PORTLAND — The Bureau of Indian Affairs local office Tuesday called for bids on furnishing two complete pumping units for the Modoc Point project on the Klamath Indian Reservation near Chiloquin.

Jefferson Co. DA Plans No Action Against Portland GE

MADRAS, Ore. — Dist. Atty. Warren H. Albright said Tuesday

he plans no action in the near future against Portland General Electric Co. because of Pelton Dam.

Albright said he would have to complete his study of the law first.

Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton reiterated Monday his ruling that Albright should bring criminal proceedings against PGE to stop construction of the dam on the Deschutes River because PGE has not acquired water rights.

Thornton first said Feb. 29 that the company should be prosecuted when construction started. Actual construction work began about two weeks ago, and Gov. Elmo Smith asked Thornton if he should do anything about it.

Thornton's opinion that Albright should take action in effect held that the governor has no authority to enter the case.

"I am still studying the law on the matter," Albright said. "What action I take will depend upon the conclusion which I reach concerning the law. There is no question about their starting Pelton Dam."

Albright said he should reach a conclusion within a month.

Thornton said in another opinion for the governor a week ago that PGE was violating the state water laws in building the dam.

The company obtained a construction permit from the federal Power Commission, but the state Hydroelectric Commission denied a permit.

A U. S. Supreme Court decision upheld the federal license, and the governor said he was concerned that it might result in federal control of state streams.

PGE asserts it is not violating the law. The company said it submitted its case to all agencies concerned, and that the federal license, upheld by the Supreme Court, is final authority to proceed with construction.
