

Wilson said also that any assessment of U.S. air striking power must include the Navy's operation of 15 large carriers "all of which carry aircraft with an atomic capability."

He said the development and procurement of guided missiles has been given "great emphasis" in that nearly 3 billion dollars will be devoted to it.

WASHINGTON — The White House has turned down a request that President Eisenhower have his picture taken on the Capitol steps with former Presidents Truman and Hoover.

James C. Hagerty, presidential news secretary, said he doubts there is much interest in such a picture. And he added it would seem to be "an unwarranted inconvenience and an intrusion" on the time of the former presidents to ask them to travel to Washington for the picture-taking.

Sen. Jackson (D-Wash.) made public Hagerty's reply to the suggestion, which came from Ralph Theriault of Warden, Wash. Jackson had sent Theriault's letter to the White House last week. The comments by Hagerty were in his letter addressed to Jackson.

It was Theriault's view that the country may never again have two living ex-presidents, and that a picture of them with Eisenhower would be one "that might go down in history as of great value."

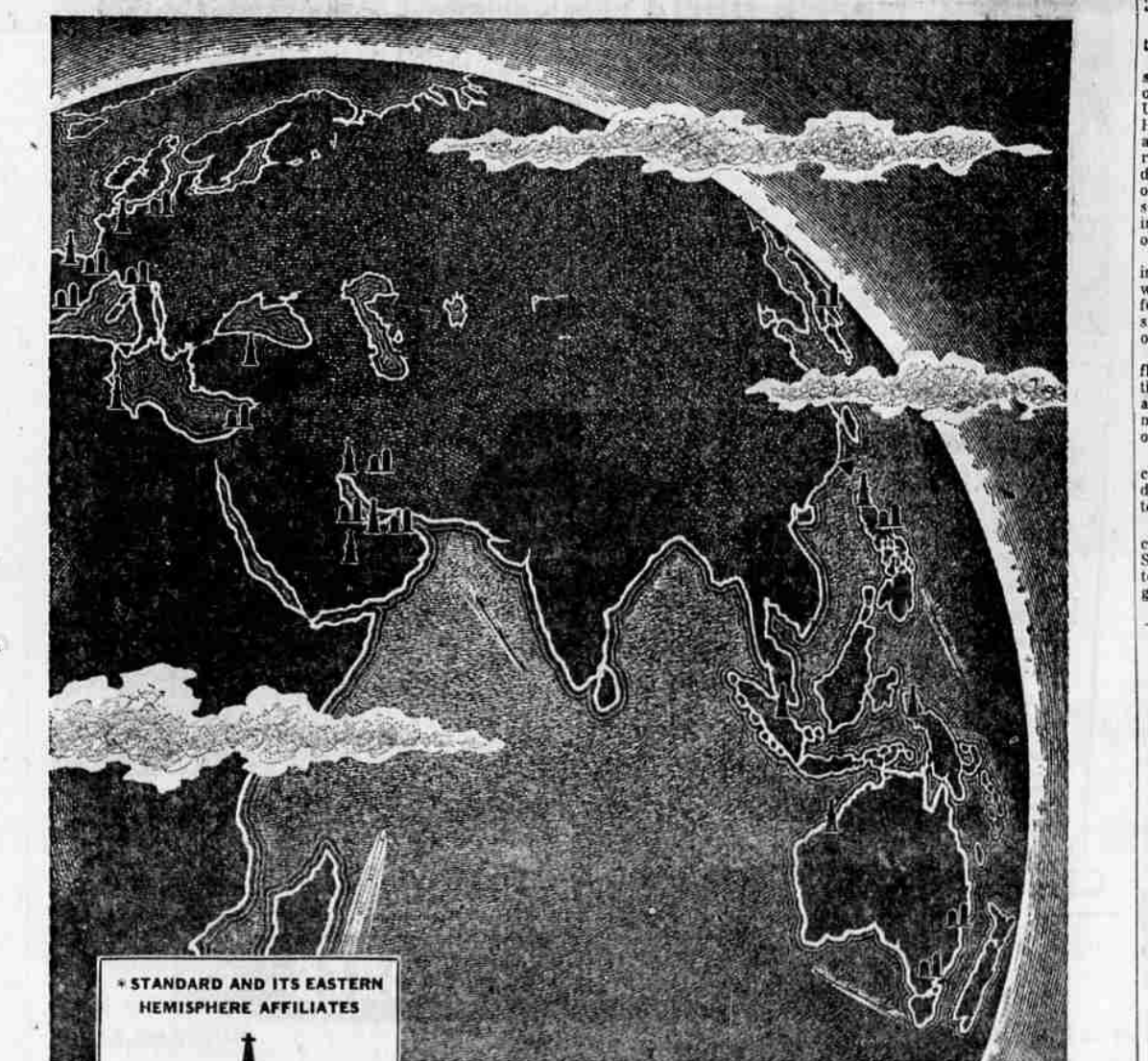
