SAN DIEGO, Calif. — An earthquake was widely felt in the San Diego area at 9:32 a.m. Friday.

It caused no damage but was strong enough to make open doors swing and houses creak.

It was felt in Los Angeles and recorded at the California Institute of Technology at Pasadena.

Fred S. Robinson, amateur seismologist, said he thought the center was in Baja California about 100 miles southeast of here.

An earthquake centering there in February was felt throughout Southern California and destroyed a Mexican village without loss of life.
