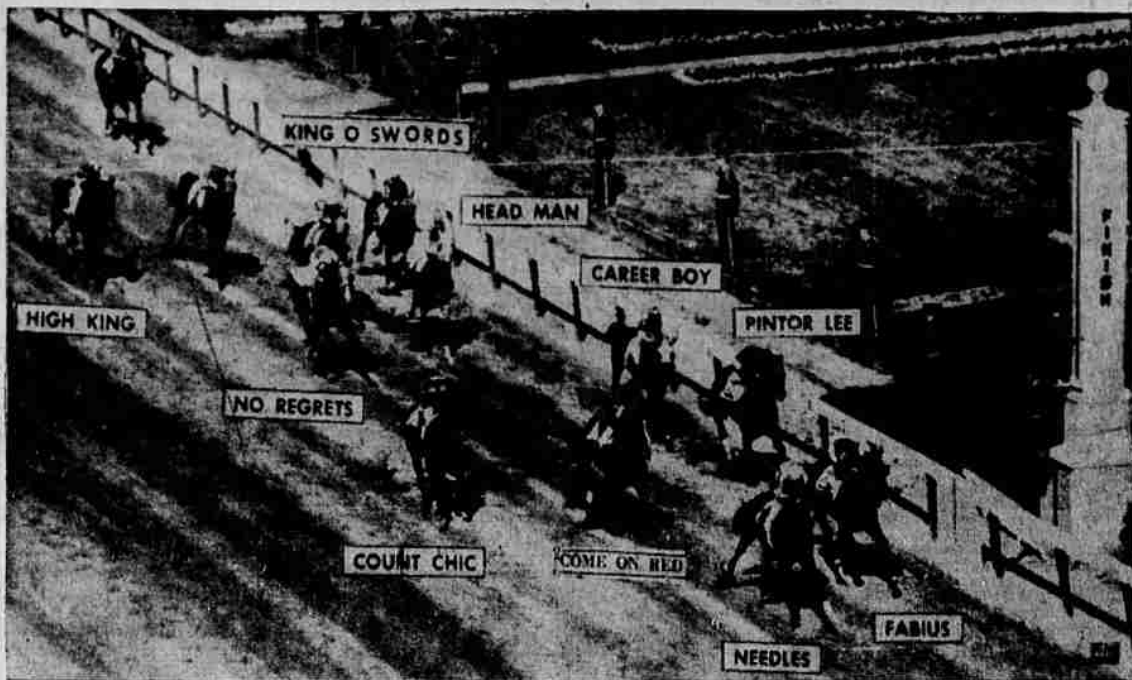

George Zuverink, the guy nobody wanted, right now is the No. 1 relief pitcher in the American League, getting the job done almost on a daily basis for the Baltimore Orioles who can hardly do a thing without him.

The 29-year-old right-hander, who in his 11-year career has failed to hang on with Cleveland, Cincinnati and Detroit and who wound up in semipro ball as a free agent after his first year in the minors, has strolled in from the bullpen in 12 of Baltimore's 20 games this season. And of the nine games the

Birds have won to date, he's saved six and won two.

Zuverink, purchased in desperation from Detroit last July, was called upon for the third time in two days Monday night and with two pitches snapped off a Tiger rally and picked up a 4-3 victory that lifted Baltimore into sixth place while reducing his earned run average to a nifty 1.50.

Pitchers Star
Pitching was the pass word in the other three games played in the majors Monday, too. In the American, Tom Brewer struck out nine and cut off Cleveland on four hits in a 5-1 Boston victory. In the National, Milwaukee's Bob Buhl beat Brooklyn 3-1 on six hits to retain the Braves' slim hold on first place, and St. Louis, helped by a weird five-run inning and dandy relief pitching by Lindy McDaniel, Gordon Jones and Jackie Collum, smacked the New York Giants 6-3 to tie the Cincinnati for second place.

Zuverink, who finished both ends of Baltimore's doubleheader sweep against Detroit Sunday, came on last night after the Tigers had scored a tying run off starter Bill Wight in the ninth. Zuverink's second pitch to Harvey Kuenn was rapped into an inning-ending double play. Then after relief Al Aber had walked the bases full in the Baltimore ninth, Hal Smith banged a single to break it up.

Brewer won his third against one defeat by granting Cleveland only two singles in eight innings. He retired the first 16 men in order, striking out seven, while the Red Sox were pasting Mike Garcia for 11 hits and four runs in five frames. Billy Goodman singled and tripled for the Bostonians while Dick Gernert and Norm Zaechin homered.

Buhl, now 2-0, had the help of two killing double plays while dumping the champion Brooks to their third straight defeat. Del Crandall drove in two runs and Hank Aaron homered as Carl Erskine lost his second.

Three singles, two of them bunts, three walks, a hit batsman, a wild pitch and a sacrifice fly brought the Cards from behind as starter-loser Windy McCall, Hoyt Wilhelm and Mary Grissom had their troubles in the sixth inning. Red Schoendienst, who has hit safely in 15 straight games, singled the tie breaker across in the

Spokane Makes Open Golf Pitch

SPOKANE, Wash.—Spokane's Athletic Round Table, famous for promoting big time sports events here, is out looking for another classic to back. This time it's the National Women's Open Golf Tournament.

The ART board, headed by President Joe Albi, announced Monday night it is attempting to bring the tournament to Spokane's new Esmeralda golf course in 1957.

The board said it had been in touch with Bob Renner of Fort Wayne, Ind., tournament director for the Ladies' Professional Golf Assn. The ART received a letter from Renner last week which said that, "we'd like to get together."

It was the ART that sponsored the first U.S. Women's Open which was played here in 1948. The club put up a purse of \$25,000 in defense bonds for the event. Patty Berg of Minneapolis collected \$7,500 in bonds, worth \$5,600 in cash for her win.

Since then, the records show, most of the women's opens have offered cash purses of between \$7,500, the LPGA minimum for the open, and \$10,000.

The Round Table didn't disclose the exact amount offered for next year's tournament, but ART officials said if the size of the purse has anything to do with the decision, "we're reasonably certain they'll accept our offer."

"We don't think anyone else in the United States will go higher," the board concluded.

This year's open will be played in Duluth, and Renner advised the ART that no site has been chosen for the 1957 tourney. The United States Golf Assn., which for the last three years has taken direction of the Women's Open, also would have to authorize the 1957 site.
