Aid To Mothers Handling Tiny Babies Is Invented By Myrtle Creek Couple

A Myrtle Creek couple discovered after the birth of their sixth child, that handling the baby was just as difficult as it was to handle their first one.

It was then that Luella and Orel Moore decided that there should be a more adequate way of giving their new baby her bath.

Mrs. Moore first made a ceramic mold, shaped to fit a baby's body, and then made a corresponding mold of home plastic. She discovered that the contour-shaped plastic solved the awkward problem of bathing her little daughter without fear of the child slipping from her hands.

Next came a trip to Portland to see the firm of Cook and Schermerhorn, patent attorneys, who liked the idea. The Moores decided to have the invention patented, and now the patent is pending.

A survey was then made in the San Francisco, Calif., area to determine what the merchants thought of the product, and the Moores report that they "thought it was great."

The next step was to look into the possibility of getting the item, called "Wee-Contour," manufactured. The Moores found only one machine in San Francisco and one in Portland big enough to make the article. The Beaman's Co. of Portland was hired to do the job.

The Moores report that the actual product hasn't hit the market yet, however, they hope to have some samples here soon to distribute to local merchants for approval.

The construction of the "Wee-Contour" is in two units — the plastic holder for the baby and the frame on which the holder stands. At the present time the invention is available only at Portland.

An office, run by Leroy Moore, has been opened at 1225 N. Killingsworth St. The "mother helper" is expected to retail at a cost below \$7.

This first invention produced by the Moore family, who moved to Myrtle Creek from Vancouver, Wash., in March of 1951. The ages of their children range from 1 to 23, with three now at home and three who are not living at home at the present time.

Stevenson Talks To Local People, Shakes Hands Tells Aims For Coming Election

Throughout America in the 1956 political year, candidates are combining old and new to bring their views to voters.

The speed of air transportation whisked Democratic presidential candidate Adlai Stevenson in and out of Roseburg Wednesday morning. But the happy, sun-tanned visitor used the minutes between flights to talk with and to residents and get in some old-fashioned hand shaking.

A noisy blare of horns told more than 500 persons waiting to hear the former governor of Illinois that his motorcade was nearing the Douglas County Court House. Shortly after arrival at 10:20 a.m., Stevenson made his way through the crowd, shaking hands and talking briefly with those near him.

The hot morning sun pounded mercilessly down on the court house steps and lawn, but neither appeared to speed up Stevenson's gait. Those who approached were warmly greeted, including in a school pupils who had been let out of class to hear a presidential aspirant. One youth walked away carefully holding his right hand and quipping "I'll never wash it."

The open air session got under way around 10:30 a.m., as acting county Democratic Central Committee Chairman Al Flegel introduced Democratic candidates in the audience. They included U. S. Representative office seekers Charles O. Porter, Eugene, and David Shaw, Gold Beach.

Before Stevenson could start speaking, following an introduction by Daniel Dimick, he was initiated as "chief consul for all Paul Bunyans." Several hardy Bunyan members conducted the ritual which included a make-believe head chopping with a live chain saw.

Then, talking extemporaneously, Stevenson called for wise use of government-owned timber, aid to declining farm income, elimination of the trust-busting provisions of the Taft-Hartley law and restoration of authority and independence of the National Labor Relations Board.

He made brief references to continuation of items in the "great humanitarian programs" he said were initiated by Democrats. He listed these as expansion of Social Security benefits, slum clearance, housing and health aids. He termed them "indispensable parts of the right of people in the 20th century, and said "if they are to be restored, the nation needs a Democratic president in November."

owned lands. "in the interest of all the people of this country, not a few." At this point he spoke for re-election of Sen. Wayne Morse. Telling Oregonians they have contributed to congress "one of the best national resources," the ex-governor said he hopes Morse is "one asset you do not let Republicans give away."

Referring often to Oregon, the presidential aspirant spoke of the state's beauty and "Western rich and beautiful green valleys here." He said he counted the state's political primary Friday "of great importance" and made no bones about seeking write-in votes.
