Missionary Set To Speak Here Tonight At 7:45

James E. Baker, missionary, formerly to China and Hongkong, and more recently to Formosa, will be a guest speaker at the Roseburg Assembly at God Church 518 N. E. Nash St., tonight, at 7:45.

Rev. Vernon L. Klemm, pastor reported today that Baker has just returned to the states after spending eight years in missionary service in the Far East. He will relate some of his experiences and will tell of the progress of missions in these countries. It will be a public meeting.

Baker, the son of missionary parents, was born and raised in China. He then came to the United States to further his education at Asbury College in Wilmore, Ky., and Central Bible Institute in Springfield, Mo. From 1941 to 1945 he was on the faculty of Central Bible Institute.

In 1946, Baker, with his wife, returned to China. He established the Ligkuang Bible Institute in Yunnan, southwest China. After three years, he was driven out by the Communists, but the school continued under Chinese leadership, despite Communist persecution.

Baker then went to Hongkong, where he served as principal of the Ecclesia Bible Institute for three years. He will be telling of 15 graduates, who bravely faced almost certain death to return to Red China and do gospel work.

Going to Formosa in 1952, Baker founded the Taikung Bible Institute in Taipei. He continued with this work until he returned to the states.

At the conclusion of his furlough, Baker plans to return to Formosa and continue expanding the Bible school work. He is now visiting various churches of the Assemblies of God presenting the needs of the work in Formosa.

World Travelers On Motorcycles Tarry In Roseburg

Two European motorcyclists stopped in Roseburg Saturday night on a jaunt around the world.

The two men, William Dussel, 35, of Groningen, Holland, and Manfred Ueschold, 26, of Nuremberg, Germany, started from central Europe last July 15 and have been going ever since.

So far, they have driven their motorcycles in 17 countries.

The itinerary took them through southern Europe and Asia. After crossing Syria, Iraq, Iran, Pakistan, India and Thailand, they had to take a ship to Hongkong, another to Japan and a third from Japan to Longview, Wash. They are now touring the United States, which they expect will take about three months. They are hoping to be able to leave the United States for Europe and the last leg of the round-the-world trip in August.

Dussel is a free-lance journalist, who is submitting copy of the trip to 12 newspapers in The Netherlands. He is most closely allied to the Rotterdammer in Rotterdam, Holland. Ueschold is the camera side of the duo. He is working in conjunction with Dussel in sending the articles to Holland, but he has a working agreement for pictures with Illustrat de Spiegel (The Mirror), Holland's biggest weekly.

Through the free-lance work, the two men are financing their round-the-world trip.

Four Languages Spoken

The two are traveling on a German and Japanese motorcycle. They started on the German cycle, a Maicoletta, with a sidecar. It is a 250 cubic centimeter, two-stroke vehicle with 14 horsepower. They bought the second cycle in Japan.

Dussel, the spokesman for the pair spoke with flawless English during his interview. He said schooling in Holland included four languages, Dutch, French, German and English. His English got additional polish through use while he was a Dutch correspondent while serving with forces in the Korean War. Earlier, he had been trained for war service at Camp Lejeune, N.C., during World War II. Although the Japanese surrendered before he was sent into action, he was with Dutch troops sent to Indonesia.

The two men arrived in Roseburg late Saturday and stayed overnight at the Hotel Creason before continuing south.

Drain Baby Has Meningitis At Eugene Hospital

An 8-month-old Drain boy under treatment for spinal meningitis at Sacred Heart Hospital in Eugene was reported "getting along well" Monday.

According to his physician, Jack W. Prentice Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack W. Prentice Sr., was recovering. The infant became sick suddenly and was first treated on May 7.

The physician said all relatives and neighbors who have been in contact with the baby have been treated with antibiotics. He said there was no cause for alarm. The Drain case was one of two spinal meningitis cases appearing on the May 12 health report issued by the Douglas County Health Office in Roseburg. The other was that of Tommy Moore, 7-year-old Roseburg youth, who has since been released from Mercy Hospital.

The weekly report listed the following diseases reported: Measles, 9; pneumonia, 1; chicken pox, 4; strep throat, 1; and influenza, 4.

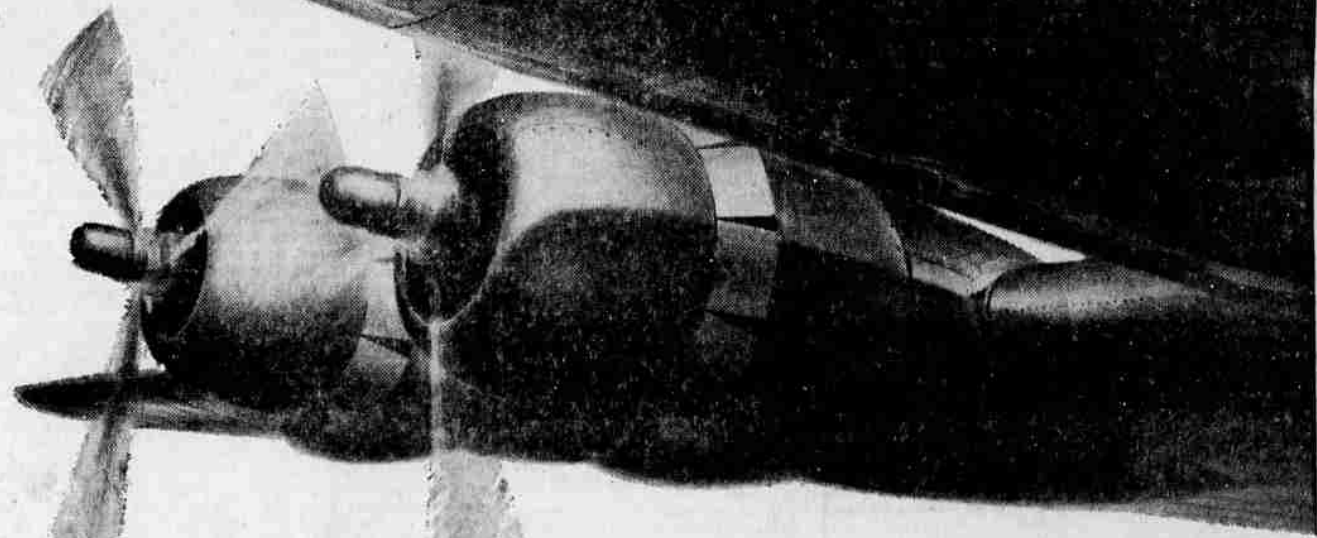
