SEWAGE TREATMENT PLANT AND SANITARY SEWER SYSTEM ADVERTISEMENT FOR BIDS

Sealed proposals for the construction of a Sewage Treatment Plant and Sanitary Sewer System addressed to the Mayor and City Council, Winston, Oregon, will be received at the City Hall, Winston, Oregon, until 2:00 P.M., Pacific Standard Time, on the 25th day of May, 1956.

The Sewage Treatment Plant is designed to provide complete treatment for 1500 persons. The major items of construction are a circular 14 foot diameter pump station, a concrete block control building, two 22 foot diameter clarifiers, a 44 foot diameter trickling filter, and a 30 foot diameter concrete digestion tank. Also included under the treatment plant contract is a pneumatic ejector type sewage lift station.

The work contemplated on the Sanitary Sewer System consists of approximately 35,000 linear feet of 8 to 15-inch concrete rubber ring type sewer pipe, together with necessary manholes and other appurtenances.

Proposals will be received on two schedules on bids: One for the Sewage Treatment Plant and one for the Sanitary Sewer System. The work will be awarded to one bidder or to that combination of bidders which, in the opinion of the City Council, will best serve the interests of the City of Winston.

Plans and specifications may be examined at the office of the City Recorder, City Hall, Winston, Oregon, or at the office of Cornell, Howland, Hayes & Merrill, 1000 Western Avenue, Corvallis, Oregon. Copies of the contract documents may be obtained at the above offices upon a deposit of \$40.00. The full amount of the deposit will be refunded if the said plans and specifications are returned in good condition within 15 days after the date of the bid opening. Additional copies of said documents may be obtained at the above offices upon a deposit of \$10 for each additional copy, \$12 of which will be refunded if said additional copies are returned in good condition within 15 days after the date of bid opening.

Each proposal must be submitted on the prescribed form and be accompanied by a certified check, cashier's check, or bid bond payable to the City of Winston, Oregon, in an amount not less than 5% of the amount bid.

The successful bidder will be required to furnish a surety bond in compliance with the statutes of the State of Oregon for faithful performance of the contract in the full amount of the contract price. The right is reserved to reject any and all proposals, to postpone the award of the contract for a period not to exceed 30 days and to accept such proposals as are to the best interest of the City of Winston.

All bidders must peruse and agree to the statutes of the State of Oregon for public work contracts done for municipalities within the State of Oregon.

Blinded Columnist Resolves To Continue Labor Probe

NEW YORK (AP)—Victor Riesel, crusading labor columnist blinded by an acid attack, urges a congressional probe of the underworld of the labor movement.

At a hospital news conference yesterday, six weeks to the day after an unidentified assailant threw sulphuric acid into his eyes, the 41-year-old syndicate newspaper writer said:

"There has got to be a federal investigation of labor racketeering which infests unions."

"It should be by friends of labor, like Senators Paul Douglas (D-Ill.), Irving Laves (R-NY) or Styles Bridges (R-NH), or their counterparts in Congress."

"If it is carried on by men of good will it will command the respect of both sides, and the mobs can't say they're being persecuted by the government."

Wearing white surgical pads over his eyes, Riesel gestured vigorously as he talked with some 50 newsmen.

"I'm not sensitive about the fact that I'm blind," he said. "I can't see but I can hear and I can feel."

He said he expected to leave the hospital early next week.

"The day after I leave I will return to my office and my typewriter and will bang out my column as I always have," he said.

For the past 10 years Riesel has been labor columnist for the New York Daily Mirror and about 190 other newspapers throughout the nation.

"I will write my column as long as people will read it," he said. "The same underworld crowd that hit me will be the same underworld crowd I will continue to fight."

"They have not scared me. They blinded me but it will not keep me from writing the same type of column as before."

Riesel said he was not indicting all unions, and he praised George Meany, president of the AFL-CIO. Riesel's column has been continued by his staff while he was in the hospital.

"The waterfront is not the only place you have a tough mob," he said.

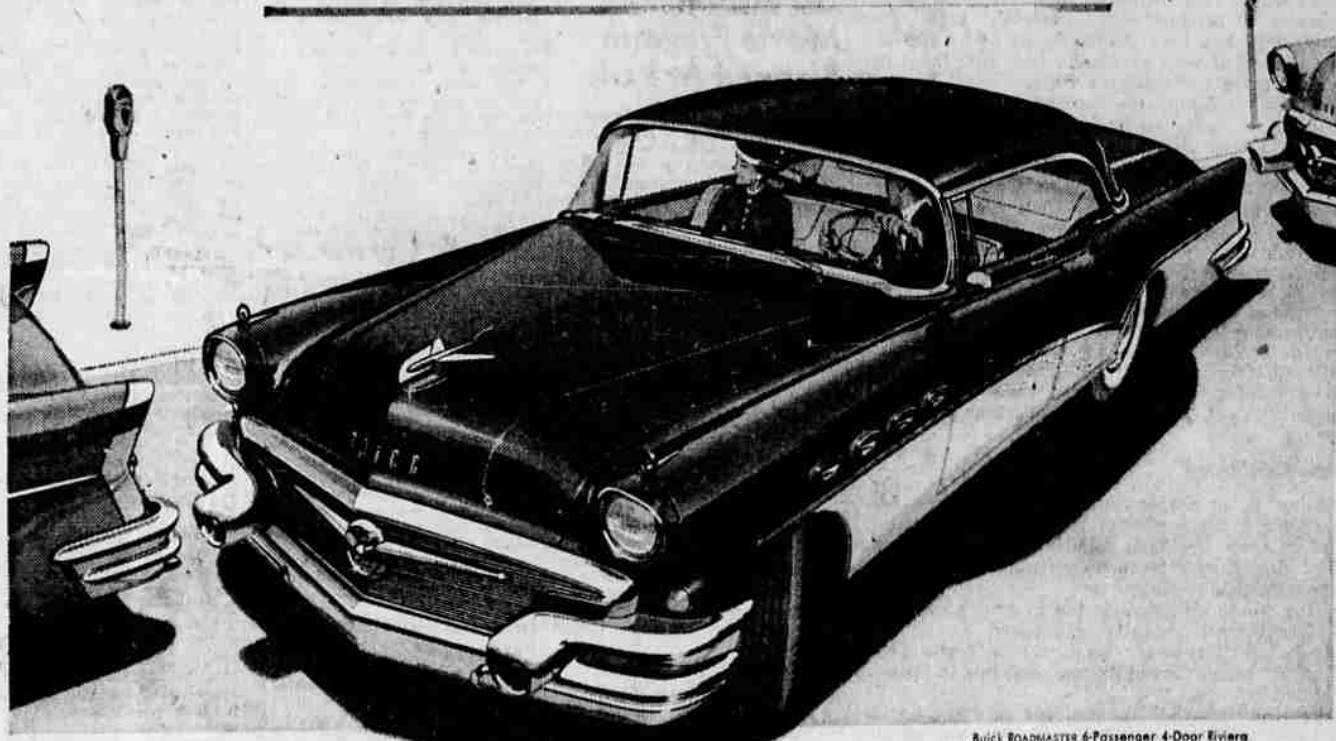
