

Symphony Group To Offer Special Concert Attractions

Three special attractions have been announced for the concluding concert of the 1955-56 season of the Roseburg Symphony Orchestra.

The program Monday at 8 p.m. in Central Junior High School auditorium will feature pianist Karen Halladay, violinist Glenn Radford and the Roseburg High School capella choir.

Miss Halladay, winner of the Young Artist Contest sponsored by the Roseburg Symphony Orchestra Society earlier this year, will play the first movement of the Bach Piano Concerto in D Minor. Mrs. Radford, wife of Dr. Richard Radford, Myrtle Creek instructor, will play the first two movements of the Mozart Violin Concerto No. 4. The choir will be heard in three choral numbers with no incidental solos.

Each will be accompanied by the orchestra.

Director Wendell Johnson said the orchestra had planned to introduce Mrs. Radford to music lovers next fall. However, she and her husband will be returning to California this summer, and the introduction was moved ahead. Mrs. Radford was well known as a musician during her college days at the College of Idaho. She had given her first recital at the age of 11.

She has played with the College of Marin Symphony and the Redland Community Symphony. She and her husband are returning to Redland where they will work professionally in music.

Tickets for the last concert of the current season may be purchased in Roseburg music stores and at the door the night of the concert.

Leavengood New District Ranger

G. Robert Leavengood will be the new district ranger for the Diamond Lake district, according to Vondis E. Miller, forest supervisor of the Umpqua National Forest.

Leavengood replaces Gordon R. Sanford who was recently transferred to the Willamette National Forest as district ranger of the Rigdon District with headquarters at Oakridge.

Leavengood has been district ranger in the Lakes district, Mount Hood National Forest, since 1952. Receiving his BS degree in Forestry from Michigan State College in 1942, he obtained his initial appointment with the Forest Service on the Umatilla National Forest the same year. He later occupied various timber management positions in the Rogue River National Forest before his appointment as district ranger for the Lakes District.

Mr. and Mrs. Leavengood will move to Umpqua and be at Big Camas Ranger Station after May 14.

Flood Control Reservoir Splits, Flooding Town

CONNELL, Wash. (AP)—An earth dam at a flood control reservoir split wide open and up to two feet of muddy water rolled in on this Franklin County town of 850 persons Tuesday night.

The 10-foot dam a mile east of town broke after a heavy rain storm to bring the community its second flood of the year. The Esquatzel Coulee overflowed in February.

Water stood about eight inches deep inside the postoffice soon after the dam was breached. Some lawns were washed out and houses surrounded by water.

Frank Havalin, a farmer who lives near the dam, rushed to town to warn residents as the dam collapsed. The town fire siren was sounded to bring out volunteers for sandbag work.

The flood water, bringing with it tons of rich top soil, swept down through the south side of town, flooding the basements of homes and business establishments.

Rebuttal Is Presented By Green Dissolutionists

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"It would appear if we act properly we may have these requests approved even though no sewer is yet available," etc.

In reference to point five of the report, the dissolution group asks "how can we expect the backing of the community when approximately 50 per cent of the voters wishes are ignored." The dissolutionists also questioned the "unbiased" report which it says called for opinion outside the district without "making an effort to solve the problem or to find what voters expressed dissatisfaction with the present sewer system."

In the statement, the dissolution committee said the committee did not attend meetings of the sanitary board or present the reports from the people "they have found to be interested in the problem." In concluding rebuttal, the dissolutionists question why the citizens' committee has "chosen to ignore the engineers' recommendations that all facts be made available to all the voters?"

Wimberly Assigns Case To Judge Woodrich

Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly signed an order Thursday assigning the case of Harold Raper vs. Virgil W. Thompson to Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich.

The action followed a motion by the attorneys for Raper that a "fair and impartial trial" would not be possible before Judge Wimberly because of alleged prejudice against Spencer W. Yates, one of Raper's attorneys.

Yates' appeal of a contempt of court conviction by the judge is still pending.

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city's needs, said Carstens. It will take about three-fourths of a city block to meet space needs.

The postmaster said the GSA has proposed remodeling the present building, but at the same time recognizes that the building is too small.

However, he said the Post Office Dept. has Roseburg at the head of its priority list for a new building. That probably will end the GSA proposal, according to Carstens. Remodeling of the federal building, he estimated, would cost in the neighborhood of \$25,000 to \$30,000.

The present federal building, which also houses Umpqua National Forest, Siskiyou-Cascade Forest Research Center and Internal Revenue Service offices, was built in 1916-17 at a cost of \$84,000. A new building would cost "several hundred thousand" dollars, the postmaster estimated.

Specifications of a new building would be that it would contain at least 12,000 square feet of floor space—more than double the present space—and that it would be located near the central business district.

The large lot is needed because of the turn of highway transportation of mail rather than by rail. Much of the area would be for parking space for government vehicles.

But another reason is that a new building would have at least two drive-up windows where patrons could be served from their cars, thus eliminating a curbside parking problem.

The Post Office Dept. wouldn't actually build a new building. In fact, no new federal building has been constructed by federal funds since 1938.

The practice now is to call for bids on a building constructed to government specifications. Then the government takes a 10-year lease on the building, with the option to renew after that period.

Carstens said the lesser obviously would have to invest considerable capital in such a venture.

Both the GSA and the Post Office Dept. have recognized need for new quarters for the past six years, according to Carstens.

The need, he said, has been brought about by the quadrupling of postal business during the city's boom period of the past decade. The present building now is so crowded that work is handicapped, he said. There isn't "half enough space at the present time."

What the disposition of the present building would be is a matter of conjecture. Carstens said it might be sold as an office building. Again, it might be retained to continue housing of the federal agencies now tenants in the building.

By late afternoon security forces had restored calm except for a few isolated instances. Greek army tanks moved through the city.

A solid line of police guarded big downtown hotels crammed with American and British tourists.

Excited demonstrators brandished signs, many in English, calling Sir John Harding, British governor of the Mediterranean island colony, the "gauleiter of Cyprus." Others said: "Gangster Harding, you will die" and "let us quit NATO."

At the same time, thousands of students were reported demonstrating against Britain in the northern city of Salonika.

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP)—The British mounted a special guard over this tense colonial island capital today as they prepared to execute two Greek Cypriots convicted of political killings. The hour for the hangings had not been announced but it was believed they might be carried out today.

Field Marshal Sir John Harding, governor of this Mediterranean island colony, ruled yesterday that the two men must die. His decision brought renewed appeals for a reprieve, not only from Cyprus and Greece but also from 30 Laborite members of the British Parliament.

The condemned Cypriots are Michael Karalis and Andreas Dimitriou, both 23.

Karalis was convicted of shooting a Nicosia police constable in the back last August.

Dimitriou was convicted of the slaying of a British businessman in Famagusta last January.

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Significance Of Primary Vote In Indiana Disputed

Five states held primary elections yesterday and an immediate, and inevitable, dispute arose as to the political significance of the Indiana results.

President Eisenhower took substantial lead in that predominantly Republican state over Democratic Estes Kefauver, although the two were not directly opposed in the presidential preference voting.

Eisenhower, with 3,193 of Indiana's 4,339 precincts reporting, had 250,339 votes, or 69 per cent compared to 9,759 for Lar (America First) Daily, who opposed him on foreign policy.

Kefauver, with 3,223 of the state's precincts counted, had 156,428 votes, or 38 per cent.

He had no opposition on the Democratic side. He had hoped to pull down at least 41 per cent of the total vote—the percentage Adlai E. Stevenson got in losing to Eisenhower in 1952.

The Indiana vote was unusually light, even though real contests were lacking. Democrats had hoped for an indication of farm resentment of administration policies, but no such signals appeared.

There was even less national significance in the other four state primaries, but some had red-hot contests. Some highlights:

FLORIDA—Gov. Leroy Collins easily and somewhat unexpectedly swept past five opponents to win Democratic renomination—tantamount to re-election. He will oppose the GOP contender, William A. Washburn Jr., in November.

Collins had a clear majority that avoided a runoff between the top two Democratic contenders.

U. S. Sen. George Smathers swamped his lone opponent and easily won Democratic renomination.

OHIO—Republican C. William O'Neill and Democrat Michael V. DiSalle won party fights for the right to contend in November for the Ohio governorship.

Both seek the governor's chair being vacated by Democrat Frank Lausche, who was unopposed for the Democratic nomination for the U. S. Senate now held by Republican George Bender.

WEST VIRGINIA—Gov. William C. Marland held a slim lead over State Atty. Gen. John G. Fox.

Merchandise Tax Check Is Begun In Douglas Co.

A complete check of Douglas County's merchandise inventory tax returns began Tuesday, according to Morris C. Bowker, county assessor.

The survey, intended to determine if there are any irregularities in reporting inventory values for tax purposes, will be conducted by two employees from the valuation division of the State Tax Commission. They are Walter Taylor and Arthur Thornburg.

It is expected the survey will take a month to complete, Bowker said. The men have been working in other counties on similar projects for several months. Taylor said the check is part of a statewide program to aid county assessors by furnishing manpower to go over the returns sent in by personal property taxpayers.

A new law, in effect for the first time this year, allows a monthly average figure to be used in some reports. Taylor said the tax commission survey will include a check to see that the new option is being used properly, as well as to see if the "processor's exemption" is correctly applied to those returns qualifying for its use.

It will be the second time this spring the candidates have appeared in Oregon, but the first time in Roseburg for each.

PORTLAND (AP)—Adlai Stevenson will return to Oregon Sunday, two days earlier than scheduled previously, for a wind-up of his write-in campaign with Sen. Estes Kefauver for the Democratic presidential nomination.

Stevenson supporters received word Monday of the change that will bring Stevenson back to the state Sunday afternoon. He will remain in Oregon until the afternoon of May 16. He will appear at a coffee hour in Portland Sunday night.

He will speak at Woodburn, Salem, Lebanon and Hillsboro on Monday; Pendleton, The Dalles and Eugene on Tuesday and at Roseburg and Coos Bay before leaving for California Wednesday. Kefauver will be back to wind up his Oregon campaign on May 15-16.

Sen. Estes Kefauver and Adlai Stevenson have gotten together on arrangements for a joint speaking engagement at Eugene, after all. Backers of both candidates said Tuesday night they had accepted the invitation of the University of Oregon to speak at McArthur Court the night of May 15.

Both men will be in Oregon winding up their campaigns for write-in votes in the May 18 Democratic presidential primary election. The candidate winning the greatest number of write-in votes will have the state's 18 Democratic convention delegates pledged to him.

Alfred Corbett, co-chairman of the Oregon Stevenson for President Committee, said Stevenson had accepted the invitation after Lane County Democratic officials approved arrangements.

Kefauver backers, who for some time sought a joint appearance of the two candidates, said the senator also had accepted.

On the Republican side Tuesday, Glen Jack of Oregon City was named chairman of the Oregon Citizens for Eisenhower Committee. Jack, an attorney, is a former president of the Oregon State Bar.

Sec. Wilson Says Defense Budget Okay

WASHINGTON (AP)—Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson testified Wednesday the administration's defense budget will enable the Air Force to place orders for 12 more B52 bombers than it requested.

Wilson told a Senate Appropriations subcommittee that the 36-billion-dollar budget carries funds for 202 of the eight-jet, intercontinental bombers.

He said this compares with the Air Force's initial request for funds for 190 of the long-range bombers in the fiscal year beginning July 1.

Wilson also testified that the 202 B52s will be produced "in four or five months quicker time" than originally anticipated.

He did not say when they would come off the assembly lines, but he told the subcommittee Tuesday at the start of its hearings on the defense budget that the current rate of production is six a month.

Wilson said the goal is to step up production to 20 a month but did not estimate when the rate of delivery would be reached.

Sen. Chavez (D-NM) asked him how many B52s were being produced from appropriations for the two prior years. Wilson replied that this information is classified (secret).

Before the hearing resumed, Sen. Robertson (D-Va) told reporters he had misgivings that the proposed \$36 billion dollars of defense spending is too little. He said he would seek "frank and uninhibited" testimony by the joint chiefs of staff on this point.

Engdahl said he has selected four members in favor of the district and four who had signed petition for dissolution in order to secure an unbiased citizen's committee.

S. Ferche's Bid Low On Canyonville School

S. Ferche, Roseburg, Tuesday night submitted low bid of \$101,392 for construction for a new eight-room elementary school, health room and covered play shed at Canyonville.

The Canyonville School Board accepted the bid. Construction will start in about two weeks, according to Mrs. Virginia Proctor, News-Review correspondent.

Six bids were entered, and the highest was less than \$1,000 more than the Ferche offer. Other contractors who entered bids included: M&S Construction Co., Hampton-Platt, Southern Oregon Construction Co., Todd Building Co. and Hamilton and Sommer.

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area. The committee said the county sanitarian has told them it is not feasible to grant more permits for building in the area.

3. "The committee feels that the growth potential in this area is tremendous, far greater than many outlying districts of Roseburg, and to curtail this growth by the simple means of voting the bonds down, or worse still, voting to dissolve the district... would be detrimental to the community as a whole." It went on to say such action would "in no way" alter the need of a disposal system.

The committee calls itself an "entirely unbiased group," interested in presenting what we feel is a more or less condensed report from a number of meetings with peoples and firms that have expressed interest and have offered their services."
