

Klamath Man Rescued From Fall Into Canal

KLAMATH FALLS (AP) — Albert Atwell, 41, railroad worker, fell into the irrigation canal running through Klamath Falls Wednesday, a day after a Senate committee approved a resolution directing the Interior Department to find the best way of eliminating hazards of the canal.

Twenty five persons have drowned in the Reclamation Bureau canal since it was built 38 years ago.

Bill Moore, a contractor, saved Atwell from drowning. He jumped in and pulled Atwell to safety. Atwell was taken to a hospital, and later arrested on a charge of drunkenness.

District Public Meet Set May 23

A public meeting to reveal more information and answer questions on the Green Sanitary District has been scheduled May 23 at 8 p.m. in the Green School.

The two featured speakers at the meeting will be Vernon E. Salter, sanitary engineer from the Portland office of the Federal Housing Authority and Sidney Lasswell, consulting engineer for Cornell, Howland, Hayes and Merrifield of Corvallis. The Corvallis firm has been doing the engineering work on the beleaguered district.

No decision has yet been made on what the future course of the district will be as the result of the close vote in favor of retaining the district this month. The engineer-

ing firm had advised before the election that if the majority in favor was not heavy, the work in the district should be discontinued until more popular support became evident.

Everyone in the Green Sanitary District has been invited to attend the meeting May 23.

Opinion On Lane Grand Jury Asked By Governor

SALEM (AP) — Gov. Elmo Smith asked Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton Thursday for an opinion on whether Thornton should expand his Lane County investigation to include charges that the grand jury was irregularly chosen.

The charges were made by Lane County Dist. Atty. Eugene Venn, who has asked the state Supreme Court to take over this investigation.

Gov. Smith asked for the opinion after the Eugene Register-Guard published an open letter to him, asking that the scope of the investigation be broadened to include Venn's charges.

The grand jury was empaneled to investigate what might be embezzlement of funds of Moses Moody, state prison convict.

Smith, at Venn's request, ordered Thornton to take over this investigation.

Mrs. Luce Is Advised To Stay For Treatment

NEW YORK (AP) — U.S. Ambassador Clare Boothe Luce, who returned suddenly from her Rome post because of illness, has been advised to remain here for treatment for the next two months.

Dr. Milton Rosenbluth, her physician, said Thursday "at that time I would anticipate her a complete recovery."

"Mrs. Luce is suffering from a chronic enteritis which appears to be related to an infection of the liver which she had while abroad," the doctor reported. "She has as well a moderately severe iron deficiency anemia probably due to the same cause. She received one transfusion Wednesday and will require others."

Mrs. Luce, who is 53, flew home May 11.

Suspended Carrier Can Collect Social Security

SALEM (AP) — A Portland letter carrier, who was suspended by the postoffice for security reasons last Dec. 30, can collect unemployment compensation benefits, it was ruled Thursday.

The letter carrier, Lowery E. Huey, had been denied benefits under a rule which penalizes persons who are discharged for misconduct.

In Thursday's ruling, Warren Stevens, appeals referee for the Unemployment Compensation Commission, held that Huey could collect benefits because he was suspended, rather than discharged.

Stevens pointed out that the charges against Huey have not been established.

Hersholt, in ill health, left a sickbed under a doctor's care to attend the civic testimonial honoring his 50th year as an actor. He is 69.

The long dinner and speeches were a weakening ordeal for him. He had to leave before the tributes were finished.

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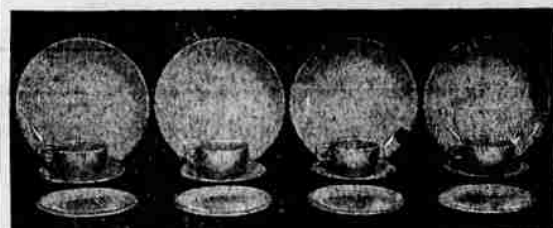
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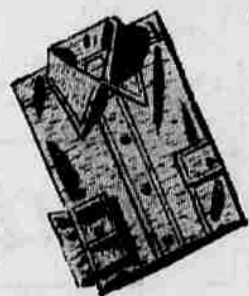

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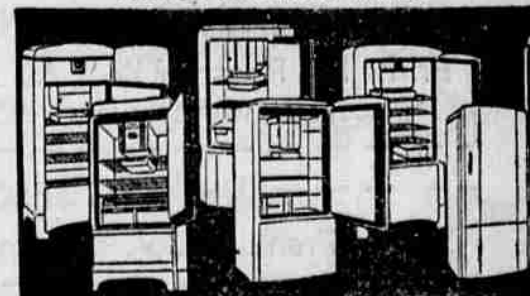
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
