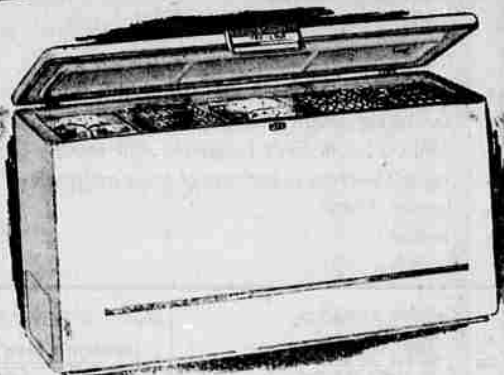
Mrs. Ray Morin and daughter, Pat, Jack Grimes and Harold Minter spent the weekend visiting relatives in West Linn and Portland.

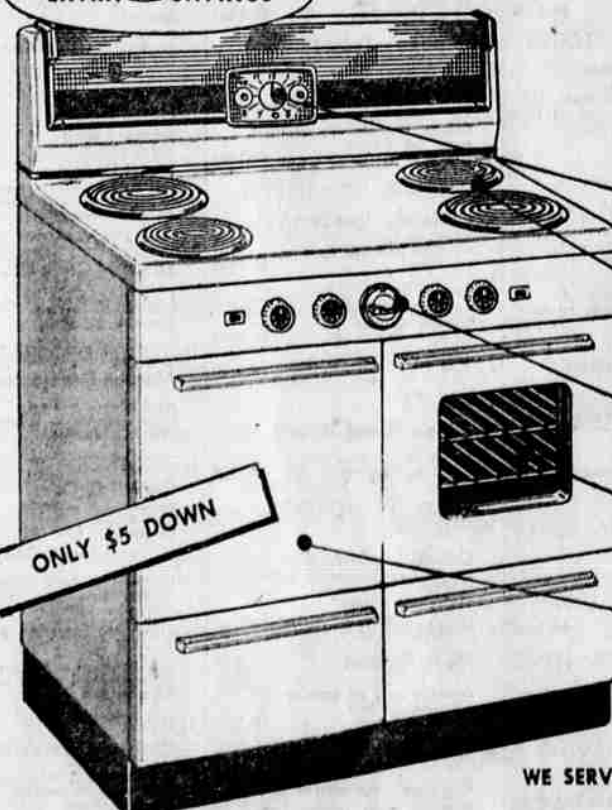

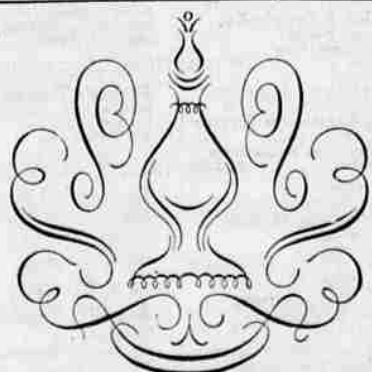
