Beaver Misplays Spell Victory For Cougars

PULLMAN, Wash. — The Washington State Cougars parlayed seven hits and two Oregon State errors into a 9-3 Northern Division baseball victory over the Beavers Tuesday.

Both OSC errors came in the fourth inning and, coupled with two singles and three walks, aided the Cougars in breaking loose for five runs.

The victory kept the Cougars safely atop the division standings.

Spokane Boxer Loses Unanimous Decision

SPOKANE — Bobby Woods, making his first start in his home town since last June, dropped a unanimous, 10-round decision to Russ Tague of Davenport, Iowa, in a lightweight scrap at the Coliseum Tuesday night.

Referee Joey August penalized Woods two points in the fourth round for low blows and cautioned the Spokane fighter on several other occasions.

Woods entered the ring at 135 pounds, Tague at 133.

There were no knockdowns.

Dick Lane, 151, of Billings, Mont., and Boise, Idaho, stopped Benny Walker, 153, San Francisco, in the seventh round of a scheduled 10-round companion feature.

Referee Joey Dolan stopped the fight as Walker sagged against the ropes from Lane's hard shots.

AAU Adds Power In Santee Case

NEW YORK — The Amateur Athletic Union, which appeared to be buckling under the relentless pressure of the Wes Santee case during the past month, emerged today from the drawn-out legal battle more powerful than ever.

For Santee, America's greatest miler who took a long gamble by bringing the AAU to court on a legal technicality, it marks the end of the line as a competitor.

In upholding the lifetime ban imposed on Santee by the AAU, Justice Walter A. Lynch of the New York State Supreme Court yesterday minced no words in condemning the gangling Marine Corps lieutenant for openly flouting the AAU's expense rules.

Had Santee won the case, the AAU would have been reduced to nothingness. But the organization, which rules most amateur sports in this country, never has lost a court case challenging its authority—and it probably will be a long time before anyone else brings suit.

Santee and his Olympic ambitions had little to do with the result. No matter what the outcome, he never would have been certified for the games. Now he can run only against service personnel, where he has met little competition.

Charles P. Grimes, Santee's attorney, seemed like warm about taking the case to a higher court.

Two Drown, 3 Missing When Tuna Boat Sinks

TACOMA — Two men were reported drowned and three others are missing in the sinking of a Tacoma-owned tuna clipper off the coast of Mexico Monday.

The boat was the Western Explorer, jointly owned by the Western Boat Building Co. and Frank Manaka, the vessel's captain.

Harvey Petrich of Western Boat said no details of the sinking were available, but the crew of 12 apparently was forced to abandon the fishing boat after it went aground on Socora Island, southwest of the southern tip of Baja California.

Another fishing boat, Petrich said, rescued five of the crewmen, who were clinging to the mast of the sunken clipper. Two others were sighted ashore, two ladies were recovered and three crew members were still missing Tuesday morning.

There was no report on the names of those who drowned, but Petrich said he understood Manaka had survived.

The 90-foot Western Explorer, which left San Diego for the tuna fishing grounds 10 days ago, was built as a fishing boat in the Western Boat plant here early in World War II. The Navy took her over for use as a minesweeper, named the Phoebe, during the war and she resumed fishing in 1945.

Organ music will be provided by Fritz Snyder. The invocation and benediction will be given by the Rev. Mr. Walton. The school chorus will sing and Miss Bess Clough, chairman of the school board will present diplomas to graduates and promotional certificates to the eighth graders. Carrie Schaefer Flory is valedictorian and Janice Patton, salutatorian.

Fallin Post of the American Legion will then present an award to the outstanding boy and girl citizen of the year. Other special awards will be given by Supt. Yoder. The junior class is decorating the auditorium for the year-end program for the seniors.

Boxer Manager Pokes Sportswriter For Story

SPOKANE, Wash. — A fight manager, who evidently resented some uncomplimentary stories written about his fighter, struck a sportswriter in the dressing room of the Coliseum here Tuesday night.

Bob Johnson, who writes for the Spokane Chronicle, was cut and bruised about the face and had his glasses broken.

Dressing room witnesses said the punch was thrown by Chuck Woods, manager of lightweight Bobby Woods.

Johnson said Manager Woods hit him after complaining that Johnson's pre-game articles in the Chronicle had held down the size of the crowd.

Bobby Woods, who usually calls Spokane his hometown, was upset by Russ Tague of Iowa in a unanimous decision.

The crowd was a small 1,500.

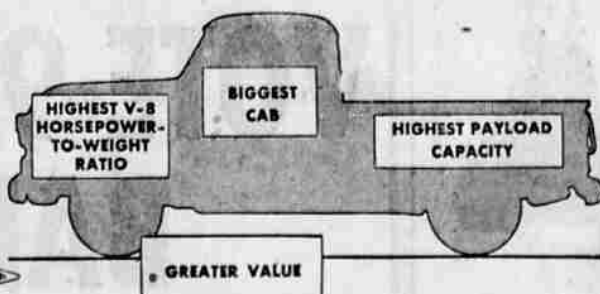

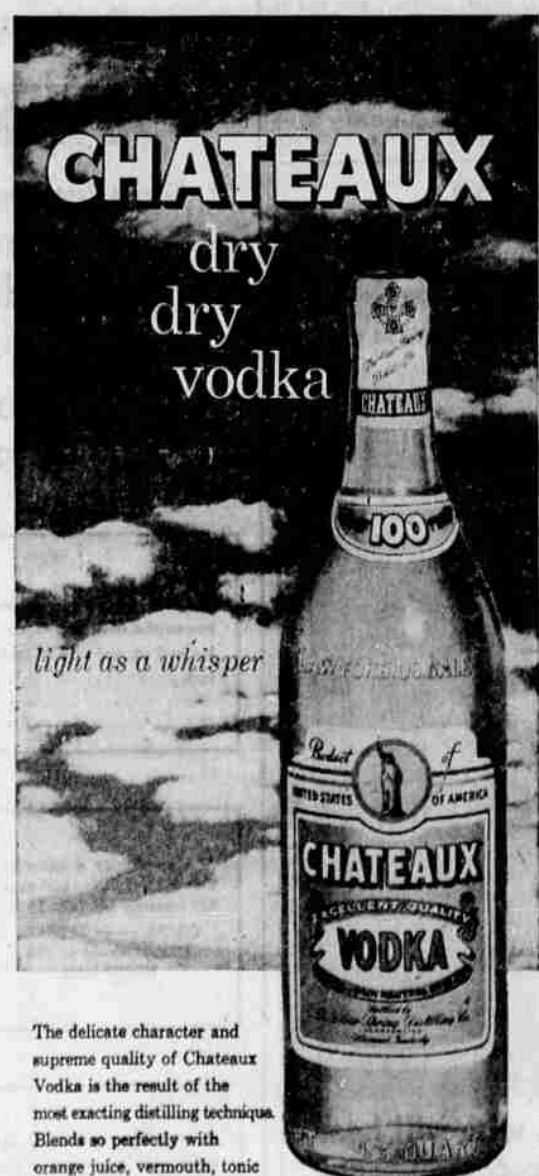
