THE HAGUE, Netherlands (U.S.)—A 45-year-old Pakistani member of the International Court of Justice here has taken an 18-year-old second wife, Mohammed Zafarullah Khan, 65.

FCC To Make Disclosure On Ultra-High Frequency
WASHINGTON (U.S.)—The Federal Communications Commission has promised "within the next few weeks" to take some undisclosed step on the issue of ultra-high frequency (UHF) television.

Sen. Magnuson (D-Wash.) said yesterday he had been so told by FCC Chairman George C. McConaughy. Magnuson heads the Senate Commerce Committee, which has been urging action.

Nearly all TV programs now are carried on the 12 very high frequency (VHF) channels. There are more than 70 UHF channels available, but most present sets cannot receive such broadcasts. In turn, few UHF stations can afford to operate because there are so few UHF set owners.

Housing Starts Seen For Year

SEATTLE (U.S.)—Housing starts over the country this year should total about 1,200,000 despite one of the tightest money markets on record, Lindell Peterson, president of the National Mortgage Bankers Assn. of America, said Friday.

At the worst, he said, they should not drop below 1,100,000. Peterson, president of the Chicago Mortgage Investment Co., said in an address at the opening of the association's Northwestern Mortgage Clinic.

"The present high cost of money is a result of a building economy. At best, this may look like a rugged year for the mortgage banker. He will fund builders and borrowers for more money than he can produce."

Another speaker, Dr. Paul Wendt, professor of finance at the University of California, said: "Shortages of mortgage credit are inevitable during a period of full use of our national resources."

The mortgage industry, he added, is now experiencing the most severe credit restrictions since 1933.

Former Umpqua Forest Ranger Given Transfer

PORTLAND (U.S.)—Ralph W. Crawford, supervisor of the Deschutes National Forest, will be transferred to Flagstaff, Ariz., to become supervisor of the Coconino National Forest, the U. S. Forest Service said Friday.

Crawford formerly held posts with the Umpqua and Mt. Hood National Forests in Oregon and was district ranger for the Leavenworth district of the Wenatchee National Forest in Washington. During a tour with the Snoqualmie National Forest he became Deschutes supervisor with headquarters in Bend, Ore., in 1939.

The transfer to Arizona becomes effective June 4.
