Nebraska Farmer Claims He Has Most Sons In US

LINWOOD, Neb. — John Kucera, 84-year-old farmer, laid a claim Saturday to being the U.S. father with the most sons.
 He has 13 sons.
 This is one more than Henry Harmon Tygart, a Tulsa floral delivery man who was honored a week ago by the National Father's Day Committee as the father with the most sons.
 Kucera, still a rugged looking man who shows the results of years in the sun and air, said he was "one up" on Tygart in daughters, too. Tygart has three and Kucera has four.
 All of Tygart's children are living. So are Kucera's.
 But Tygart has one thing that Kucera has lost. He has Mrs. Tygart.
 Kucera pointed that out graphically through a large family picture. With his voice breaking he said "Mamma, in the middle is gone six years ago."
 "Mamma—Mary—was 17 and I was 20 when we marry. Then 17 babies in 20 years.
 Kucera said he didn't know anyone was looking for the father with the most sons or he might have "entered myself."
 He lives alone in Linwood while two of his sons run the home farm of 600 acres.
 All his other children live in Nebraska towns with the exception of Albin who is at Seattle, Wash.

Thornton Advises Wait On Lane Co. Investigation

SALEM (AP) — Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton advised Gov. Elmo Smith Friday against enlarging the scope of the Lane County investigation until the state Supreme Court decides whether the county's new grand jury was chosen properly.
 After the Eugene Register-Guard published an open letter asking the governor to broaden the investigation to include Dist. Atty. Eugene Venn's charges that the jury was chosen illegally, Gov. Smith asked Thornton for the opinion, which Thornton gave Friday.
 The original investigation centers on charges that funds of

Moses Moody, a prison inmate, were embezzled.
 Thornton told the governor Friday that he wouldn't present any evidence to the Grand Jury until the Supreme Court rules on its legality.
 Venn filed two mandamus actions in the Supreme Court against Circuit Judge Frank Reid and County Clerk Harry Chase. They have until next Wednesday to answer.
 Thornton, at Venn's request, had been directed by Smith to take over investigation of the Moody charges.

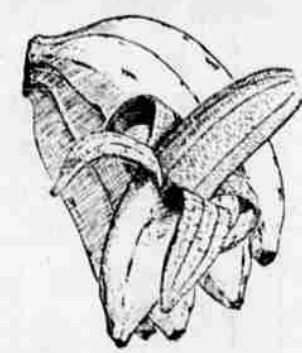
