Robinson's Army Protests Gloves

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The small army of Sugar Ray Robinson marched up the hill, made a stand, spoke a piece and marched down again.

The middleweight champion of the world, through his managers, Ernie Braca, Harold Johnson and George Gainsford, vigorously protested Wednesday the use of eight-ounce gloves for the 15-round title fight May 18 at Wrigley Field with Carl (Bobo) Olson.

At one point Gainsford, a huge man with a booming voice, declared:

"If we have to use eight-ounce gloves instead of six, there will be no fight."

He sounded like he meant it, but 10 minutes later big George returned to the room in the Hollywood Stadium and announced:

"We have decided to co-operate with the State Athletic Commission. I rescind by previous statement."

Robinson and Olson, each of whom had been approved in a physical examination by the club's physician, Dr. John Fahey, took no part in the glove debate.

Each also underwent a thorough cross-examination from a score of sports writers and radio and television people. At times as they were questioned separately they stood or sat just a few feet apart.

Heavyweight Picture Clears With Bob Baker's Victory

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — The heavyweight title picture was slightly less clouded today after Bob Baker's slashing victory over John Holman, but what will happen next appears to be anybody's guess.

Baker, the Pittsburgh Giant, pounded out a unanimous decision over Holman, the slow-motion Chicago boxer, last night in a 12-round bout billed as the first in a tournament to determine the successor to the retired Heavyweight champion Rocky Marciano.

Later, Baker's manager, Dusty Bette, said he had a promise from the International Boxing Club that his fighter would be matched in the second round of the eliminations with the winner of a Floyd Patterson-Hurricane Jackson bout scheduled for June 8 in Madison Square Garden.

Reports from New York, however, indicated that the Patterson-Jackson winner might meet Archie Moore for the championship.

Moore, the ancient ruler of the light heavyweight division, is listed as the No. 1 heavy in the current Ring ratings. Jackson is ranked second, Baker third, Holman fourth and Patterson fifth.

If it accomplished nothing else, last night's fight eased the traffic jam of title contenders by eliminating Holman.

Bleeding heavily from a cut over the left eye, Holman was almost a pathetic figure as he plodded after Baker in the late rounds, trying to land a blow that could overcome Baker's mounting margin of superiority.

Baker weighed 211 pounds, Holman 206.

All eight teams in the Southern Assn., trained in Florida this year.

SIGNS WITH CBS

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The Pacific Coast Conference said Thursday it has signed with Columbia Broadcasting System's Pacific network for radio broadcasts of all major conference sports events for two years.

The plan was termed the "most comprehensive... of any collegiate conference in the nation," by Alfred R. Masters, PCC radio-television committee chairman.

It calls for coverage of football, basketball and some spring sports plus midweek programs featuring each school's athletic officials and players.

WASHINGTON TO PLAY Despite Suspension

SEATTLE (AP) — In case you're wondering, the University of Washington football team has not folded its sweat shirts and gone into hiding for two years—the length of its Pacific Coast Conference "suspension."

"Tell everybody," said senior halfback Credell Green Wednesday, "that we're a-comin'."

Another senior—halfback Dean Derby—said the penalty "has just made us want to win all the harder." And a sophomore—center Rene Bertheau—said there has been no talk among the younger players about leaving Washington for other schools.

For two years the Huskies will not be permitted to take part in post-season athletics and they will be cut out of their share of the Rose Bowl kitty. This would amount to about \$32,000.

No team in any sport will be permitted to win a conference championship. Thus the football team, now trying in spring practice to learn the split-T system of new coach Darrell Royal, could go through its 1956 schedule undefeated and wind up exactly nowhere.

The penalty was pronounced last week by the conference because some football players had been given money not in accordance with PCC regulations.

Seeking punishment for his split-T, coach Royal has moved Luther (Hit and Run) Carr back to left half after giving him a whirl at the quarterback assignment. This is but one of numerous and continuing lineup changes tried by the new mentor as he seeks power for his attack.

Olympic Fund To Get Aid From Eugene Track Meet

EUGENE (AP) — An invitational track meet here Aug. 11 to raise money for the U.S. Olympic Fund has been planned by the University of Oregon and the Eugene Active Club.

Bakers said many members of the 1956 U.S. Olympic track and field team will be invited to compete.

REPLACES CY YOUNG

NEW YORK (AP) — The revised edition of "The Official Encyclopedia of Baseball," by S. C. Thompson and the late Hy Turkin shows that Walter Johnson has replaced Cy Young as the holder of the record for the most games ever played by a pitcher. Johnson was in 930 major league games, 44 more than Young. The new edition has been published by A. S. Barnes & Co.

BELMONT STAKES SET

BELMONT, N.Y. (AP) — The \$100,000 added Belmont Stakes, feature of Belmont Park's spring meeting, is set for June 16. The race is the third leg in the triple crown and is at one mile and a quarter for 3-year-olds.

Oldfield Falls Out Of Money; Mason Wins

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Bunny Mason of Salem was \$500 richer Thursday following his narrow victory over Chuck Congdon of Tacoma and Al Williams of Medford in the Oregon Open Golf Tournament.

Mason nearly blew the five C-notes when he ballooned to a 75 on the last 18 holes of Wednesday's final, 36-hole round over the par 72 Eastmoreland course.

Coupled with his morning round of 72, Mason wound up with a 72-hole total of 283, five under par.

Right on his heels were Williams and Congdon with 284s. Williams had a 76-70 Wednesday while Congdon was steady at 72-72.

Knotted at 285 were Eddie Hogan of Portland, Bob McKendrick of Oswego and Eddie Draper of Seattle. Bruce Cudd of Portland topped the amateur contingent with a 287, with rounds of 71 and 70 Wednesday.

WADE SIGNED

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Quarterback Billy Wade was safely in the fold of the Los Angeles Rams football squad Thursday, signed to a contract for the 1956 season.

The development, said the club, should end speculation that the ex-Vanderbilt star might leave the Rams and play in Canada, or be used as an expensive talent for trading purposes.

Regular quarterback Norman Van Brocklin and rookie signal caller Rudy Bukich are already signed.

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
