Record-Breaking Heat, Cloudburst Collapse Dam

Record-breaking heat, a cloudburst, collapse of an auxiliary reservoir and continually rising rivers highlight the weather picture in the Pacific Northwest.

The Weather Bureau predicted temperatures may drop slightly Saturday but more flooding was threatened.

A six-square mile area west of Baker, Ore., was flooded when one side of an auxiliary reservoir collapsed Friday afternoon, releasing 60 to 70 million gallons of water.

The flood, five feet high, rushed down a hillside about 15 miles west of Baker, wrecking the home of Smith Mitchell, washing out a number of roads and covering a large amount of grain land.

City manager Robert Applegate estimated the damage to the Baker water system at \$200,000.

The cloudburst occurred at Camas, Wash., Friday night. An estimated 2 to 3 inches of rain fell in half an hour, flooding a number of basements and blocking at least one road in the area.

The hot sun, beating down on the mountain snowfields, increased the danger of possible floods over a wide area. The fire danger in the timbered forests also was increased.

Among the localities reporting record temperatures for May 18 were Seattle with 84 and Longview, Wash., with 97. Medford, Ore., had a high of 85. Pendleton had 93, Yakima 92, Walla Walla 92 and Olympia 90, and Spokane 87.

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Schrunk Leads Portland Race, Upset Hinted

PORTLAND (AP) — Portland voters hinted at an upset of Mayor Fred Peterson as they left him trailing Terry Schrunk, Multnomah County sheriff, but a fall runoff between the two seemed almost certain.

A runoff is held if no one gets a clear majority and while Schrunk was ahead comfortably there was no indication late votes could give him a majority in the nine-man field for mayor.

There was pre-election speculation that the recent vice charges aired in Portland might affect the election. If there was any effect, it was not readily apparent.

Stanley Earl apparently won reelection to his city council post and will face no November runoff. His nearest rival was Jack O'Donnell, county auditor, who was far back.

Commissioner William A. Bowes held a wide lead over his 10 opponents but did not poll a majority. He likely will have to run off in November against an old political foe, city commissioner J. E. (Jake) Bennett. The large field kept Bowes from gaining a clear majority.

Portlanders voted to uphold the city ordinance banning pinball machines.

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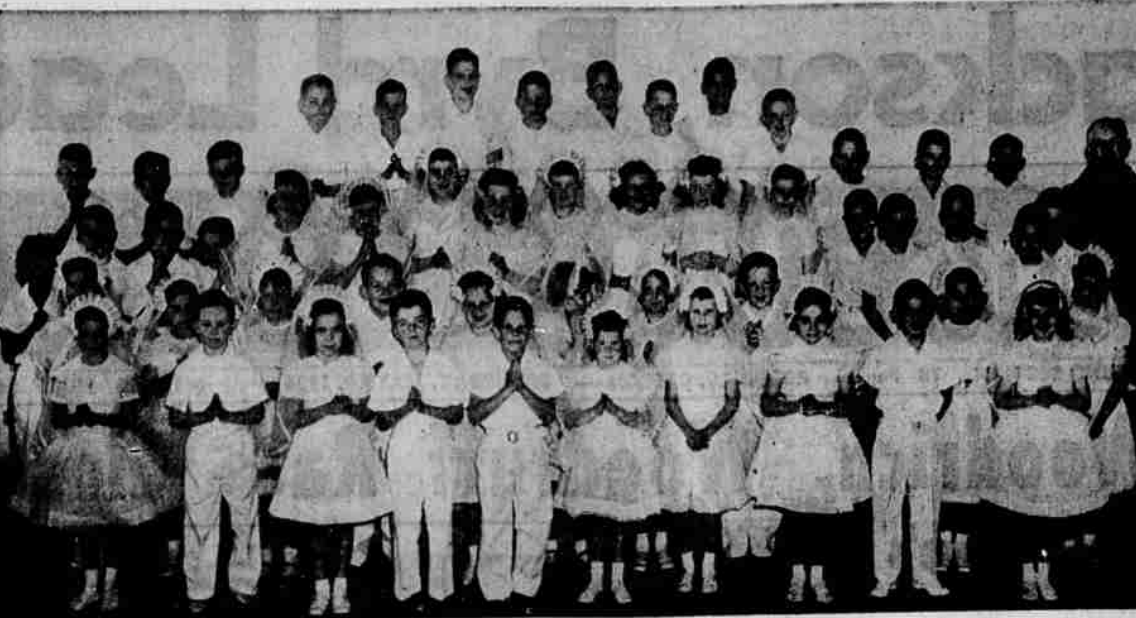

Israeli Embassy Returns Military Units To Dealer

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Israeli Embassy said Saturday that a shipment of 21 military vehicles halted by American customs authorities was being handed back to the dealer.

U.S. customs officials in New York Harbor blocked shipment of the half trucks to Israel on grounds they were assembled units and not covered by an export license issued for spare parts.

An embassy spokesman said the dealer has been notified to supply the spare parts covered by the license.

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Stevenson Takes Strong Lead Over Kefauver

to Morse, running as a Democrat for the first time. An especially long ballot may have discouraged the write-in abstainers from denoting their preference for president.

Both Stevenson and Kefauver made a vigorous appeal to Democrats to express their choice in the blank reserved for the presidential write-in. Entering Oregon too late to get on the ballot, they viewed the outcome as important to forthcoming contests in Florida and California.

McKay found brisk opposition in his Republican senatorial race from 51-year-old Phil Hitchcock, a former state senator appearing on the statewide ballot for the secretary had only a month to campaign after his last-minute decision to become a candidate.

Morse had opposition only from little-known Woody Smith, a Hood River service station operator, in wrapping up the Democratic nomination. Smith's vote was bigger than had been generally expected.

No cross-voting by Republicans and Democrats was allowed in the primary. The write-in both for the Democratic presidential nomination and the Republican vice presidential spot is binding on the respective party delegations.

The latest vote in unofficial returns from 1,705 of the state's 2,519 precincts:

Eisenhower (unopposed) 103,744. Nixon (write-in), 24,911. Kefauver 27,610, Stevenson 37,901.

Hitchcock 46,507, McKay 58,799. Morse 87,268, Smith 18,569.

Although Kefauver supporters clung to flickering hope he would overcome Stevenson on late returns, the Tennessee senator was running behind 5 to 9 in Multnomah County and 1 to 2 in Lane County. It was in the latter that the two candidates met on the same platform, on the University of Oregon campus, early this week.

Republican voters selected Gov. Elmo Smith to run against Democrat Robert Holmes of Astoria in the November gubernatorial race. The state's three Republican and one Democratic congressmen captured their party nominations.

Four More Airplanes Added At Local Airport

He reports he will have one more plane arriving soon to be used for Shirley's Air Service operations, and he reports he has sold three other planes to companies in the county for speeding their operations. Wardle is a sales representative for an airplane manufacturing company in southern Oregon.

New Farm Bill Satisfactory To Sec. Benson

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Agriculture Benson gave his qualified approval Saturday to the new farm bill passed by the Senate Friday night.

Benson said the bill is "rather complicated, with a number of amendments" and he has not had an opportunity to study each in detail.

"However," he said in a statement, "a quick check of the bill indicates that, overall, it has been much improved from the standpoint of the Department of Agriculture."

Meanwhile, department experts were reported going over the measure item by item to see if any new problems had been created.

Benson said many things in the bill approved by the Senate "were highly constructive." Among these he listed the soil bank which President Eisenhower asked, the compromise feed grain amendment and the elimination of wheat marketing quota penalties for farmers who use all wheat produced for feed and seed on their own farms.

Support for the new bill also came from senators who had vigorously opposed some provisions in the measure as it was passed by the House.

Senate leaders expressed hope that the new farm bill will become law next week without further controversy.

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
