

Angry Wife Pours Hot Lye Over Sleeping Mate

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—Police today are holding for investigation a 30-year-old mother of four children who they say poured a hot lye solution over her sleeping husband.

The husband, Ransom Savannah, 37, is in serious condition at Grant Hospital. Doctors say he has third-degree burns over a large part of his body and may lose the sight in both eyes. They are considering cornea transplants in an effort to save his vision.

Police said Savannah's wife Nettie told them she was angered by an argument with husband, and so heated a pot of water, added half a can of lye and poured the solution over him while he slept.

Winthrop Gardner Jr. said yesterday that during their married life from 1949 to 1953 he and Miss Henie had only two weeks of living together alone. "Her mother was with her all the time," he said.

Gardner testified also that Miss Henie agreed before their marriage to quit show business. "Instead," he said, "she made more contracts and kept the show until it was apparent she had no intention of being a wife."

Miss Henie, who recently took a troupe to South America, has denied Gardner's allegations of desertion and has said he was not a dutiful husband, as he contends.
